Editorial By Mick Ridley

There is a famous philosophical question which goes along the lines of "If a tree falls in a forest and no one is around to hear it, does it make a sound?". An odd opening line for a Messenger editorial you might think. But this is how it feels when a Messenger is completed and distributed. A lot of effort goes into all the contributions that are made each month but do they get read? Perhaps those pieces do but the editorial does not — it is difficult to know.



I was sat in the Sugar Loaf the other night and mentioned to the friends I was with about a letter that we printed last month, to which the response I got was "what letter? I didn't even know the Messenger was out" - somewhat worrying but it also got me thinking that if no-one reads this piece I can print whatever I want without recourse! Now of course that is not quite what I am going to do. I do, however, want to express an opinion that I hope, if it is read, might elicit a response. We, after all, want the Messenger to be a place where the community can express its views and exchange opinions in a safe and neutral environment. However, for there to be a debate two opposing views must necessarily be able to be expressed.

In 1968 the day after Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated, a teacher by the name of Jane Elliot in a small school in Iowa divided her classroom down the lines of eye colour. For the purpose of her experiment she then announced that those children with brown eyes were superior to those with lighter coloured eyes. She reinforced this assertion by letting the brown-eyed pupils have longer breaks and allowing them to drink from the water fountain whilst the lighter-eyed pupils had to drink from paper cups. The result? The brown-eyed pupils grew more confident and condescending, hurling insults at the lighter eyed children. The blue-eyed pupils became more timid and the two groups ceased playing with each other, leading to fights breaking out.

What did this prove? That people are not born prejudiced, but that it is a learnt behaviour. What does this have to do with Meppershall I hear you ask (should you be reading and have got this far)?

I have lived in Meppershall for thirteen years, the first nine in Coneygate or, as it was referred to then, "the Bovis Estate". I remember quite clearly during those first few years seeing, in this very publication, letters about how "things were different before the Bovis Estate" and how certain petty crimes would "never

have happened" before it was built. Slowly but surely this outlook seemed to pervade the village and it felt like, as a resident of "the Bovis Estate" we were somehow different, perhaps even prejudiced against. Could this not also be an example of learnt behaviour?

My understanding is that the Bovis development had been controversial at the time and, for various reasons, very divisive. This ill feeling was then superimposed on the new residents who were unaware of this and unwittingly moving to the new houses.

Roll forward the clock 13 years and we have another large development that has caused much debate, and no little ill-feeling, within the village. Regardless of which side of the fence we have sat on there will soon be a large number of new residents in our village. The question we therefore need to ask ourselves is: do we want to exhibit the learnt behaviours that Jane Elliot so clearly demonstrated, or will we welcome new people into our community with open arms?

I have been involved in various aspects of village life over the past six years and I know what a fantastic place we live in, populated by genuine and hard-working people. I for one look forward to some new blood and fresh thinking that will keep Meppershall a vibrant and wonderful place to live. What do you think? Please let us know.

Have a lovely summer and enjoy the hot weather whilst it is with us and we look forward to being back in the Autumn. Take care.

Development Update



Report from the Trustees of Meppershall Village Hall July 2018

On our visit on the 10th July we found that a great deal of progress has been made on the second fix phase of this project. The external scaffolding has now been removed as the outside work is complete.

Inside the plumbers were fitting large vertical radiators on the walls of the hall. On Thursday the laying of the vinyl flooring will commence in the toilets and showers. This will be followed by the installation of the sanitary ware and cubicles.

Painting continues throughout the building and the electricians are installing the light fittings and completing IT network.

We have been advised that the completion of the new building is scheduled for the end of October. More detailed information on the official opening will be available in the October edition of the Messenger.

Meppershall Second Sunday Strollers

Who are the Strollers? Do you need an invitation to join? Are unfashionable waterproof jackets and beanies compulsory? Why the Second Sunday thing? Everything you always wanted to know, but were afraid to ask, revealed here...



A few years back, the church had a spell of not holding a mid-morning service on the second Sunday of the month — owing to scheduling issues linked with our sister church in Shefford. Not wanting to waste a perfectly good Sunday morning, the Second Sunday Stroll was born — going out for a hike together instead. Today, the church most definitely has a morning service on every Sunday — but the Second Sunday Strollers continue, now meeting after lunch (usually at 2.15pm at the church gate — picture above).

We typically walk anywhere between 3 and 8 miles – sometimes in a loop, or sometimes ending up at an interesting spot out beyond Shefford to the north, Shillington to the south, Gravenhurst to the west or Stondon and Henlow east. You can leave Meppershall in any direction and have a great walk for a couple of hours or more and we are close to several established long-distance routes including the John Bunyan Trail, the Greensand Ridge Way and the Icknield Way.

We have staged some longer walks too – often during the holidays: 13 miles to Bedford Embankment, 14 miles to Ashwell and 15 miles to Woburn. Most recently (July) we hiked to Arlesey – a route of around 5 miles, taking in the footpaths between RAF Henlow and the Hicca Way which skirts Arlesey. It is a very informal group for all ages. We always have different people coming out to walk with us - but we share a common interest in getting out into the countryside around the village. Meppershall is lucky to have a very diligent farming community who do a lot to keep the public footpaths accessible and clearly marked – a resource that we want to use, enjoy and treasure.

Message from St Mary's...

I have just returned from a long weekend in Normandy. My Godson, his father and I had a lads' weekend, camping and visiting the Normandy D-Day sites. In glorious weather we visited most of the sites connected with the July 1944 landings.

We stood at Pegasus Bridge and looked in awe at the small landing site on which 3 British gliders managed to land so close to the now famous bridge. We visited the 5 main beachheads where British, Canadian, American and Free French forces fought to return freedom and democracy to an occupied and subjected Europe. The sense of sacrifice was palpable. The beaches each told a story of gallantry but it was so hard to imagine the sights and sounds of the terrible events of that day, 74 years ago.

As we stood, taking in the scene on that sunny, hot weekend, the beaches themselves were full of relaxation, fun and laughter. Families were building sandcastles, teenagers playing volleyball and sun worshippers were basking in the summer heat. It felt a million miles away from the horrors of 1944. And yet, there was something so right and perfect about the beaches resounding to the joy and laughter of families in contrast to the resounding sound of gun fire and slaughter. It reminded me that life was for living and that those men from the D Day landings had given their lives so that families in 2018 could enjoy life and the freedom which their sacrifice had bought.

The bible teaches us that Jesus, also came to fight for our freedom. His fight for us also came at a cost to him – his death on the cross. But in John's Gospel Jesus tells his followers "I have come in order that you might have life—life in all its fullness." (GNB). Jesus wants us to experience the freedom and joy which exists in knowing Him. Just as the sacrifice of those young men in 1944 bought for us the ability to live life to the full; so too Jesus offers to us a life "in all its fullness" and freedom in Him.

As I write this it is currently the hottest, sunniest summer since the heatwave of 1976. I do hope that you have a summer which is blessed with "life in all its fullness." And let us remember the sacrifice which has been made for all of us as we sayour the freedom which is ours and was won for us at such a cost.
