

Litir do Luchd-ionnsachaidh

How ye doo'een? Ach yir se-en it. How's yerself? No bad – it's a smasheen day, ri'eenuff.

Tha mi a' tùiseachadh na Litreach an-diugh le beagan Beurla. **Buinidh i do phriomh bhaile na Gàidhealtachd**, Inbhir Nis.

O chionn ghoirid, fhuair mi leabhran a chaidh fhoillseachadh le Fòram Eachdraidh Ionadail Inbhir Nis. 'S e an tiotal a th' air an leabhran '*Old Inverness Words and Phrases*'. Tha e a' toirt sùil air Beurla Inbhir Nis. Tha e gu math inntinneach.

Tha cuid de na faclan sònraichte do Inbhir Nis. Mar eisimpleir – *clacher*. Chan e neach a tha ag obair gu proifeiseanta le clachan, ach cuideigin a tha a' toirt taic don sgioba ball-coise ionadail – Clachnacuddin FC! Agus *salachs* – chan urrainn dhomh a ràdh am bi am facial sin a' nochdadadh ann an àiteachan eile. Ach tha e a' ciallachadh '*Salvation Army*' – *salachs*.

Nochdaidh cuid de na faclan ann an sgìrean eile – gu sònraichte air a' Ghalltachd. Mar eisimpleir – *scaffies* airson luchd-glanaidh sgudail agus *trachled* – air a shàrachadh no air a chlaoidheadh le obair.

Tha earrann anns an leabhran mu fhaclan a thàinig a-steach a Bheurla Inbhir Nis bhon Ghàidhlig. Is beag an t-iongnadh, oir bha Ghàidhlig aig a' mhòr-chuid de mhuinntir a' bhaile thairis air ceudan bhliadhnaichean.

Seo eisimpleir bhon bhriathrachas aca, leis a' Bheurla ionadail an toiseach agus an uair sin am mìneachadh. *Amadan* – *a fool*. Uill, tha sin gu follaiseach bhon Ghàidhlig agus 's e facial a chluinnear tric gu leòr fhathast. Cuideachd *groyk* – *a fool, an awkward person* – bhon Ghàidhlig *gròig*. *Bodach* – *an old man* – agus *cailleach* – *an old woman*. Tha an dà fhacal sin air an cleachdadadh ann am Beurla air feadh na Gàidhealtachd – co-dhiù am measg dhaoine a bhuiteas don Ghàidhealtachd.

Cyarack – *left-handed*. Chan eil an leabhran a' mìneachadh mar a bhios daoine ga chleachdadadh. Ann an Ghàidhlig bidh sinn ag ràdh gu bheil cuideigin leis a' chearraig no gu bheil a' chearrag aige. *Doorchan* – *a pine cone*. Tha sin a' tighinn bhon Ghàidhlig *durcan*. *Dossan* – *fringe of hair on the forehead* – bhon Ghàidhlig *dosan*.

Tha am facial *cappach* air an liosta cuideachd, a' ciallachadh *toothless*. Tha am facial Ghàidhlig *cabach* a' ciallachadh 'gun fhiacan no le beul grànda'. Tha fhios gu

bheil e stèidhichte air an fhacal *cab*. Tha cab a' ciallachadh 'beul' ach tha faclair Dwelly ag innse seo dhuinn: '*cab – mouth ill-set with teeth*'.

Ann an Inbhir Nis, canar *mappach* airson *very drunk and confused*. Ann an Gàidhlig tha *mabach* a' ciallachadh '*stammering, stuttering*' – tha e co-cheangailte ri cainnt ach cha leig e leas a bhith co-cheangailte ri deoch làdir.

Tha an abairt *mo-hooker* ann am Beurla Inbhir Nis, a' ciallachadh *it doesn't matter*. Tha sin gu follaiseach bhon abairt Ghàidhlig *ma thogair* leis an dearbh chiall. Bidh e inntinneach faicinn dè mhaireas beò de na seann fhaclan is abairtean Gàidhlig ann am Beurla Inbhir Nis anns an ùine fhada.

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Faclan na Litreach: Fòram Eachdraidh Ionadail Inbhir Nis: *Inverness Local History Forum*; luchd-glanaidh sgudail: *rubbish collectors*; gu follaiseach: *obviously*.

Abairtean na Litreach: cò às a tha a' chainnt sin?: *where is that speech from?*; math dh'fhaodte gun aithnich sibh i: *perhaps you will recognise it*; neach a tha ag obair gu proifeiseanta le clachan: *somebody that works professionally with stones*; cuideigin a tha a' toirt taic don sgioba ball-coise ionadail: *somebody that supports the local football team*; gu sònraichte air a' Ghalltachd: *particularly in the Lowlands*; is beag an t-iongnadh, oir bha Gàidhlig aig a' mhòr-chuid de mhuinntir a' bhaile thairis air ceudan bhliadhnaichean: *it's hardly surprising, because the majority of the townsfolk spoke Gaelic for centuries*; 's e facal a chluinnear tric gu leòr fhathast: *it's a word that is heard often enough still*; am measg dhaoine a bhuiteas don Ghàidhealtachd: *among people who belong to the Highlands*; gu bheil cuideigin leis a' chearraig: *that somebody is left-handed*; gun fhiacan no le beul grànda: *toothless or possessing an ugly mouth*; cha leig e leas a bhith co-cheangailte ri deoch làdir: *it doesn't need to be connected to strong drink*; bidh e inntinneach faicinn dè mhaireas beò de na seann fhaclan is abairtean Gàidhlig ann am Beurla Inbhir Nis anns an ùine fhada: *it will be interesting to see what survives of the old Gaelic words and phrases that in the English of Inverness in the long term*.

Puing-chànan na Litreach: Tha mi a' **tòiseachadh na Litreach** an-diugh le beagan Beurla: *I am starting the Litir today with a bit of English. Litir is a slender feminine noun that broadens with an -ach ending in the genitive singular case. It is here in the genitive singular with the article following the verbal noun a' tòiseachadh. Without the article we would leave it in its nominative form e.g. bidh mi a' tòiseachadh litir.*

Gnàthas-cainnt na Litreach: Buinidh i do phriomh bhaile na Gàidhealtachd: *it belongs to the Highland capital.*
