

### Halloween Warning

Dear Parent/Carer

With the approach of Halloween comes an increase of fear for many residents within our communities. Each year Bedfordshire Police receive calls regarding the Anti Social Behaviour of a few thoughtless individuals whose actions bring alarm, distress and misery to many. Groups of young people roaming residential streets calling at houses 'Trick or Treating' can be distressing, particularly for the elderly and vulnerable.

Sadly, incidents of eggs and flour being thrown at people and their property under the 'Trick or Treat' guise are increasing. To remove the residue of such attacks is an unpleasant task even for the able bodied amongst us. When the elderly and vulnerable are victims, then the remnants of someone's so called 'fun night out' may well be there for sometime. It becomes a constant reminder and causes the same emotional distress as if the incident had just occurred.

In order to minimise this fear, police officers and support staff from Ampthill and Shefford will be increasing their patrols during the evening of 31<sup>st</sup> October and will be dealing positively with people whose behaviour is anti social. If your child is found engaged in such activity, which is likely to cause alarm, distress or annoyance to other members of the public, they will be arrested for the offence of Public Nuisance.

Persons arrested will be taken to Ampthill Police Station where custody facilities will be available and a decision made regarding their release. It is likely a formal reprimand will be given if they have not come to police notice before, if they have, they may face prosecution. Acceptable Behaviour Contracts will also be considered.

Halloween can be spent enjoyably by young people without the necessity of causing residents discomfort. Young children should be supervised as much for their own safety as well as the safety of others. If you have older children please ask them to consider the feelings of others, ask them not to call on the elderly or vulnerable and restrict their visits to friends or family.

I would like to thank you in advance for your co-operation and trust that you will not have to collect your child from the police station.

After they thought their month couldn't get much better they went to the Europeans on top form having sailed for 3weeks almost day

in day out. The Europeans were held in the same place as the Westland cup the first day saw light winds and team Volitio put themselves into 7th position. The second day saw strong winds which swung around making the racing difficult however team Volitio sailed consistently to in force their position in 7<sup>th</sup> and first youth boat.

The third day of the championship was windy and wavy yet again team Volitio didn't manage to finish the first race of that day due to a boat breakage however in the other four they sailed well and moved up into 6th place overall. The last day was cancelled due to poor visibility and strong winds so team Volitio finished their months racing with a 6th at their Europeans and being crowned youth European champions. However this young promising team is still looking for sponsorship so they can try an achieve their aim of winning gold

Our speaker for the evening was Mr. C. Parry on the subject of Royal Ladies of Bedfordshire. He told us about Catherine of Aragon from Spain, daughter of so-called Royal Kings" originally married to Henry VII who only survived for a few months making her a widow at 16. She then spent much of her time at Ampthill Hunting Lodge and married Henry VIII in 1509 when he was 18 and she was 24: she had 6

children, 4 of whom were boys that all died in

infancy. Henry met Ann Boleyn when she was maidin-waiting to Catherine and he set up a mission in Dunstable to have his marriage to Catherine declared void and she was sent to Buckden and then to Kimbolton where she died in 1536 and is buried at Peterborough. A monument to her was erected in Ampthill Park much later.

The second lady was Dorothy Osborn born 1637 at

Chicksands, daughter to the Governor of Guernsey. She might have married Oliver Cromwell and become First Lady but declined. She eventually met William Temple, a diplomat and they spent some time together at St. Malo and then parted but after a very long friendship much of it only by letter, they married and she became Lady of the Majo4 at Chicksands. On the eve of her wedding she contracted smallpox. William nursed her through her illness and she had 9 children of which only 2 survived childhood, a girl who died at 14 and a son who went into Government.

Lastly a short story of Judith Countess of Huntingdon, an important land owner, she lived at Potton and was responsible for the buildings of Elstow Abbey. Her Royal connection was that her daughter became Queen of Scotland. An interesting and amusing evening.

Our next meeting on Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> October will be an Auction together with wine, cheese and nibbles to celebrate 90 years of the W.I.
