

Kirkby and Great Broughton CE (VA) Primary School
Sports Funding Statement 2017 - 2018

Since September 2013 all maintained schools have received sports funding in addition to their school budget. This funding is to raise standards in PE and sport and to increase pupil participation in sporting activity to develop healthy lifestyles.

In the academic year **2017/18**, our school was awarded a further £16,000 + £5 per pupil.

Suggested use of Funding	What we have done
Pooling the additional funding with that of other local schools.	The school has part funded a Service Level Agreement with other schools within the Stokesley Cluster to employ a School Sports Partnership Coordinator, who arranges inter schools sports competitions and events. (£2,000)
Supporting and engaging the least active children.	Continue to provide a range of extra curricular sporting activities. Subsidising the weekly multi-sports clubs to ensure high participation. (£2,000)
Hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work with primary teachers when teaching PE.	Hire of the swimming pool/lifeguards/swimming instructors to work alongside school staff in delivering swimming lessons for Y3/4 children. All children in Y3 and Y4 are attending a full term of swimming during the Spring term. (£525) A portion of the grant will be allocated to hire the service of a lawn tennis coach to work with KS1 and KS2 pupils and their teachers during the Summer term. This is to develop their tennis skills and encourage the participation of sport outside of school. (£200)
Organisation of a curriculum enrichment fitness week.	Hire additional sports coaches to lead fitness sessions and taster sessions encouraging children to follow up new sporting opportunities out of school. This will include Zumba, taniis, dance, hockey and netball (£170)

The sports funding will also be used to purchase new sports equipment and replace existing equipment for cricket and tag-rugby.

In the academic year **2016/17**, our school was awarded a further £8000 + £5 per pupil.

All children in Y3 and Y4 are attending a full term of swimming during the Spring term. (£525) A portion of the grant will be allocated to hire the service of a lawn tennis coach to work with KS1 pupils and their teachers during the Summer term. This is to develop their tennis skills and encourage the participation of sport outside of school. (£100)

The sports funding grant also facilitated the purchase of four new gym mats to replace existing stock.

(tag rugby, multi-skills, cross country, kwik cricket, netball, rounders, football, quad kids athletics and swimming). Many of the events were 'play days' giving the opportunity for the whole class to attend and benefit from quality coaching and tuition.

All sports clubs are well attended; approximately 25 children (Y1-Y3) regularly attended the Tuesday club and approximately 30 children (Y4-Y6) attended the Thursday club. The sports funding grant also facilitated the purchase of new footballs and netballs required by the well attended football and netball clubs which are run by staff and parent volunteers.
