Meppershall Village Hall News

The AGM of the Meppershall Village Hall Committee was held in July. Andy Geneux stepped down as Chairman and Karen Lucas stepped down as Secretary, but agreed to carry on as Bookings Secretary. Steve Ansell was appointed new Chairman and Linda Gold was appointed Secretary.

The first main fundraising event for the new Committee will be the Bonfire Night and Firework Display being held on Saturday 1st November. Please come along and support this evening. There is also going to be a building and judging of the Guy during the day. There will be food available from the Fish & Chip van that comes along to the village on a Monday night, and after the display all are welcome to the Village Hall for a disco. Tickets will be sold in advance or at the gate on the evening (see advertisement in this month's Messenger for ticket prices). Any burnable rubbish can be dumped on the site of the bonfire from $10^{th} - 12^{th}$ October, $17^{th} - 19^{th}$ October, $24^{th} - 26^{th}$ October and Friday 31st October to mid-day Saturday 1st November. The gates to the track will be open from 6am to 6pm on those days (with the exception of Saturday 1st November). I stress the word "burnable" - this **DOES NOT** include glass, tyres, fridges, freezers, any items made of metal, or any other nasties! Please, please use your common sense with regards to this. Also, as a safety point, after the event the bonfire will be left smouldering until it is cool enough to clear away. Obviously, this will be done as soon as possible, but it is advisable **not** to allow your dog or child to walk over the burnt ashes; it is not safe and any accidents or injuries will not be the responsibility of the Village Hall. Again, please use your common sense!

The Committee plan to do several fundraisers throughout the year and your support is invaluable. Finally, if anyone has any matters that they wished raised at our Committee Meetings, please let either Steve or Linda know. The Village Hall is for everyone in the village, and your input is most welcome.

Meppershall Parish Council Report

The September meeting of the Parish Council took place on Wednesday 3rd September at Meppershall Lower School. The Council first welcomed a visit from our Beat Officer, PC Busby, who presented an update on police activity in the village but unfortunately reported difficulties with providing the services of Community Support Officers at present. If anyone wishes to contact the police on non-urgent matters messages can be left by telephone at the Police Post at Shefford or in the book at the Post Office.

Highways and Lighting

Councillor Bryant reported that survey work has been carried out with a view to improving the pavement outside the Post Office but that funds had not yet been allocated.

Environment and Leisure

A number of Planters have been ordered after organisations were found to maintain the planting. In a further effort to enhance the village spring bulbs are on order, volunteers willing to help with the planting will be very welcome.

Work on the water supply to the allotments has been put in hand. The contract for grass cutting around the village is renewable in the spring, a specification is to be prepared and tenders sought. A review of some of the older play equipment on Foster's Field will be made to determine actions for the future.

Planning and Housing

A number of applications, principally relating to house extensions, were received during the period and responses made to Mid Beds. As the planning Authority, Mid Beds are currently reviewing responses to the consultation regarding future possible housing sites in the district.

From the District and County Councillors

The Council welcomed back County Councillor Tony Rogers who spoke of the progress being made in preparing for the Central Bedfordshire Unitary Authority.

Parish Plan

The Council are still seeking to establish a working group of interested parishioners to work with the Council to implement the Parish Plan.

Other Matters

The Council have agreed to support the Village Hall Committee in holding the Bonfire Night event this year but wish to urge anyone providing materials for the fire to show consideration in the types of material added to the fire both in view of the pollution which may result during the burn but also the residues which will have to be cleared at considerable cost.

SCHOOL REPORT

Extra Activities at Meppershall VA Lower School

Our recent Ofsted Inspection found that the way the curriculum and other activities meet the range of needs and interests of the learners is 'outstanding'. We aim to sustain and build on this judgement with the opportunities we offer the children, in partnership with the community, parents and outside providers.

With the help of our music teacher, we are forming an after-school choir. We already have a lunchtime recorder club and are starting a new lunchtime computer club for the Year 3 and 4 children.

We are providing additional games and dance input at lunchtimes and our after school drama club 'Rae-Act' is open to Years 1-4. La Jolie Ronde French Club and Premier Sports Club are also available to all the children.

