#### DIRECTORS' REPORT

To the members.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

We have pleasure in submitting for your approval the Report for the Half-Year ended 6th March 1976.

- 1. SALES—The total turnover, which includes the sales of the Lincoln Co-operative Chemists Limited, amounted to £10,305,697. This is an increase of £1,775,746 or 20.8% when compared with the corresponding Half-Year. Our shops have found it difficult to sell more goods than last year, although higher prices mean they are taking more cash. There have been pressures on the consumers' pockets from essential services and this has made it harder to achieve the extra sales which are necessary to cover increased costs. We are fortunate in having a number of different spheres of activity and being so successful in our larger departments, namely Grocery and Dairy. The Grocery Department in particular has responded to an aggressive marketing policy that has produced a good increase in volume terms. The Electrical and some other departments have had to cope with difficult trading conditions following the accelerated buying that occurred before the commencement of the higher V.A.T. rates, and the public has not yet adjusted its sense of values to V.A.T. at 25%. During a time of growing discomfort in the retail sector of the economy, we should find the Society's interim results very reassuring.
- 2. MEMBERSHIP—The present membership is 57,707.
- CAPITAL AND RESERVES—The Reserve Fund has increased to £2,600,000 by the addition
  of £178,745 from revenue and £21,255 from the surplus on sale of items of a capital nature.
  This can be said to have maintained the value of the fund in accordance with the rate of inflation.
  Cash and investments have increased by £199,350 to £2,553,698. Members' share and loan
  capital has decreased by £10,699.
- 4. DEVELOPMENT—The policy of continually rebuilding, improving and altering established branches has been maintained and, although a real trading recovery could still be some way off, we shall be well placed, thanks to our development programme, to reap the benefit when it comes.
  - (a) Spalding—The first phase of the re-development of the Winsover Road premises was opened in November and is doing very well. The second and final stage is due for completion on 13th May.
  - (b) Woodhall Spa—The new Branch is planned to open on 26th April and the two residential flats to be occupied in June.
  - (c) Gainsborough-Work has commenced on the new funeral parlour in North Street.
  - (d) Ruskington—The shop adjoining our Branch premises, which was acquired some time ago, has been merged into an enlarged retail unit.
  - (e) North Hykeham—The new Chemist section is now open and will serve the needs of the new Health Centre. A flat has also been erected on the roof of the Branch.
  - (f) Sincil Street Superstore—Negotiations with the City Council are proceeding and our Architect's plans for the area have been deposited with the Planning Officer. We hope to be in a position to make a start on the site towards the end of the year.
- 5. DIRECTOR'S RETIREMENT—After twenty years' service on the Board, Mr. W. R. Walker retires as a Director at the Half-Yearly Meeting of Members on 17th May 1976. This marks the end of an era unrivalled in the history of the Society; he was President in 1960-1, 1967-8, and also an employee for fifty-one years. The whole of his adult life has been devoted to serving the best interests of the Society and his considerable experience and loyalty will be greatly missed. He carries with him into retirement the warm thanks and best wishes of all who have had the pleasure to be associated with him.

- DIVIDEND STAMPS—The redemption value of dividend stamps issued during the Half-Year amounted to £146,343. In addition a sum of £2,125 has been given as discount in lieu of dividend on funeral accounts.
- DEATH BENEFITS—Claims amounting to £3,165 have been paid during the Half-Year, the average payment being £16-58.
- LINCOLN CORN EXCHANGE & MARKET COMPANY LIMITED—The Society, through its subsidiary company Cosim of Lincoln Limited, has now acquired a majority holding in this Company. Plans are now being considered to renovate and upgrade the properties over the next few years and we shall commence with the Exchange Arcade, which is nearest to the pedestrianised area of High Street. We would describe this acquisition as opportune and valuable.
- 9. SELECTIVE PRICE RESTRAINT SCHEME—Members will be pleased to learn that the Co-operative Movement was represented on the Consortium which has been in consultation with Government Departments to consider this Scheme, known as "Price Check", and will agree that we are right to support it and have voluntarily extended it. This requires that we do not increase the retail selling price of any items included in the Scheme, unless the supplier's price to us is increased within the 5% limit. The Scheme extends over a six month period starting 16th February 1976 and should prove to the housewife that inflation is beginning to slow down.



#### DIRECTORS' REPORT

To the Members

Ladies and Gentlemen.

