Dear Editor.

I am writing in response to the police report in the March 2008 edition of the Meppershall Messenger. As one of the residents who parks on Fildyke road I feel that it is unfair to criticise the parking problem. I understand that the situation is not ideal and I would much rather park in a safer place.

However there is only one lay-by with five parking spaces for seventeen dwellings. Parking further up the road would create the same problem as the cars would be opposite the Brookmead turning, which has also been identified as a dangerous corner in the same police report. Another reason for not wanting to park further up the road is that recently my partner's rear window wiper was snapped off and his car spat on in acts of vandalism. Last month my vehicle was also damaged when a car struck my wing mirror and broke it off.

In 2007 Aragon housing association issued plans to resolve the parking situation on Fildyke road. Unfortunately these plans have never materialised. If pressure is to be put upon anyone it should be Aragon, it should be their responsibility to provide adequate parking for their tenants.

I also think is it unfair to brand residents 'selfish and thoughtless' I think I stand for everyone when I say that no one would intentionally hurt another member of the village.

Highways & Lighting

The meeting was advised that next year there will be additional funding for highway maintenance in Meppershall. It is hoped that these funds will be used to provide a proper and safe footway outside Meppershall Stores.

The white paint on the roadway in Shefford Road are the markings made during recent surveying and planning work for a new footpath. We have been advised that a formal proposal will be put before Beds County Council in May. However, this project cannot take place until sufficient funds are available. County Councillor Robin Younger is continuing to lobby for this project and the funds needed to action it.

Environment & Leisure

If you visit the area behind the Village Hall you will see that the refurbishment and improvement of the play equipment is almost complete with the recent installation of a new slide and swings. The concrete shed in the young children's play area is being replaced and relocated.

In Old Road Meadow the hedge rows have been trimmed in order that they thicken up and to prevent their encroachment into the meadow. The Council is very grateful to Tony Edwards for all his hard work in the area. You will notice thanks to Tony that the whole meadow is cut a several times a year and the paths are kept regularly mown and clear amongst other jobs that he does for us.

PCSO

James has started his training as a full time police officer so we no longer have our own dedicated PCSO. Unfortunately due to the Government funding changes for Bedfordshire Police we will not be having our own dedicated officer from April, but will have a share of the two based in Shefford who will cover the town and all the surrounding villages.

Village Plan

We are currently trying to get the final draft together and get it to the printers. There is quite a bit of housekeeping / editing to do to ensure we have eliminated all the obvious spelling and most of the grammatical mistakes. Our aim is ensure we have included as much as possible, without it being such a large document that no one will read it.

Our target is to issue the Village Plan to all households with the next delivery of the Messenger, (with any luck).

As the present village plan team near the end of their task, to raise the village plan, so we need to look ahead having a new team in place to take it forward. I am writing to several of the organizations in the village with a suggestion for this and hopefully I will be able to report on progress next time.

Last month I reported on a rather negative response from the police. Since that report Peter Crossley (Parish Councillor), Acting Chief Inspector Jaki Whittred and I have had a very constructive meeting to help ensure that the police and village are working in partnership. Due to funding changes there will be changes to the deployment of the PCSOs and the final outcome of those deliberations will come via the Parish Council. Our priorities, with regard to traffic and crime have been resubmitted to the relevant police department.

Spin-offs from the review with the police has been a meeting with Dave Rollings, a Community Safety Officer at Mid-Beds concerning the formation of Community Safety Groups (at parish level) and Safer Neighbourhood Forum, which could operate over the wider Shefford & Shefford Rural areas. Both of these are initiatives which look at crime prevention through multi-agency efforts and not simply by policing. More in the future.

Can you help Meppershall Pre-School on a voluntary basis over the next twelve months?

At the end of April we will be holding our Annual General Meeting. As a voluntary management committee with charitable status we need to fill the following committee positions in order to keep running.

CHAIRPERSON

Oversee and chair 6- weekly committee meetings; ensure smooth running of Pre-School policies in conjunction with Play Leader and her team of staff. Work with the committee and staff on strategic development of new and existing Pre-School activity. Support and authorise the work of the Treasurer.