We are delighted that Mrs Edwards has volunteered to continue our popular after school netball club. We extend our thanks to Mrs Ford for her dedicated input over the years.

Mrs Saunders and Mrs Derrick would like to continue our very successful lunchtime Gardening Club and need plenty of the keen gardeners 'out there' to volunteer to help out on an occasional lunchtime. We will be taking produce from this popular club, to Meppershall Care Home as part of our Harvest Celebration.

Mr Clarke and Mr Savuto have also volunteered to develop football and are looking for more tournaments for our school team to be involved with. Rev Patsy Critchley is re-starting the lunchtime Christian Club that promises to be as popular as the Sparks Holiday Club held at St Mary's Church during the summer holidays.

Jenny Vass our Christian Schools' worker is hoping to set up 'Open the Book'. Volunteers will come in about once every half term and act out Bible stories for the children with props, puppets and a set script. If you're interested in helping, please phone Jenny on 01462 626101.

If you feel you would like to help with any of our clubs, please contact the school office. All of our volunteers are CRB checked.

Paid relief lunchtime supervisors are also required to cover sickness.

Our Adult ICT class, run by Barnfield College, is hoping to re-run classes on Monday and Tuesday mornings in our school hall. If you are interested in learning new computer skills or upgrading old ones please contact the school. The popular adult Yoga class still takes place on a Thursday evening.

Thank you for all the tokens you send in to school. With our 'Computers for Schools' tokens we were able to order 4 sturdy Tuff-Cam video cameras for the children to use as part of their ICT curriculum. Our sports tokens allowed us to order a 'maze' playground marking and 2, 4 in1 target goals for football.

If your child's birth date falls between 1/9/04 and 31/8/05 and you haven't yet applied for a place in our 'Outstanding' Foundation Stage class in September 2009, please contact the school office on 01462 813293. Mrs Reynolds, our secretary, will arrange a time for you to visit. We may be able to take children from outside the village in accordance with our Admissions Policy. Meppershall Bakery Bees by Roger

Autumn is a lovely time, most harvesting is over, the garden is quiet, bees have settled down and have recovered from their resentment following the removal of their honey crop. Even we humans feel the pace of life slowing as the days become shorter. There is a sense of achievement in the jobs that have gone well, and perhaps a determination to do something better next year, but without any urgency, as the need to get started on them seems a long way off.

For myself, as a beekeeper, the hectic rush of weekly inspections, swarm control and honey extraction is over. What with the bad weather in August and the beginning of September, I have not harvested any honey. The honey harvest will not be as good as expected. To harvest the honey we have to clear the bees from the supers by putting a clearer board on top with a "one way escape" called a porter bee escape. The bees can travel down to the brood nest but they cannot immediately figure out how to travel back into the honey supers. It's a one-way trap but only for 24-48 hours. Once the bees are out of the honey supers we need to be prepared to process the honey as soon as possible or within a few days. Extracting the honey is easier to do when it is still warm from the hive. October is the month that bees will begin to cluster when the temperature falls below 18 degrees C and form a complete cluster when the temperature falls below 13 degrees C. Our bees will survive the long winter in excellent condition if we take a little extra care.

After taking the honey we have to feed the bees with a sugar syrup,

that is 2kgs of sugar to 1 pint of water, to replace the honey we have taken. A good colony will need about 20-25k of stores to get through the winter, so we will leave them some of their honey. We also have to place mouse guards on the hives and treat for varroa mite. This treatment takes about six weeks and is done after the honey is taken. Woodpeckers can also be a pest as they have a sweet tooth and do a lot of damage. One of Meppershall hives had some damage, last year, from woodpeckers and mice. Hopefully not this year.

A & D swarms are still going well. Hive A will give about 15kg of honey this year but hive D not so much. I think I will let them keep it for their winter stores.

In the Coral Bay area of Paphos, an excellent beach resort to the west of Larnaca, there are excellent divecentre facilities available which cater for all ages and levels of diving experience. Paphos also has an interesting harbour with fishing boats and yachts. Inland, you'll find a number of championship golf courses, playable throughout the year.

