

School Sports Funding

Rationale

Shay Lane Primary School recognise that all pupils regardless of their background should have equal access to a curriculum which will enable them to reach their full potential.

The sports funding premium is a Government initiative that targets extra money to all pupils and all schools.

The Government does not dictate how schools should spend this money, but it is clear that schools will need to employ the strategies that they know will support these pupils to increase their active participation in sports.

Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sports, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Possible uses for the funding might include:

- Hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work with primary teachers when teaching PE.
- Paying for professional development opportunities for teachers in PE and sport
- Providing cover to release primary teachers for professional development in PE and sport
- Running sport competitions, or increasing pupils' participation in the School Games
- Buying quality assured professional development modules or materials for PE and sport
- Providing places for pupils on after school sports clubs and holiday clubs
- Pooling the additional funding with that of other local schools

Sports Funding Allocation

The current years allocation is £8000.00, plus an additional £5 per pupil.

Total £8750.00.

Use of funding will be monitored throughout the year to ensure pupils receive high quality PE lessons and coaching.

Impact will be measured against the proposed outcomes outlined above.

Extra after school coaching costs will be paid out of the school budget.

What is the effect of the premium on pupil's PE and sports participation and attainment?

Children from year 1 to year 6 have accessed a wide range of after school sports clubs (eg. dance, football, kwik cricket, athletics, volleyball, hockey, tag rugby...) which had been subsidised to ensure maximum participation. Club numbers ranged from 15 – 25 pupils for each individual club per half term! Children increased awareness of active and healthy lifestyle.

Children from KS1 and KS2 have competed in a number of level 2 inter-school competitions (eg. benchball, rugby, football, hockey, netball..) going on to represent their school and cluster at level 3 competition in hockey and netball.

Children have experience a range of different sporting and PE activities through high quality PE lessons deliver by specialist teacher supporting classroom teacher through to increase children's interest, skills and participation in a range of different sports.

How we will make sure these improvements are sustainable?

Continue to increased participation and engagement through offering a range of after school clubs from Y1 – Y6.

Entering teams in all inter-school competition and raising the profile of sports in school.
Encourage children to represent the school (some for the first time – travelling community).

Continue teacher professional development through progression of competency in PE and school sports throughout the school. Children continue to have access high quality P.E lessons whilst providing CPD for classroom teacher.