We have pleasure in submitting, for your consideration and approval, the Report and Statement of Accounts in respect of the financial year ended 4 September 1976.

- 1. SALES—The total turnover, which includes that of the Lincoln Co-operative Chemists Limited, amounted to £20,800,440, an increase of £3,242,704 or 18-5% when compared with the previous year. The food departments have contributed most of this increase, the Grocery and Dairy Departments in particular recording a most successful year. The whole of the non-food sector, in common with other retailers, has suffered in the second half of the year for a variety of reasons. The down-turn of the economy has inevitably led consumers to cut out inessential items and comparisons are distorted by the 1975 post-Budget buying spree which took place before the higher rates of VAT came into effect. The hot summer weather has proved to be a boon to sales of freezers and leisure goods, but not conducive to the sale of rainwear and coats. However, the mixture of our activities is a defensive strength in these circumstances and it is most encouraging to note that we have held on to our sales growth in total and shown increases in excess of the rate of inflation.
- MEMBERSHIP—The present membership is 57,273.
- 3. CAPITAL AND RESERVES—We have continued to further strengthen the Balance Sheet by applying strict controls on stocks, debtors and capital expenditure; this will enable us to finance our expansion out of a healthy cash flow. The Reserve Fund has increased to £2,850,000 by the addition of £395,341 from revenue, £44,155 from the sale of surplus assets and £10,504 from over-provision for dividend stamps. Cash and investments have increased by £487,826 to £2,841,603. Members' share and loan capital has increased by £6,718 to £1,447,447. Share capital is covered 2-4 times by Reserves.
- DIVIDEND—The redemption value of stamps issued during the year is £292,247. This represents an increase
  of £5,935 or 2% over the previous year. The amount of discount given in lieu of dividend on funeral accounts
  was £4.842.
- DEATH BENEFITS—Claims amounting to £6,641 have been paid during the year, the average payment being £16.65.

#### 6. DEVELOPMENT-

- (a) Spalding—The new Winsover Road Branch premises were completed on 25 May 1976 and have made shopping a pleasure to our members who trade there. We are delighted with the high level of turnover, which has made the development an outstanding success.
- (b) Woodhall Spa—The new Branch was opened on 13 April 1976 and has fully justified the cost. The flats will be completed during early September 1976.
- (c) Gainsborough—The new Funeral Parlour will be completed and in service by the end of September 1976.
- (d) Wragby-Extensions and improvements to the shop commence in September 1976.
- (e) Brant Road Housing Scheme—The four houses comprising this development are due for completion early 1977.
- (f) Sincil Street Superstore—Members will be pleased to learn that we received planning permission on 1 July 1976 to erect a 35,000 sq. ft. Superstore. We will be taking occupation of the site early in 1977 and the building programme will be planned for the store to open at the earliest possible date, viz. around June 1978.
- (g) Lincoln Corn Exchange & Market Company Limited—The refurbishing of the Exchange Arcade building is due for completion at the end of October 1976 and is visual evidence of our determination to clean up this area and make it most attractive to the general public.

7. REVISION OF DIRECTORS' EXPENSES—Delegation Fees, £2·00 for a full day and £1·00 for a half day, were last reviewed in February 1971 and are no longer realistic in view of the pressure of inflation that has occurred since this date. This year's Co-operative Congress overwhelmingly approved that members of Committees of the Co-operative Union be paid £4·00 per day. We ask you to approve recommendations for revision of expenses to members of the Board of Directors and such other Committees appointed by the Members of the Society as follows:—

(a) Delegation Fee—Full Day: £4-00, Half Day: £2-00, Evening: £1-00.

- (b) Directors also to be reimbursed for meals on journey and expenses incurred in travelling where the most economical and convenient method of transport has been used.
- (c) Hotel expenses to be paid for delegations involving overnight absence from home.
- (d) Payment for loss of earnings upon production of a statement supplied by the employing organisation.

#### NOTES ON CONSOLIDATED REVENUE ACCOUNT

- The Group Accounts include Lincoln Co-operative Society Limited and the wholly-owned subsidiary Lincoln Co-operative Chemists Limited. The accounts of Cosim of Lincoln Limited and its wholly-owned subsidiary Lincoln Corn Exchange and Market Company Limited have not been consolidated as their activities bear no relationship to the Society's normal trading activities.