Another popular location with visitors to Cyprus is the family orientated beach resort of Protaras, located eastwards from the airport. Here you will find very good hotels and hotel-apartments that ideal for families with small children. Fabulous Fig Tree Bay beach is a must! Further along the coast is the more lively resort of Ayia Napa, where there are lots of apartments to rent plus hotel accommodation for youngsters to share. Most are suitable for those seeking a lively holiday 'night-life', safe in the knowledge that they can sleep all the next day undisturbed.

In Cyprus, try renting a car to explore parts that many tourists never see. There are cultural places, monasteries and ancient historical sites to explore that may only be a short drive from your hotel or villa; or maybe you could adventure 'off-road' deep into the interior where you will discover the beautiful soaring Troodos mountains, with their spectacular views over the island of Cyprus.

Options for after Year 11

Now that the Schools have started a new academic year, I wonder if you know anyone who has just gone into Year 11? If you do, you may be interested to know what their options are and how to find out more about them.

Many young people choose to stay on at their current School and go into Year $12/6^{th}$ Form. It is usual for the Head of 6^{th} Form to invite applications towards the end of the Autumn Term and a 6^{th} Form Prospectus will show what subject options are available. It should also give details of the entry criteria. Study at AS and A level is considerably more academic in nature than GCSE subjects and therefore, it is not uncommon for Schools to require GCSE exam passes at grades A^* -B in the subject that is going to be studied at the higher level.

Some Schools also offer a vocational programme. The entry criteria for a vocational programme may be slightly lower than for AS subjects although the qualification may be equivalent to A level passes. A vocational programme will have a strong link to the world of work and so, will be more specifically applicable to a certain area of work than A levels are.

Some young people choose to enter a 6^{th} Form but at a different School to the one where they studied for GCSEs. Some Schools may advertise a 6^{th} form information evening but to be on the safe side, it is usually best to make contact with any School that is of interest to ask about Open Evenings and application procedures.

An alternative to 6th form would be Colleges of Further Education, such as Bedford College, North Herts College and Barnfield College. The Colleges usually run a number of Open Evenings during the year and the first of these tend to be in November. Please be aware, if you are interested in a very popular course, applications should be in to the Colleges by Christmas!

Training and Apprenticeships are another option. Some young people find they are very unhappy in a formal educational environment and therefore,

an option where they can earn and learn at the same time is very appealing.

There is too much to fully cover all these options here but you can contact Connexions, a School based Connexions Co-ordinator or Careers Teacher, or speak to an independent careers specialist - the Institute of Careers Guidance has a list of suitably qualified practitioners.

Low Cost Higher Definition TV Pictures

Part 2 of 2

HD TVs have the ability to improve the signal input from your digital broadcasts and DVD player in order to display it correctly on the screen. However, in recent months, peripheral equipment such as DVD players, Digital Boxes and PVRs (digital Personal Video Recorders) are increasingly providing high quality "Upscaling" of their output to the television allowing the signal to be chosen (read the simple instructions, usually a one button click sequence) to better match the capabilities of the HD TV. In most cases this will improve the picture to, as near as makes no difference, High Definition.

All your existing DVDs and any stored digital programmes will be able to take advantage as well as new digital TV programs and DVDs. After purchasing one of these terrific little boxes all you need is the HDMI cable to connect it to your TV. Your HD TV should automatically adjust to the new input but if it does not, go to the "Input Menu" on your remote and navigate to the "HDMI" input. Programs made in High Definition such as Doctor Who are particularly spectacular but all program material gets a boost. Remember, HD pictures are much sharper than our eyes can resolve so you could be paying a lot for what you cannot see!

The downside of this is that you will currently expect to pay around £100 extra for these boxes to account for the "Upscaling" but the good news is you will not have to buy an expensive Blue Ray HD DVD player and suffer the £30 per film cost to play on it or pay extra for receiving HD content from Satellite (much of which is not made in HD yet anyway). All your home-made DVDs and photos will look wonderful using an "Upscaling" DVD player as well. For the football fan, well, just try it!

