Dear Editor . . .

I very much enjoy reading The Meppershall Messenger and have found the publication extremely useful and informative. However, it appears of late that one topic seems to be mentioned frequently, and I would like to take this opportunity to air my views surrounding noise disturbance, and also the Bovis development.

My husband and I moved to Meppershall approximately two years ago from Dunstable, and we currently enjoy living on the Bovis estate. The main reason for us moving to Meppershall centred around the village way of life. We enjoy the beautiful countryside, the birds and wildlife not often seen in more built up urban areas, together with the prospect of starting and raising a family in a respectable, safe and quiet village. I therefore understand the frustrations and objections of many villagers within Meppershall at having a new housing estate built on their doorstep. I also understand their dismay when a very small number of the new residents in the new housing estate cause anguish by creating too much noise or disturbances. That said, I feel that all residents within the Bovis development are being judged unjustly due to the fact that (a) we live on a new estate that traditional residents were very much opposed to, and (b) there are one or two houses that perhaps do create too much noise within the new development.

I am certain that the majority of residents within the Bovis estate would agree that quad bikes, noise disturbances and the like are totally unacceptable. We seem however to be "tarred with the same brush" due to the fact we happen to live in the same area of the village!

Please be assured that the majority of residents within the Bovis development are actually rather a nice bunch of people, who do fall in step with the village ethos. We also very much hope recent disturbances are the exception rather than the rule and would hope that you understand the majority of us share the same opinion as the rest of the village on this matter!

Just over a year ago I was diagnosed with bowel cancer. I had no major symptoms and like most people, the thought of undergoing tests made me delay consulting my doctor. I was very lucky, as the vast majority of people who leave the diagnosis so late do not survive. Bedford Hospital were (and still are) wonderful and the reason I am still around today is down to their skill, care and support. The charity, Colon Cancer Concern, try to raise awareness of bowel cancer, the UK's second most common cause of cancer death. They helped me by giving me good advice and information during treatment and recovery. They are also very involved in developing "non-intrusive" testing to support the introduction of a national screening programme. (I should have been offered screening as my brother had bowel cancer many years ago).

On 18th September I will be taking part in the Great North Run, which is a 13 mile half marathon! I will be running with five of my family and friends to raise money for Colon Cancer Concern. I have managed to persuade Dave Hankins to run and we are both taking training very seriously! My son and daughter, Matthew and Anna, her partner Chris and Dave's son Peter, have also agreed to run. I have put sponsor forms in Roger's Bakery, the Post Office and the Sugar Loaf. You can gift Aid your donation so we can get another 28p for every pound raised. We want to raise as much as possible to support the vital work of Colon Cancer Concern.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

I expect many of you will have heard of or been involved with the above in some form or another, not least everyone who has helped or contributed over the last two years in Meppershall. The idea is to spread a little Christmas joy to children around the world. The method is simple.

- 1. Obtain an empty shoe box
- 2. Cover it with pretty paper
- 3. Fill it with suitable items for a child from 2 to 4, 5 to 9, 10 to 14, boy or girl. The items need not be new but must be in good condition.
- 4. Send it to the local organiser

The box then gets sent to a child somewhere in the world who are homeless, live in orphanages or are without family support or whose lives have been blighted by poverty, ill health, natural disaster, conflict or war.

Here is how you can help. Meppershall Brownies are making this their Christmas effort for this year again and plan to fill as many shoe boxes as possible - I have several already that are ready to be filled. We would be very grateful for any items that you could donate to us. Has anyone the time to knit as hats, scarves and gloves are needed? If you need to be provided with wool please call me during the day on 01462 450111.

Steve at the Post Office and Mary and Roger at the Bakery have agreed to accept any donations or please give them to a Brownie or call in at the Village Hall on a Monday between 6 and 7.30p.m.

Please consider buying a small packet of sweets when shopping and dropping that in the donation box.

