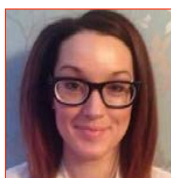
Abigail Beasley – Parent governor

In February I attended Warwickshire training for chairs of school governors along with the chairs of Walsgrave, Whittle and Hearsall academies. It was a useful

day of sharing ideas for good chairing practise and self-reflection on our own skills. Later in the term, we met with Mrs Docking to discuss some of these ideas on self-evaluation and other areas where we could improve governance further.

The spring Local Authority briefing provided an oversight of how schools need to be ready for new General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) and how the LA was supporting schools with these new regulations. Funding was also at the top of the agenda and we are all still aware of the challenges that continue to face schools budgets locally and nationally.

As SEND link governor I have met twice this term with Mrs Collett to monitor the progress of our SEN children. I have been pleased to see that the progress they are making is in line with their peers and the new Individual Education Plans are more 'user friendly' in setting targets and marking the children's achievements. I also enjoyed watching the School Council's special assembly for Autism Week. The Council explained autism to the school in terms of our similarities and differences and how we should celebrate both, including the ones that cannot be seen. It was very powerful hearing these young role models talk sensitively and maturely about autism and I'm sure it had more impact on their friends than any talk given by a grown-up. Well done!