It should be noted that all electronic media hardware needs a "bedding in" period (like running in a car) before it gives of its best. Turning on your new equipment and running it constantly from dawn to bedtime for a couple of days will greatly assist this process. Also, the aerials in TV shops are shared and do not always best reflect the great picture quality attainable at home.

- 3. Fill it with suitable items for a child from 2 to 4, 5 to 9, 10 to 14, boy or girl. The items need not be new but must be in good condition.
- 4. Send it to the local organiser

The box then gets sent to a child somewhere in the world who is homeless, lives in orphanages or is without family support or whose life has been blighted by poverty, ill health, natural disaster, conflict or war. The stories behind the boxes and the children who receive them are harrowing: a boy who can now go to school because he has pen and paper; children who have to be told that sweets are for them to eat as they have never had a sweet in their life. Steve and Carolyn at the Post Office and Mary and Roger at the Bakery have agreed to accept any donations or please give them to a Brownie or call in at the Village Hall on a Monday between 6 and 7.30 pm or bring to me at home.

Some suggestions of items to go in the boxes are:

Cuddly toys, toothbrush, toothpaste, notepad, writing pads, picture books, pencils, pens, crayons, felt tips, hat, cap, gloves, scarf, ball, puzzle e.g. small jigsaw, toy car, truck, passenger plane, girl's jewellery, soap, facecloths, sweets (well within their sell by date), but not chocolate or puzzle books.

Items that cannot be included are: liquids; clothing if not listed above; sharp objects; books with English words, as the boxes with be sent to many countries; glass containers and other fragile items; war related toys as many of the children have only too much experience of the real thing.

- E NRICH the lives of local children and young people with all the care, teaching, fun and worship God wants them to enjoy




Send a Cow work with some of the most vulnerable groups in Africa, including children orphaned by war, families affected by HIV/AIDS, and disabled people.

OCTOBER

RICH TOMATO & SAUSAGE CASSEROLE

INGREDIENTS

454g (1lb) Lincolnshire sausages 1 medium onion, sliced`` 2 cloves garlic, crushed 100g (4oz) mushrooms, whole 397g (14oz) can of chopped tomatoes. 300ml (1/2 pint) stock 2x5ml sp (2 tbsp) tomato puree 1x5ml sp (1 tsp) sugar. 1x2.5 sp (½ tsp) dried mixed herbs.

METHOD.

- 1) In a large non-stick saucepan dry fry the sausages and onion for 4-5 minutes.
- 2) Cut in half.
- 3) Add all remaining ingredients and bring to the boil, simmer and cover for 30 minutes.
- 4) Serve with jacket potatoes and seasonal vegetables or crusty bread.
- 5) Great supper for bonfire night.

GARDEN TIPS FOR OCTOBER

With acknowledgements to the RHS

- Rake up fallen leaves and pile them up to make leafmould
- Continue clearing up the garden, and burn or bin any debris that show signs of fungal infection
- Dig over empty areas of soil
- Finish planting evergreen shrubs
- Take hardwood cuttings from shrubs and fruit bushes
- Collect berries from seeds and shrubs for seed-sowing
- Give conifer hedges a last trim if necessary
- Plant new climbers and perennials
- Divide overgrown perennials
- Protect alpines from winter wet
- Lift and store dahlias, gladioli and summer-flowering bulbs
- Plant lily and tulip bulbs
- Tidy ponds and remove pumps for the winter
- Make new lawns from turf
- Cut down the dying tops of perennial vegetables
- Lift and divide rhubarb
- Fix grease bands to apple and pear tree trunks to catch pests that crawl up them
- Insulate the greenhouse and check that heaters are in good order

LAST CHANCE

- · Sow grass seed
- Finish planting spring bedding
- Harvest apples and pears before they are damaged
- Lift and store tender perennials
- Lift potatoes and carrots and store them

GET AHEAD

- Prepare the ground for planting bare-rooted stock next month
- Make early sowings of broad beans for next year
- Sow sweet peas for next year under cover
