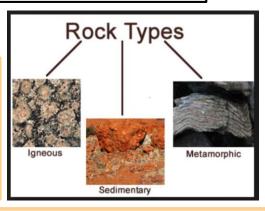

# Classification

#### Hard or Soft

Some rocks, like granite, are incredibly hard and can only be cut or split with specialist tools. On the other hand, clay is soft and can be easilu moulded.

#### Durable

Rocks that are durable are more resistant to weathering (being eroded that is broken down - by rain and wind). More durable rocks, such as marble, have been chosen to create buildings and for outside use for this

#### Permeable or Impermeable

If a rock is permeable, for example pumice, this means it allows water to pass through it. Rocks that are impermeable do not allow water to pass through.



#### Densitu

Density measures how 'bulky' the rock is (how tightly packed the molecules are), not how heavy. Density can be checked by testing the buoyancy (whether they float in water) of rocks. High density rocks sink whereas low density rocks float.

What should I already know? Pupils should be aware of ways to protect and look after our bodies and have skills from Year 2 of finding links and patterns.

#### National Curriculum objectives:

- recognise that they need light in order to see things and that dark is the absence of light notice that light is reflected from surfaces
- recognise that light from the sun can be dangerous and that there are ways to protect their eyes
- recognise that shadows are formed when the light from a light source is blocked by a solid object
- find patterns in the way that the size of shadows change.



## How does Great Britain fit in Europe?

We need light so that we can see things around us in the world

How do we see things? The light bounces off the object (reflects)... **Light** travels in a ...and enters our eyes through the pupil so straight line

shadow

Sunlight can damage your eyes. Protect them by wearing sunglasses or a hat. NEVER look directly at the sun

Our **pupils** change size to either let in more light (if it is dark) or less light (if it is bright)





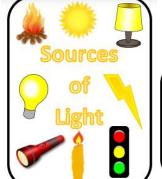
You can change the shape of a shadow by moving the light source

All mammals (including humans), birds, fish, reptiles and mphibians have a skeleton inside their bodies (vertebrates)

Animals that do not have a skeleton on the inside are called invertebrates. Some have a skeleton on the outside (exoskeleton), whilst some have no skeleton whatsoever!







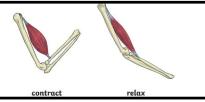
## Joints

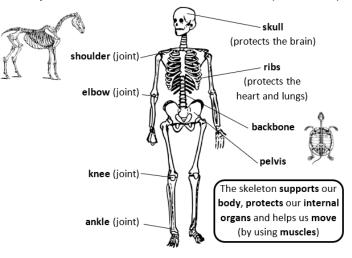
The skeleton bends at joints such as the shoulder, elbow, knee and ankle where two or more bones join together

## Muscles

Muscles are attached to the skeleton to help us move. They either contract (bunch up) or relax (go back to normal) to move the bones

Skeletal muscles work in pairs to move the bones they are attached to by taking turns to contract (get shorter) and relax (get longer).





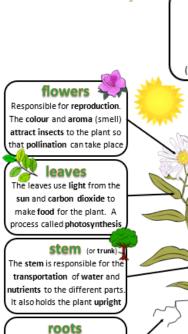

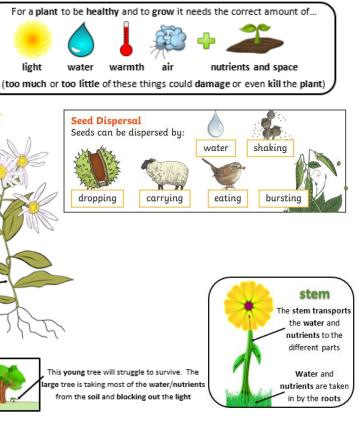

#### National Curriculum objectives:

- compare how things move on different surfaces
- notice that some forces need contact between two objects, but magnetic forces can act at a distance
- observe how magnets attract or repel each other and attract some materials and not others
- compare and group together a variety of everyday materials on the basis of whether they are attracted to a magnet, and identify some magnetic materials
- describe magnets as having two poles
- predict whether two magnets will attract or repel each other, depending on which poles are facing.

# **Magnets**

Magnetism is an invisible force. A magnet can either attract or repel other magnets

Opposite poles of a magnet will attract each other (pull together)





Similar poles of a magnet will repel each other (push away)





Objects can be sorted by whether they are attracted to a magnet or not





(only metals that contain iron are attracted to a magnet)

#### North Pole



The Earth is like a giant magnet with a magnetic north and south pole.

A compass points towards the north pole because of the Earth's magnetic field



Magnets have a north pole (N) and a south pole (S)

Magnetism, like gravity. is different to most forces because it does not need contact with an object to make it move



Magnets come in lots or different shapes and sizes. Some magnets will be stronger than others and create bigger pushing or pulling forces



#### Key vocabulary

Friction- a force that acts between two surfaces or objects that are moving or trying to move across each other Magnet- an object which produces a magnetic force that pulls certain objects towards it

Magnetic field-Objects which are attracted to a magnet are magnetic. Objects containing iron, nickel or cobalt metals are magnetic

Poles- north and south poles are found at different ends of a magnet

Repel-repulsion is a force that pushes objects away

Attract- attraction is a force that pulls objects together

# xForces x

Forces are pushes and pulls. No object will move unless a force acts upon it



Friction also produces heat. You can feel this if you rub your hands together



Friction is a useful force. The friction between our shoes and the floor stop us from slipping.

# Friction Friction is a force between two surfaces when they slide across each other pushing force Friction works in the opposite direction and slows the object down Different surfaces produce different levels of friction PUSH -----

This toy car has been pushed with the same amount of force.

Smoother surfaces produce less friction