TREASURER

This role involves approximately 2 hrs per week (from your home). Basic finance and accounts knowledge required. Responsibilities include issuing cheques, keeping records of income and expenditure, reporting to the committee at 6-weekly meetings, maintaining Pre-School bank account and staff payroll (some of which could be shared with other committee members)

SECRETARY

Arranges 6-weekly meetings in liaison with all committee members; types and circulates minutes of each meeting. Writes and receives letters for the group. Liaises with OFSTED on CRB checks and committee and staff changes.

Meppershall Pre-School is a small and friendly organisation, providing a secure learning environment from The Village Hall for approximately 10 - 30 children, Monday to Friday in line with government and early learning guidelines.

The positions we are looking to fill are supported by up to 12 other committee members including a registrar and fundraisers.

You do not need to have a child at the Pre-School. Most importantly we are looking for committed and enthusiastic individuals who feel they have some spare time and skills to offer and would like to be involved in helping us to keep a high standard Pre-School running in Meppershall.

Meppershall Bakery Bees by Roger

This is the first of a regular series which I intend to write for general interest and for the information of other beekeepers in the village. Any comments should be sent to the Editor.

DID YOU KNOW THAT:

- It takes 20,000 visits by bees to flowers to produce a pound of honey.
- A full sized colony in summer can contain more than 50,000 bees.
- At her peak-laying rate, a Queen can lay up to 3000 eggs per day which is more than her body weight.
- Some people find that eating LOCAL honey throughout the year reduces hay-fever problems
- Where can you get Meppershall Local Honey? At Rogers Bakery of course see you there.
- Bees are essential to the pollination of many of our crops. There are not sufficient numbers of other insects that carry out this important task.

Meppershall bees live in 5 hives. What with such a mild winter, they were flying early, since January 9^{th} , looking for pollen and water.

Honey is the bees' winter stores. All through the spring and summer they were busy building up the stock. They store it above the "brood nest", which is where the Queen lays the eggs and all the young bees emerge. This nest is large and wide at the height of the season but shrinks to a tight cluster like a football in winter, moving up through the honey as it goes.

In the wild the bees build their hives downwards. They fasten the top to the roof of a hollow tree or rafters in your loft. As the honey comes in during the summer, the comb is extended downwards and the brood nest moves down to allow more space above for the honey. Then during the winter they eat their way back up again.

In the managed hive the beekeeper puts the new comb on top of the colony as a honey super and then whips it away at harvest time. This leaves the bees with only a small depth of honey for the winter which they soon eat through. They could move sideways to get to the honey but it is against their nature and in any case they could not leave the Brood (larvae and punae) behind because it has to be kept at 35 degrees centigrade all

The beekeeper's solution is to feed sugar in the form of candy or better still, baker's fondant, in January or February. A block is placed over the feed hole in the crown board so that the bees can lick it when they have eaten their way through the honey. I have just given all my hives a 2kg block of fondant and I will give them more if they

Meppershall Bakery Bees MARCH

This is the month when we may get caught out, as the colony growth can advance at an amazing speed if the weather is relatively mild. Or it will be held back if the weather is cold either due to frost (or snow) or there is a cold wind with a high chill factor. We must watch the weather carefully and react accordingly to the conditions outside. When it is reasonably mild we can be tempted to open up a colony and see what is happening but this will be at the risk of disturbing the careful heat balance the colony has established in the hive. We risk chilling young brood unnecessarily for only minimal gain.

If the weather is mild enough the crownboard can be lifted to make sure that the colony is still alive and ascertain the size of the cluster, but no frames should be disturbed. This action will again confirm that all is well. If the weather turns mild a strong colony may need to have extra supers added because a Queen in her second year can breed rapidly and the colony expands with exceptional speed.

