

Highways & Lighting

Councillor Bryant was pleased to report the completion of repairs and realignment of a length of footpath in Shefford Road where some flooding was taking place and the footpath was dangerous for pedestrians. On Friday 4th April he was due to meet a highways engineer from Amey (who carry out all works for Beds CC). The purpose of the meeting was to identify areas of footpath and roadway in the Village that require attention.

Environment & Leisure

The play equipment installation behind the Hall is now complete and the new storage shed will be erected within 6 weeks. Councillor Sykes is in negotiation with Mid Beds and Bovis about the formal adoption of the children's play area in Coney Gate to ensure that the Parish Council can keep the area maintained and safe. This area, like that behind the Hall, will receive weekly safety inspections by our Village Caretaker.

Planning & Housing

There was only one application to review at this meeting which was passed without objection. The Council was pleased to hear that so many residents of the Village were able to attend the Local Development Framework exhibition in Shefford. The next stage of the process will be for Mid Beds District Council to shortlist their preferred projects for an in depth review.

PCSO

County Councillor Robin Younger advised the meeting that the future provision of local policing in the Village is still under review because of the increase in the precept requested by the Police.

Unitary Authority

As you will know the first meeting of the Shadow Unitary Authority for Central Bedfordshire will have taken place by the time you read this article. All Parish Councils are waiting to see what additional tasks and powers will be delegated to them as part of the amalgamation, how it will be funded and what impact it will have.

Village Plan

We have sent the copy to the printers and hopefully your copy has been delivered with this edition of the Messenger. Our thanks to the Messenger delivery team for their help in this task.

I would like to take this opportunity of thanking all the team. Those who have given a great deal of their time and put in a lot of effort, in the preparation of the plan. Peter Chapman, Gilly Chegwyn, David & Jill Foskett, Jill Hickling, Carolyn Holmes, Colette House, Richard Phillips, Julia Roberts, John Thompson and Jill Wright and also for the support from Zoe Ashby of the Beds Rural Communities Charity (BRCC) for her guidance and support.

With the team having completed the task of preparing and issuing the initial Meppershall Village Plan, now is the time to look forward to make the things in the plan actually happen and that the plan becomes a living document. As time passes some things will be achieved or become out of date and other things need to be added to the plan as the village and its needs evolve.

The Parish Council have adopted the plan and will do their part, however, as noted before it is up to all the village to play their part.

One option would be to have a totally new group to monitor and update the plan. Members of this group would have to go to each of the partners involved in the plan to ask what they were doing and what they need to change. This could be very negative as it could be seen as an imposition from outsiders on the good work the particular group is involved with. Rather than try to get together a totally new 'overseeing group' I am suggesting that the major groups in the village send a representative to what I have described as **The Meppershall Village Forum**. Members of those groups can show what they are doing and discuss cross group requirements.

Mid-Beds are promoting this sort of approach with regard to tackling low level crime, or perceived crime. They are looking for villages to set up Community Safety Groups. These forums will consist of representatives from various village organizations and other individuals. Their task is to look at ways of preventing crime and anti-social behaviour, by engaging with people and putting multi-organization projects in place. The Community Safety Group and the Village Forum can be one organization.

To this end I have written to some of the key groups in the village and the few replies I have had so far have been positive, certainly in giving it a try.

The present groups do not cover all the things that are requested in the Village Plan. To ensure that the forum is fully representative of the whole of the village, we are looking for others, not necessarily belonging to any particular group to join. Particular areas are provision of youth facilities & activities, clubs, Neighbourhood Watch and other areas not covered by Parish Council or other groups such as Village Hall and Social Club.

If you would like any more information, please call or mail me and I would be only too happy to share the outline proposals with you.

Finally the team would like to thank all the villagers who gave their time to fill in questionnaires, attend open days, took part in consultations and all the other things that enabled the team to do their work. Without the information provided by the village, there would not be a plan at all. Thank you.

