2011 – 2012 – Spending of the Pupil Premium Allocation

- All classes in our school have additional support for the whole school day. This ensures that the needs of our pupils can be met in small groups.
- We have a dedicated team of support staff who work across the school to ensure access to the curriculum by the provision of intervention in reading, writing and mathematics for children who are not making expected levels of attainment.
- We provide after school clubs and subsidise trips and visits to enrich the curriculum and make sure that all children have additional learning experiences outside the normal school day.

2012 – 2013 Spending of the Pupil Premium Allocation

- Subsidising cost of school trips throughout the year.
- Additional 1:1 tuition support for year 6
- Purchased ipads to work with small groups
- Additional Teaching Assistant hours to work on maths, english and reading.
- Investment in R.W.I. training and resources
- Training in Every Child a Reader

The Pupil Premium is an allocation of additional funding provided to schools to support specific groups of children who are vulnerable to possible underachievement. These include pupils who are entitled to free school meals, those looked after by the authority and children of armed service personnel. The intended effect of this funding is to accelerate progress and raise attainment.

In most cases the Pupil Premium is allocated to schools and is clearly identifiable. It is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium, allocated to schools per FSM pupil, is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility.

Impact (2011 – 2012)

- Attainment at FS2 was increased with more children achieving expected levels across the EYFS curriculum.
- By the end of Key Stage 1 89% of children achieved a Level 2 in Reading, Writing and Maths. A higher percentage of children achieved a Level 2b (national expectation) across all three areas and 22% of children achieved a Level 3 in Reading and Maths
- 93% of children in Year 6 made 2 levels progress in English and Maths which is above national expectation.
- National standards were met for achievement of Level 4 at end of KS2 in Maths.
- Progress for pupils eligible for pupil premium is, on the whole, good. Progress data and school evaluation indicates that writing will be a focus for 2012 – 2013.
