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Recognise that light from the sun can be dangerous and that there are ways to protect their eyes.

Recognise that shadows are formed when the light from a light source is blocked by an opaque object.

Find patterns in the way that the size of shadows change.

Links to prior learning

Applying understanding of ways to protect and look after our bodies and skills from Year 2 of finding links and patterns.

Links to diet and health in Yr 2 and the requirements of animals including humans to survive and be healthy.

Investigate the way in which water is transported within plants.

Explore the part that flowers play in the life cycle of flowering plants, including pollination, seed formation and seed dispersal.

Links to prior learning

Building on Yr 2 work about the requirements of plants to live and grow.

Compare and group together a variety of everyday materials on the basis of whether they are attracted to a magnet, and identify some magnetic materials.

Describe magnets as having two poles.

Predict whether two magnets will attract or repel each other, depending on which poles are facing.

Links to prior learning

Building on grouping of materials done in Year 2 based on their properties.

Summary

<u>Describe the simple functions of the basic parts of the digestive system in humans.</u>

<u>Identify the different types of teeth in</u> humans and their simple functions.

Construct and interpret a variety of food chains, identifying producers, predators and prey.

Links to prior learning

Building on Y2 simple food chains and sources of food.

How has the river Humber affected life in our area?

<u>Summary</u>

Compare and group materials together, according to whether they are solids, liquids or gases.

Observe that some materials change state when they are heated or cooled, and measure or research the temperature at which this happens in degrees Celsius (°C)

Identify the part played by evaporation and condensation in the water cycle and associate the rate of evaporation with temperature.

Links to prior learning

Year 2/3 skills of comparing and grouping materials together based on their properties

Why did the Vikings and Anglo-Saxons battle for Britain?

Summary

Identify how sounds are made, associating some of them with something vibrating.

Recognise that vibrations from sounds travel through a medium to the ear.

Find patterns between the pitch of a sound and features of the object that produced it.

Find patterns between the volume of a sound and the strength of the vibrations that produced it

Recognise that sounds get fainter as the distance from the sound source increases.

Links to prior learning

Using Year 3 skill of finding links and patterns. Knowledge from KS1 of our bodies to understand how our ears are used to hear.

What makes the Earth angry?

Summary

Identify common appliances that run on electricity.

Construct a simple series electrical circuit, identifying and naming its basic parts, including cells, wires, bulbs, switches and buzzers.

Identify whether or not a lamp will light in a simple series circuit, based on whether or not the lamp is part of a complete loop with a battery.

Recognise that a switch opens and closes a circuit and associate this with whether or not a lamp lights in a simple series circuit.

Recognise some common conductors and insulators, and associate metals with being good conductors.

Links to prior learning

Link to properties of materials in KS1, children will be able to associate being conductive with metal.

What happened to the Mayans?

<u>Summary</u>

Recognise that living things can be grouped in a variety of ways.

Explore and use classification keys to help group, identify and name a variety of living things in their local and wider environment.

Recognise that environments can change and that this can sometimes pose dangers to living things.

Links to prior learning

Building on YR 2 work on habitats and classification with given classification keys.

Links to prior learning

More broad classification leading on from Yr 1, 2 and 4.

Recognise the impact of diet, exercise, drugs and lifestyle on the way their bodies function.

Describe the ways in which nutrients and water are transported within animals, including humans.

Links to prior learning

Diet from Year 2-3

are seen because they give out or reflect light into the eye.

Explain that we see things because light travels from light sources to our eyes or from light sources to objects and then to our eyes.

Use the idea that light travels in straight lines to explain why shadows have the same shape as the objects that cast them.

Links to prior learning

Building on Yr 3 how light travels and is reflected.

Recognise that living things produce offspring of the same kind, but normally offspring vary and are not identical to their parents.

Identify how animals and plants are adapted to suit their environment in different ways and that adaptation may lead to evolution.

Links to prior learning

Adaptation in Yr 2 looked at how animals are suited to their environments. Now children are looking at how these adaptations can lead to evolution.

Compare and give reasons for variations in how components function, including the brightness of bulbs, the loudness of buzzers and the on/off position of switches.

<u>Use recognised symbols when</u> representing a simple circuit in a diagram.