APRIL IN YOUR GARDEN

(With acknowledgement to the RHS)

- Continue watering newly planted trees and shrubs if the weather is dry.
- Plant or move evergreen trees and shrubs. In cold exposed sites, erect a windbreak to protect them.
- · Spray roses against blackspot.
- Trim grey-leaved shrubs to keep them bushy.
- Tie in the new shoots of climbers.
- Prune early-flowering shrubs.
- Prune shrubs grown for large or colourful foliage such as cotinus.
- Divide perennials.
- Stake tall-growing perennials.
- Protect young growth from slugs and snails.
- Pot up or transplant self-sown seedlings that you come across in beds and borders.
- Keep weeding. Annual weeds can be hand-pulled, but always dig perennial weeds right out.
- Deadhead daffodils.
- · Sow annual climbers and grasses.
- Plant new aquatic plants.
- Sow or turf new lawns.
- Feed established lawns.
- Sow greenhouse crops such as tomatoes.
- Continue sowing and planting vegetables outdoors.
- Prick out or pot up seedlings before they get congested and grow leggy.

LAST CHANCE

- Cut down any dead growth left over-winter on perennials, especially grasses, before there is too much risk of damaging new shoots.
- Plant summer-flowering bulbs.
- Sow sweet peas.

GET AHEAD

Prepare trenches for runner beans.

 Plant up hanging baskets if you have space under glass to shelter them for a few more weeks.

With great excitement and a lot of awe and wonder, we have watched six healthy chicks hatch out of their eggs in our classroom incubators. They will be greatly missed when they are returned to be reared elsewhere.

Singing has always been an enthusiasm and strength here, as those of you who have heard the children singing in church over the years will testify. We have the sound of music throughout the school with many of our children learning to play additional musical instruments during the school day. We have eight violinists, four cellists, one flautist, one guitarist and sixty eight recorder players. My dentist tells me, to my shame, that I should be more regular with the brushing and the flossing! Of course I know he's right, especially when he's got his drill at the ready and

I'm the one in the chair! I recognise that it's no use skimping over the daily routine just because time is pressing, or relying on a single super clean just before heading for the surgery. Naturally it would be good to enjoy sound filling-free dental health — it's just a matter of discipline!

Much the same could be said about our spiritual health. It's one thing to take it seriously when there's a problem, but it's the regular practice that we find tough, particularly now that Lent is over. The strange things is that the discipline God

offers us, a bit like that of a good dentist, is really for our own welfare, because that's His main concern.

This season of Easter leads us on to Jesus' Ascension, when we honour Christ as King. It is easily overlooked, coming as it does on a Thursday, but we mark it to remind us that Christ is not simply a good example, but that He is sovereign.

Consequently, to be counted amongst his people means that we accept and practice His ways before our own. In fact, to be a disciple, (i.e. a learner) , means that we follow the Lord's discipline, which in turn leads to our true health. And that is a daily exercise — to seek through prayer and scripture and worship what Christ would have of us each new day.

There the analogy with the tooth brushing routine breaks down, because as we persevere so we find that our godly routine is itself a source of delight and encouragement. Far from being a chore, we find that our developing relationship with the God revealed in Jesus becomes the source of our fulfilment – the encounter that colours and shapes the whole of our day, and that gives direction and purpose to tomorrow.

INGREDIENTS

650g/1lb 7oz Rhubarb; 140g/5oz Caster Sugar; 150ml/1/4pint + 2tsbp Sweet Rose Wine Grated zest and juice of 1 large Orange; 284ml carton Double Cream.

METHOD.

- 1) Chop the rhubarb into 2.5cm/lin pieces and put in a pan with 50g/2oz of sugar, 2 tablespoons of the rose' wine and the grated orange zest. Cover and cook over a gentle heat for 5 minutes until the rhubarb is tender. Set aside to cool.
- To make the syllabub, pour the orange juice and remaining wine in a bowl. Stir in the remaining sugar until it has dissolved Leave to infuse for 15 minutes.
- 3) Pour the cream slowly into the wine mixture, stirring all the time. Whisk with a balloon whisk until the mixture thickens to soft peaks. Do not over whisk. Spoon the cooled rhubarb into the bottom of 6 glasses or dishes then top with spoonfuls of the syllabub.

How to cook a Husband

Some keep them pickled, while other waste them shamefully. It cannot be supposed that any husband will be tender and good when so managed, but they are really delicious when prepared properly.