You may have many items around your house or workplace which could go in the box. I have been saving the free pens that come with surveys you receive through the post. Bars of soap from hotels etc

Some suggestions of items to go in the boxes are:

Cuddly toys, toothbrush, toothpaste, notepad, writing pads, picture books, pencils, pens, crayons, felt tips, hat, cap, gloves, scarf, ball, puzzle e.g.

small jigsaw, toy car, truck, passenger plane, girl's jewellery, soap, facecloths, sweets (well within their sell by date).

The items that cannot be included are liquids, clothing if not listed above, sharp objects, books with words, glass containers and other fragile items, was related toys as many of the children have only too much experience of the real thing. Please also avoid battery driven toys as replacement batteries will not be available or affordable.

Any suitable items will do. We will pack the boxes at Brownies so don't feel that you have to fill a box yourself. All contributions however large or small are valuable and gratefully received.

I have lost my source of supply of shoe boxes so if anybody has a source - friend works in a shoe shop etc, please let me know and I would be delighted to receive them as soon as possible - gives me more time for covering them.

We will also be holding a fund raising event at Brownies during October. Please help by coming to that. There will be a raffle and various side shows. We need your support on this as £2 goes with each box to cover its transport costs across the world. More news later.

It takes such a little effort to give a child such great happiness at Christmas and that must be what Christmas is all about. Last year our boxes went to children in such desperate areas that they would almost certainly be the only present they received. Please help to make them happy and joyful children, as all children should be, even for a short while.

Knitting & Stitching Show at Alexandra Palace on Friday 14th October, cost £19 per head including entry. Autumn Federation Meeting at the Corn Exchange Bedford on Monday 24th October at 7.30pm, speaker Bob Champion retired champion jockey, tickets £5.50 members and £6.50 non members. Christmas Shopping trip Saturday 19th November, dropping off at Covent Garden, coach only £10.50. Craft Fair at Flitwick Village Hall on 16th October, more details to follow.

Our VE Day celebration cream teas on 18th June and our stall and teas at the Post Office Fete on 2nd July were both very successful events. Good news again for our Darts team - we beat Tingrith 4-1. Summer Outing to Beth Chattos gardens near Colchester on Wednesday 10th August, there are still seats available, coach leaves Village Hall at 9am returning about 6pm, cost £11.50. We have details of the scheme run by the police which enables people to have door chains, window locks, etc fitted for security. We are hoping to have a meeting later in the year showing a video relating to distraction burglary and cold calling. Subscriptions for 2006 will be £22 per person.

Our speaker for the evening was Mr. Nick Griffin, a farmer on the subject of Buffalo milk. Mr. Griffin ran a family farm initially of dairy cattle but following the introduction of milk quotas and then BSE he decided to give up the cattle and grow crops which he did for a while, until prices fell considerably and in 9998 he bought 120 six month old calves of Indian Water Buffalo and now has 400. Buffalo milk is very good for people with lactose intolerance, eczema and irritable bowel syndrome, but he is not allowed to claim the benefits of the products without expensive trials being carried out.

The milk is very low in cholesterol and high in calcium, also cheeses, yoghurts and ice cream are available, and the meat is similar to beef but very low in fact content. There are no milk quotas for Buffalo milk and the animals are easy to feed on grass etc and straw, also no BSE cases recorded.

After many ups and downs to find dairies to take his milk he now supplies Waitrose supermarkets with his products. By-products also available are Buffalo Gold Fertiliser which is very good for fuchsias and tomatoes.

Visitors Centre at Mill Road, Slapton, Leighton Buzzard is open every day Monday - Saturday 9.30am to 5pm and Sundays 10am to 4.30pm, admission free. Mr. Griffin brought samples for us to try and to purchase. A very interesting and enjoyable evening.

Our next meeting will be 14th September when our speaker will be Mr. Parry on the subject of Royal Ladies of Bedfordshire.

What about baptism?

The story so far..

