The Committee, as set out below, has met twice since last month, to review advertising rates and banking arrangements for the Messenger. The revised advertising rates, which will be effective from the April issue, are very slightly increased from last year, except for the 1/8 page size, which is unchanged. Christine Elbourne will be writing to past advertisers to take orders for the coming year. Anyone wishing to place an advertisement should contact Christine at the address below. The new rates are shown in the box opposite.

The messenger's policy is that notices of village interest are not classed as adverts and are included without charge. Any more commercial notice, such as notice of a garage sale, would be classed as a casual advert. The charge would be for agreement with the Editor, depending on the degree of commerciality involved, but could be around £25.

I would recommend that all village car drivers take note of the Police Report on page 2, and that those who cause hazard to pedestrians and other drivers by selfish and thoughtless parking mend their ways before someone, perhaps a child, gets hurt. Those who are parking near the School could seriously consider the Walking Bus (see last month's School Report) and potentially improve their health and that of their children.

### **POLICE REPORT**

During the February council meeting at Meppershall Lower School several concerns were raised by the community. The main issue was parking and the main problem areas are as follows:

- · Fildyke Road junction with Buxton Close.
- Fildyke Road junction and dangerous corner with Brookmead.
- High Street bend prior to Rectory Road.
- Outside Meppershall Lower School at peak times turning the High Street into a single carriageway.

Please avoid parking in these areas for the safety of both pedestrians and motorists. Should these problems continue I will have no option but to restrict parking by introducing No Waiting Cones which will remove the privilege of parking on the road completely.

I hope residents will help me and help the community of Meppershall to make it a safer place to live.

I had looked forward with keen anticipation to the installation of the "vehicle activated speed signs" and was very happy when a parish councillor and a highways engineer marked a site outside my house for the sign at the Shefford end of the village. It was therefore a considerable surprise when the sign actually sprouted 400 yards further up the road! This means that the traffic goes un-reminded for at least half a mile along one of the most dangerous stretches of Shefford Road, where there is no pedestrian footway.

I wondered whether the positioning of the sign was a mistake and if so who made the mistake? If it was the contractors' mistake, should it not be corrected at their expense?

When I visited the Village Plan open day I noted that I was not alone in regarding speeding traffic as one of the major hazards in our village, so I hope that the sign can be moved to a position where it will make a useful contribution.

### Meppershall Parish Council Report

At our last meeting we had a visit from Sgt Nigel Conroy who is responsible for the co-ordination of the 'No Cold Calling' initiative in our area. He is permanently assigned to the Trading Standards Department where they are successfully apprehending and prosecuting 'Rogue Traders' in Bedfordshire. The Parish Council has agreed to adopt this initiative and you will shortly receive a booklet explaining the scheme.

We also received a report from our Beat Manager PC Steve Busby on behalf of our PCSO James Killen about reported crimes in the area and the action that the Police are taking. It was pointed out to him that although we have installed the electronic speed warning signs there is still a speeding problem in the Village. We have been promised an enforcement campaign in the near future.

Highways & Lighting

Councillor Bryant advised the meeting of the current issues with the roads in the Village and the action being taken County Council. He will now receive a monthly bulletin from the Highways Department on work that is scheduled and completed.

#### Environment & Leisure

There is additional work and routine repairs to be carried out in the Children's play area this month together with rectification of damage caused by vandalism. We understand that if you see vandalism taking place that it is difficult to take action, however, please consider reporting it to the Police and notify the Parish Clerk of any urgent repairs that may have become necessary. The Council caretaker is now undertaking weekly inspections of the equipment, which has previously been carried out by Councillor Waite.

Planning & Housing

On February 11<sup>th</sup> Councillor Crossley and I attended a Mid Beds District Council briefing on the Local Development Framework (LDF). This will ultimately set out the plans for house building in the district from 2009. The Framework public consultation period started on 12<sup>th</sup> February and ends on 5<sup>th</sup> April. Every household will receive a booklet and there is a web site where you can register your views on individual plans. In addition there will be exhibitions, a telephone help line and consultation documents can be sent to you if you do not have Internet access. There are 14 planning proposals for Meppershall but I stress that this is only an initial consultation period. Across the whole of the District between 10% and 15% of these proposals will result in actual building projects. However, this is your first opportunity to make your comments known to the Planning Department and ultimately the Planning Inspector who will make the final decisions. Once agreed the LDF will set the development sites for the area until 2026 and it is unlikely that

any additional proposals will be introduced from this point. Please use this unique opportunity to let the authorities know what your views are.

Finally, at the meeting it was categorically stated that a 'Parish Plan' (that will be publish shortly) is a key piece of evidence in the selection process for the developments in an area and will form part of the considerations by all concerned.

### Village Plan

Once again the villagers of Meppershall showed that they are interested in their village. . Thank you to the 168 villagers that turned up at the two Open Days in January, to check on what was happening and for the most part to give constructive input and feedback.

