Kev achievements to

date:

In 2024 Inmans received the Platinum School Games Mark for the 3rd time.

There continues to be a range of after school sport options including archery and musical theatre.

We continue to enter almost 100% of sporting competitions in our cluster and increasingly enter more than one team.

Pupils continue to benefit from a range of intra-school tournaments throughout the year linked to the PE curriculum. This gives purpose to their learning and allows them to experience full size competitive games.

Our SEND pupils enjoyed an inter-school competition in which the children were particularly successful. Additional equipment is purchased to support SEND pupils.

As pupils continue to wear their PE kit to school on PE days, no learning time is lost due to getting changed. The standard of skills assessed in PE has continued to increase with more children achieving greater depth in this area.

The Inmans coins continues to give sports competitions a boost of energy. Also, a competitive element to sports day also encouraged pupils to compete.

Pupils achievements continue to be tracked on an assessment tool which means we can thoroughly assess every aspect of PE for children. This allows gaps to be identified and measures implemented to mitigate these.

The school has good links with local sporting groups and can signpost children easily. We have an increasing number of pupils accessing these activities and taking their sport further through trials and competitions.

The school runs HAF sessions and ensures that swimming features are part of the summer offer. It increases pupil confidence in the water, meaning by the time they access Y4 swimming, they are confident and ready to progress.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need.

As a school we would like to ensure that more children are able to demonstrate leadership qualities through PE. This will include extending play leader work and appointing PE Ambassadors to support in a school competitions.

We would like to increased parental involvement in PE and plan to introduce a range of 'stay and' sessions in the summer term 25.

We intend to improve the provision of forest school as outdoor learning and promotion of physical activity.




