Abolition: Efforts to end slavery through legal acts and movements aimed at outlawing the buying, selling, and owning of slaves and granting freedom to enslaved individuals.

Caribbean: A region consisting of numerous islands in the Caribbean Sea. It was a significant destination for enslaved Africans who were forced to work on plantations during the transatlantic slave trade.

Cargo: Goods or commodities transported by ship or other means. In the slave trade, cargo refers to the enslaved Africans who were treated as commodities and transported as human cargo.

Captives: Captives are individuals who have been captured or taken as prisoners.

Colonialism: Colonialism is a system where one country exercises control over another territory. In the slave trade, European colonial powers played a major role in capturing, transporting, and exploiting enslaved Africans.

Emancipation: Emancipation refers to the granting of freedom or liberation to enslaved individuals. In the slave trade, emancipation involved legal and social processes leading to the abolition of slavery and the liberation of enslaved Africans.

Human rights: Human rights are basic rights and freedoms that all individuals are entitled to. The slave trade and slavery violated the fundamental human rights of enslaved Africans.

Kingston Upon Hull: Hull is a city in England, known for being a major port city on the Humber Estuary.

Legacy: Legacy refers to the lasting impact of a historical event or system.

Middle Passage: The Middle Passage was the horrific journey in which enslaved Africans were transported across the Atlantic Ocean from Africa to the Americas, characterised by overcrowding, unsanitary conditions, and high mortality rates.

Plantation owners: Plantation owners were wealthy individuals who owned and operated the plantations, benefiting economically from the labour of enslaved Africans.

Plantations: Plantations were large agricultural estates in the Americas where cash crops like sugar, tobacco, cotton, and coffee were grown. Enslaved Africans were often forced to work on these plantations.

Slave trade: The slave trade involved capturing, buying, selling, and transporting enslaved Africans across the Atlantic to the Americas and other regions for forced labour.

Slavery: Slavery is a system where individuals are treated as property and forced to work without consent or payment.


Transatlantic: Transatlantic refers to anything related to crossing the Atlantic Ocean.

Hull, also known as Kingston Upon Hull, played a significant role in the slave trade as a major port city in England. Its location made it a hub for trade, including the transportation of enslaved Africans.

William Wilberforce, a prominent British abolitionist, played a crucial role in the movement to end the slave trade. He was a Member of Parliament representing Hulland became a leading advocate for abolition, fighting for the passage of the Slave Trade Act of 1807, which outlawed the slave trade in the British Empire.