SCHOOL REPORT - APRIL '08

Meppershall VA Lower School

When we had our new building work completed at the school, we took the opportunity to upgrade our ICT (information and communication technology) equipment. As a result all of our classrooms now have interactive whiteboards which are linked to other computers in each classroom. All the computers throughout the school are connected by a server system which means that children can access their saved work whichever computer they are working on. Children can safely go on the internet in every classroom to research topics and access relevant websites which will help their learning.

We are always working hard to improve on what we have here at Meppershall and are already planning for the next stage.

Barnfield College is still running successful adult computer classes on Monday and Tuesday mornings in our school hall and we expect new courses to be running again from September 08.

Thanks to all of you who have popped in to donate Tesco and Sainsbury tokens and vouchers which all help towards renewing equipment in your village school.

We still have some places available for children starting school in September 2008 and this year will be able to take children from outside the village in accordance with our Admissions Policy. Meppershall Bees *by Roger.*

This article is a light-hearted account of my beekeeping. If you need expert advice please contact your local beekeepers association .

LOST- 1500 bees in Meppershall area. If found please contact Roger.

The loss of a beehive can often happen due to various reasons. I think my loss was due to the fact the Queen was old and when the weather turned mild, she could not get enough food. The other bees would have killed her then buzzed off to find a new Queen. They would have all perished in the cold weather.

April was the time that the colonies begin to expand-and they can also starve. Four hives of Meppershall bees have survived the winter. I now have to keep my eye on a number of factors, the most important of which are levels of food stores and the weather. The main factor being the amount of stores of honey which the bees have available for the developing brood nest. If the weather gets warmer, coupled with more daylight, colonies can expand at an amazing rate. I have closely monitored their level of stores every week to ensure they have sufficient. Bees have a remarkable capacity to consume vast quantities of food and then starve and die if they run out.

MAY is one of the main months for swarming. That's if it has not happened already!

Swarming activity is the result of normal healthy colony growth, a natural occurrence.

Congestion of the brood area, as mentioned last month, the bees think vertically not horizontally, to reduce congestion we add supers. Supers are where the bees store their honey above the brood nest .To do this we must put on a Queen excluder which stops the Queen from entering the super and laying eggs. Also moving frames around to relieve congestion and/or inserting empty drawn brood frames in place of frames clogged by honey or pollen. The skill, of course, is to know when it is the right time to take this action. Ideally it should be just as the frost is over and the horse chestnut comes into flower. This is part of what is known as being able to read the colony.

However bees often catch you out with your timing and may start swarming.

Where can you get Meppershall Honey – at Rogers Bakery of course- See you there.

Tobago - Jewel in the Caribbean Crown

The seaside resorts of Grafton beach, Stonehaven and Store Bay are ideal for sunbathing and safe swimming, with perfect conditions for snorkelling. Great Courland Bay boasts a one-mile stretch of white sandy beach, a regular nesting site for Giant Leatherback Turtles. Turtle watching can be arranged during a vacation.

Driving in Tobago, you'll easily find your way around. The roads are generally quiet, apart from Scarborough on market day, and local maps are simple to follow. Road signs may be scarce in remote areas, but you'll soon find someone to ask for directions. The centre of the island is mostly protected rainforest where there is an abundance of wild-life and birds, yet there are no poisonous snakes or other deadly creatures to surprise you.

The coastal waters around Tobago are teeming with fish, so you will find tasty seafood and shellfish on the menus in restaurants and hotels.

The best Scuba dive-sites in Tobago are at Speyside and Goat Island. World renowned for 5 huge pristine coral reefs the area is excellent for drift-diving and boasts many spectacular underwater sights.

A must visit is **Pigeon Point** near Store Bay, the pristine white sandy beach and crystal clear water provide a fabulous opportunity to swim, take a boat ride, or just snorkel over the shallow corals of Bucco Reef. It's alive with beautiful coloured fish, corals and plants. It's a stunning location and no visit to Tobago would be complete without photographing one of the most beautiful beaches in the world.

