	Summary Children will know that dynamics can change the effect a sound has on an audience and they will know that long and short sounds of a spoken phrase can be represented by a rhythm. They will know that structure is the organisation of a piece of music and that the tempo can be changed to achieve a different effect. Children will understand that an instrument can be matched to an animal noise based on its timbre. History Summary Children will know that deciding the structure of music when composing can help use create interesting music with contrasting sections. They know that combining different instruments and different rhythms when we compose can create layers of sound we call texture. They will know that a loop in music is a repeated melody or rhythm. They will know that changing the dynamics of a musical phrase or motif can change the texture of a piece of music.	How has the river Humber affected life in our area? Geography/science Summary Children will know when you sing without accompaniment it is called a capella. They will understand that harmony means playing two notes at the same time that usually sound good together. They know that an ostinato is a musical pattern that is repeated over and overs, a vocal ostinato is a pattern created with your voice. They will know that performance directions are words added to music notation to tell the performers how to play. Links to prior learning	Why did the Vikings and Anglo-Saxons battle for Britain? History Summary Children will know that rock and roll music uses blues chord structures with a fast tempo and strong vocals. They will know that a bass line is the lowest pitch line of notes in a piece of music, a walking bassline, where patterns of notes go up and down again, is common in rock and roll. They will know that playing in time means all performers playing together at the same speed. They will know that playing in time requires playing the notes for the correct duration as well as at the correct speed. Links to prior learning	What makes the earth angry? Geography/science Summary Children will understand that musical motifs (repeated patterns) are used as a building block in many well-known pieces of music for example Beethoven's fifth symphony. They will know that transposing a melody means changing its key, making it higher or lower pitched. They will know that a motif can be adapted by changing the notes, the rhythm or the order or notes. 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	Why should rainforests be important to us all? Geography Summary Children will know the history and key features of gamelan music. They will understand the concept of an octave, recognise this on staff notation and play it at the correct pitch. They will be able to play tuned percussion with the correct technique – glockenspiels. Links to prior learning Kapow Instrumental scheme - Indonesia	How did WW2 impact the local area? History Summary Children will know that the conductor beats time to help performers work together. They will understand that improvisation means making up music on the spot. They will understand that texture can be created by adding or removing instruments in a piece and can create the effect of dynamic change. They will know that timbre can also be thought of as "tone colour" and can be described in many ways. History Summary Children will know that "pack up your troubles in your old kit bag" and "we'll meet again" are examples of popular WW2 songs. They will know that the Solfa syllables represent the pitches in an octave. Children will know a "counter subject" or "counter melody" provides contrast to the main melody. Children will know that a counter melody is different to harmony because it uses a different rhythm as well as complementary notes. Geography Summary Children will know that a film soundtrack includes the background music and any songs in a film. They will understand that "major" key signatures use note pitches that sound cheerful and upbeat. They will understand that "minor" key signatures use note pitches that can suggest sadness and tension. They will know that graphic notation means writing down music using your choice of pictures or symbols but staff notation means music written more formally on lines called "staves". Links to prior learning Kapow Film music	How will the Humber go carbon neutral? Geography Summary Children will know that a theme is a main melody in a piece of music. They will know that variations in music are when a main melody is changed in some way throughout the piece. They will know that "The young persons guide to the orchestra" was written in 1945 by Benjamin Britten.
