#### Key vocabulary

- Latitude imaginary 'horizontal' lines that circle the globe, with the Equator the
- Longitude imaginary 'vertical' lines from Pole to Pole
- Northern Hemisphere The half of the Earth that is north of the Equator.
- Europe A continent of the Northern Hemisphere. There are 44 countries in Europe.
- Continent A very large area of land that consists of several countries. There are 7 continents: Asia Africa Europe North America South America Australia Antarctica
- Population all the people who live in a country or area
- Settler/settlement people who migrate to a new place. When people start a community, this is a settlement.
- Tribes a group of people of the same race, language, and custom.

- Country An area of land that has its own government.
- Capital city The city where the government of a country functions. They are usually large cities but not always the largest city in the country.
- Human Geography Geography that focuses on human activity
- such as population, life expectancy, settlements, food, trade etc Physical Geography- Geography that focuses on the natural world
- such as rivers, mountains, volcanoes and other physical features
  Trade the activity of buying, selling, or exchanging goods or services
- Language the communication of a particular country or people
- Empire a number of individual nations that are all controlled by the government or ruler of one particular country.
- Fortress a castle or other large strong building, or a well-protected place, which is intended to be difficult for enemies to enter.