Internet On Your Television

Do you have a WiFi enabled laptop computer? It is a relatively simple operation to connect it to a VGA enabled (HD) flat screen TV. Read your TV manual to see if it has a VGA input connector.

You will need a VGA lead to connect the laptop graphics output connector to the input on the back of the TV. You will also need an audio lead with a small stereo headphone jack plug on one end (for the laptop audio output) and two "phono" connectors on the other end for either the TV stereo input or to go into your HiFi. These leads can be bought at places like PC World, Currys or on the internet and are not very expensive.

Once connected to your TV, using the TV remote control, find the button which controls your graphics input – this will show a menu on the screen with things like AV1 & AV2 etc. Make a note of where it is set now (in order to get back to your TV later) and then look for an entry which says "RGB" or "PC" or some such and choose it. This will display your laptop screen on your TV screen. You can turn off your laptop screen if you wish by finding the (usually blue coloured) key "fn" (function) and the screen icon key (again in blue) and toggle them between "laptop screen", "both screens" & "remote screen" (your telly).

To alter the volume use either the laptop or the TV/Hifi. Of course, you can also use the laptop CD/DVD player to play your music and films on the big screen.

You can now watch any internet content including BBC iPlayer, BBC children's videos and games and, if you go to www.google.co.uk, choose "more" and "video" and you can search for thousands of videos of all descriptions for endless enjoyment. What's more, IT IS ALL IN THE COST OF YOUR BROADBAND CONNECTION. You can save most content to your hard drive too.

To use your laptop elsewhere, just turn it off and unplug it!

For more convenient control, use a USB remote keyboard/mouse combination. I use a Keysonic (ACK-540RF) keyboard which is almost square and has a scroll feature on the mouse touch-pad. The shape makes it very convenient to use in your armchair.

MARYLAND COOKIESIngredients

8oz plain flour
1 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons of baking powder
 $\frac{3}{4}$ teaspoon Bicarbonate of soda
3 oz chocolate drops
4 oz margarine
4 oz sugar
5 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz Golden Syrup
Pinch of salt.

Method

- 1) Sieve the dry ingredients.
- 2) Rub in the margarine, add the sugar and the chocolate drops.
- 3) Mix to a dough with the syrup.
- 4) Divide the dough into 4 equal pieces
- 5) Form each piece into a roll 1 inch in diameter.
- 6) Cut each roll into 12 equal pieces and roll into balls.
- 7) Place on a greased baking tray, allowing for the biscuits to spread, then flatten slightly with a palette knife.
- 8) Bake for 15 – 20 minutes at regulo 5 or 375 F.

MAY IN YOUR GARDEN

(With acknowledgements to the RHS)

- Take action to protect your plants if night frosts are forecast
- Water plants that need it regularly
- Prune spring-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering
- Take softwood cuttings of shrubs
- Lightly trim box and other formal hedging
- Prune *Clematis Montana* after flowering
- Take cuttings from herbaceous perennials
- Cut back and divide spring-flowering perennials
- Plant out dahlias at the end of the month
- Protect young plants from slugs
- Clear out spring bedding and begin hardening off summer bedding plants
- Thin out annuals and vegetables sown outdoors earlier
- Feed fish regularly and give a special aquatic fertiliser to water plants
- Feed and weed lawns to encourage good growth, as well as mowing regularly.
- Sow and plant out tender vegetables at the end of the month
- Protect crops from carrot fly
- Continue succession sowing of vegetables
- Remove all frost protection from fruit trees and start pruning trained plums and cherries
- Move tender plants in pots outside for summer
- Ventilate greenhouses and conservatories and think about permanent shading for summer.

LAST CHANCE

- Sow or turf new lawns before it gets too dry
- Finish planting evergreen shrubs

GET AHEAD

- Sow biennials for next year's spring bedding plants
- Inspect plants regularly for signs of pests and diseases.