We have been talking to a number of partners (those teams, individuals & organizations), both in and outside the village, that will be key in moving the plans forward. All but one have been very positive.

Locally the Parish Council have accepted the draft plan and the Village Hall team see the response from the questionnaire as positive. At the Open Day I also met with Rev John and he had taken the results we had given him from the questionnaire in a constructive manner.

We had a good meeting with The Dog Warden, or rather with the Senior Supervisor, Craig Siddle, who was surprised at the amount of problems.

Following our meeting, I had this email from Craig:-

- Marsha, the Dog Warden, visited the day of the meeting and patrolled the area.
- The Dog Warden will also be undertaking this every week or two, pending workload, between approximately 8am and 4pm, weekdays.
- We (The Contracts Department) will clear any areas of fouling on the highway (or highway footpath) when reported to us.
- > We will speak to Chris Waghorn at the Parish Council regarding laminated signs for use around the Village Hall.
- It looks like there has been sufficient provision of dog waste bins in the area.
- The contact details for customers to report fouling are (01462) 611222 or customer.services@midbeds.gov.uk

[Please note that they can only clear the highway areas, not the fields – access, equipment limitations, knowing where to look etc limit what can be done – JW]

They have also taken on a new member of the Dog Warden Team, which will mean we get more patrols.

We had suggested that there should be a doctor in the village and, whilst the PCT have consulted on this and feel there is not "a critical mass" to justify such a move, they do see the possibility of a Nurse Practitioner being here, even if part time. David Foskett (representing the Parish Council) and I will be continuing discussions with the PCT to see what can be done. More on this as we get information.

The one group that seem to have taken things very negatively are Bedfordshire Police. Their reaction seems even more strange considering the very positive response there has been to having a PCSO in the village. We were told, amongst other things "We are expending great effort to achieve a policing service with which the public are satisfied, however we have targets and priorities, which are not and cannot be aligned with public desire". I translate this to mean that we can ask all we like but the police will do their own thing.

It is also understood, that having waited so long to get a PCSO, there are now to be changes that will affect his work. What these changes are is not yet clear as the Police Authority have still to finalize them, but one can guess that it is not going to be to our benefit. Again once we have more information I am sure the Parish Council will let everyone know what is happening.

More on when the report will be issued in the next Messenger.

Dear friends,

Easter beckons – earlier this year than any since 1913. Before it dawns we enter the darkest days of Jesus' journey - betrayal, arrest, trial, torment, and a criminal's death on a cross. Not really what our world expects in the run up to a public holiday! And yet through all this trauma and grief comes – surprise! The disciples are taken aback, not only by an empty tomb but by a risen Lord. They were not prepared for this – God turned out to be greater than any of their expectations, and life for them was to change irreversibly.

Easter is one of those fixed points in the yearly round that we can depend on. We've never know anything different. So it's good if we can sense something of the surprise element that greeted those first Christians. The fixed point in their calendar was Passover – the reminder of their ancestors' release from captivity in Egypt. They rehearsed their history. But when Jesus was raised from death, so unexpectedly, it felt as though God was bringing about a new kind of release. Not this time from a foreign land of exile, but a release from an inner exile, a freedom from all that had prevented those first Christians from being their true fulfilled selves.

What God did at the first Easter I believe he continues to do. Yes, Easter is an annual reminder of what happened 2000 years ago, but it also says that God goes on making all things new. He goes on springing surprises for our good. The change that the first followers of Jesus encountered was not just reserved for them – it's offered to us also; namely the assurance that we are loved and valued not for what we deserve but because of who God is. So Easter is the greatest of festivals. Without it there would be no Christmas, no New Testament, no Christian Church or faith. And it is in its light that we see God's true nature, and our own.

### MARCH IN YOUR GARDEN

(With acknowledgements to the RHS)

- · Mulch bare soil in beds and borders
- Move evergreen shrubs
- Prune bush and shrub roses
- Propagate shrubs by layering
- Increase stock of perennials by taking basal stem cuttings from the new shoots
- Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials
- · Split polyanthus after flowering
- · Take cuttings from dahlia tubers
- · Plant summer-flowering bulbs
- Sow sweet peas out of doors, or plant out young plants raised under cover. Pinch out growing tips of young sweet peas to encourage side-shoots
- · Sow hardy annuals where they are to flower
- Reseed bare patches in the lawn
- · Start mowing lawns regularly
- Take pumps out of store and put them back in the pond; begin feeding fish
- Sow vegetables outside and harden off young plants to put outside
- · Plant early potatoes and asparagus
- Protect fruit blossom against frosts
- Sow half-hardy annuals and other frost-tender bedding plants under cover
- Water indoor plants regularly, now that the weather is warming up.

#### LAST CHANCE

- Finish planting bare-root tress and shrubs and new fruit trees and bushes
- This is the latest time to plant snowdrops and winter aconites

#### GET AHEAD

- Put grow bags in the greenhouse to warm up before planting
- Put stakes and other plant supports in to support new growth before it really needs it.