For over 800 years children and adults have come to the font at St Mary's for their baptism, and happily, they still do. It's a straightforward ceremony which focuses on pouring of water over the head as the person is addressed by their Christian name: "I baptise you in the name of God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit". But the meaning behind the words and actions takes us further. From the Church's beginnings in New Testament times, adults were welcomed into the fellowship of Christians as they openly expressed their love for God as revealed in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. Their new faith was then expressed symbolically by baptism (full immersion-usually in the local river!),as the sign that they were turning away from a self motivated life and turning towards one that was Christ motivated, sustained by His Spirit. The model for this sacramental act was the baptism of Jesus himself at the start of his life's work.

Soon Christian parents were able to have their children baptised on the basis of their faith, reinforced by the prayerful support of other Church members. These sponsors in time became known as the godparents. The baptism of children eventually became referred to as 'christening' - being made Christ-like, but the meaning is just the same.

So much for the history - what about today?

Everyone of whatever age is welcome to ask for baptism in their local Church.

It's a special step to take, and rather like a wedding, carries important implications for the future. Part of my job, together with other representatives of the Church, is to help enquirers recognise the relevance of baptism, so that they can start to enjoy its long term consequences. The style of preparation varies a little from church to church, but locally what's involved looks like this:

For the baptism of children..

After an initial chat, parents are invited to meet up with other enquiring parents at a session designed to explore the significance of a child's baptism. We look at the questions and responses contained within the

service, and the responsibilities of parents and godparents.

We also take a look at the option of a 'Service of Thanksgiving for Childbirth'. This doesn't involve promises, but is available to all parents either as a preliminary to baptism, or when baptism is thought not to be the appropriate choice, - at least for now. This takes place in Church either within a normal service or at a separate time.

At this stage parents are asked to make a firm decision about how they wish to proceed, and consequently, arrangements are made for the date and details of the service. Where baptism is requested, this is the best time for godparents to be approached. If practicable I also like to meet the godparents with the parents, and talk with them about their own role and responsibilities.

The baptism itself is held within one of the regular Sunday services, so that the congregation can welcome the child on behalf of the worldwide Christian family, and also be reminded of the ongoing meaning of their own baptism.

For an adult...

who hasn't been christened but who wants to make a positive step of faith, baptism may well be where God is leading them. A larger proportion of adults are being baptised these days, as in New Testament times. Preparation is offered that's designed to suit the person's circumstance, though ideally is provided in a small group setting. There will also be opportunity to explore the meaning of confirmation, as this is intended to lead on from baptism, and contains very similar affirmations of belief. Please see note above re 'Confirmation...Enquiry session'

Whether for children or adults, the act of baptism speaks of the way God cherishes his people, and has an individual purpose for them that's reflected in the light of the gospel.

Whatever your spiritual journey has entailed, if you feel the time is right to travel further, do please enquire. You're likely to find fellow travellers heading in the same direction.

New Life for Meppershall Chapel

After a year in which there has been no worship taking place at Meppershall Methodist Church, there are now great signs of hope for the future.

At the second Public Meeting looking at the future of the building which was held on 21st June, a new initiative unfolded. After reviewing the statements made at the first meeting, Rev. Martin Dawes (the Methodist Superintendent Minister) said that he had been in conversation with the Rector, Rev John Harper and that they had discussed the possibility of running the chapel ecumenically, providing a regular act of worship which would be open to all. During the discussion which followed, it was decided that initially there would be a monthly service at 3.00pm on the second Sunday in each month, beginning on the 11th September. This recommendation was accepted the Church Council at Shefford (which currently is responsible for the chapel) on 7th July as a way forward. The progress of the new services will be reviewed in 12 months time, or before if necessary.

This decision enables the chapel once more to be a centre of Christian worship and outreach, and also to enable it to continue being the valued community centre it already is. From the very warm response of the meeting and the strong commitment of the community (twenty out of twenty three present declared that they would support the proposed acts of worship), it is hoped that the work of the chapel will develop in new and exciting ways in the coming months.

At the end of the meeting it was felt appropriate to spend some time in prayer, which was very fruitful and uplifting. We will continue to meet in prayer at the chapel in the time leading up to the resumption of services there in September.




SHEFFORD LEISURE GROUP
