2A sentences: It was an overgrown, messy garden.

Emotion, comma: Desperately, she screamed for help.

Verb, person: Running, Sarah tried to catch the ghost.

If, if, if, then: If the alarm had gone off, if the bus had been on time, if he hadn't fallen over, then he would have been on time.

With an action, then more action: With a smile, Joe waved goodbye.

<u>**3 -ed**</u>: Confused, troubled, worried, she didn't know what had happened.

Noun, who/where/which: Snakes, which scare me, are not always poisonous.

<u>2 pairs:</u> Quickly and quietly, silently and carefully he tiptoed out of the house.

<u>**3 bad – questions:**</u> Cold, dark, airlessness – which would kill the spaceman first?

<u>Noun – adjective pair – sentence:</u> *Glass – fragile and dangerous – must be handled with care.*

Outside (Inside): I was delighted (but I felt scared that something was about to go wrong).
