But I would like to convey my thanks to the 6 people who did respond with further insight into past Neighbourhood schemes and registering their interest in setting up a scheme in the village.

It has been brought to my attention that some residents believe that there is a current scheme within the village because they display the Home Watch sticker. I have spoken with the Watch Scheme co-ordinator for Bedfordshire Police and there is not an official Home Watch scheme for the village. There is only one part of the village that has an active scheme and that is based in the High Street. If you do not live in this part of the village then you are not in a Home Watch scheme.

The next steps I will be taking to set up a scheme are to carry on liaising with the Home Watch co-ordinator and to work with the 6 people who are interested in setting up a scheme. In the meantime, I would welcome more people to register their interest and help keep the lovely village of Meppershall a safe place to live.

Meppershall Parish Council Report

The October meeting of the Parish Council took place on Wednesday 1st October at Meppershall Lower School.

Highways and Lighting

The Council were pleased to note that the work to improve the pavement outside the Post Office has begun. Discussions are continuing with Aragon Housing in order to explore ways to improve parking in Fildyke Road, perhaps by the provision of off road parking bays.

Environment and Leisure

The Planters have arrived and will shortly be placed with the organisations that have generously offered to maintain the planting. Volunteers willing to help with the planting of the spring bulbs will be very welcome.

The specification for grass cutting around the village has been prepared and tenders will be sought in November.

Following a review of some of the older play equipment on Foster's Field it is regretted that the tyre swing is beyond sensible and economic repair. It will be removed and the Council will consider replacement equipment. If any users have a view on what you would like in its place please let a Councillor or the Clerk know.

Planning and Housing

No new applications were considered although a number of approvals were notified. As the planning Authority, Mid Beds are launching the Public Consultation for the New Design Guide For Mid Bedfordshire. As usual anyone wishing to comment on the way planning and housing may go in our area may respond via the website or in writing to Mid Beds at Chicksands.

From the District and County Councillors

The Chairman welcomed our District and County Councillors who reported during the meeting that the plans for the reorganisation of the councils into the Unitary Authority were progressing but inevitably policy decisions were being delayed.

Parish Plan

The Council has begun to make visible progress on aspects of the Plan which fall within its remit or influence, but is still seeking other organisations and interested parishioners to work with the Council to implement other aspects.

Other Matters

Arrangements the Bonfire Night event this year have been put in place and with good fortune and consideration should ensure an enjoyable night out.

SCHOOL REPORT

Meppershall VA Lower School 'An Outstanding Church of England School'

As a Church school, we have an additional Statutory Inspection of Anglican Schools close to the time of any Ofsted inspection. As you know, we had a wonderful Ofsted report in June 08, a copy of which can be read on the Ofsted Website. We are all equally delighted at this September 08, S.I.A.S. inspection judgement which summarised by saying:

'Meppershall is an outstanding Church of England school with an excellent working partnership with the church. The extent to which Christian values permeate the experience of the day by day experiences of both adults and children, creates a Christian ethos in which children, of all ages develop academically, spiritually, socially and morally in a safe and happy environment.'

A full copy of this report can be found on the 'National Society' website or is available from the school office. The whole school community of children, teachers, support staff, parents, volunteers and governors are to be congratulated on this wonderful achievement.

Our Governing Body

We have eleven governors, plus the head teacher, Moira Coomes, on our Governing Body. All eleven are hard working, committed volunteers who are dedicated to the success of the school. Several of the current governors are also parents or former parents at the school. These include Gillian Marshall-Davies, Lisa Frost, Oliver Steeley and Alex Sinfield who are parents of children currently in years 1, 2 and 3 and Vince Holmes who is parent of a former pupil. Roger Bryant is our Parish Council member and he has a grandson in Year 1. Gill Smith is the teacher governor and our local authority governor is Jacqui Plumley who lives in the village and has a background in education.

Rev John Harper, the Rector and Rev Patsy Critchley, the Curate, from St Mary's Church, Meppershall, are also on our Governing Body.

Our Chair of Governors, for the last few years, has been Margaret Evesham. Margaret has stepped down as Chair this September although she stays on the Governing Body, giving us the continued benefit of her expertise and wealth of experience. Vince Holmes has taken over as Chair and we know that we will continue going from strength to strength, benefiting from his support and expertise. Richard Bulley is our Clerk to the Governors and his other role as editor of the informative 'Meppershall Messenger' helps us to maintain and develop our links with the village.

You can still apply for places in Meppershall's Outstanding Church of England School. If your child's birth date falls between 1/9/04 and 31/8/05 and if you have not already done so, please contact the school office on 01462 813293 as soon as possible. Mrs Reynolds, our secretary, will arrange a time for you to visit before you submit your application form. There are also a few places available in some other year groups. We may be able to take children from outside the village in accordance with our Admissions Policy.

Meppershall Bakery Bees by Roger

As predicted in October, the honey harvest was not good. Only 15lbs of honey from each hive, 45lbs in total, not very good. One reason for this was, when I placed the clearer board on top to clear the bees out on the Sunday, it usually takes about 24 - 48hours to clear, it then rained on the Monday so was then left until Tuesday. By which time the bees could not get out to forage so they took the honey from the supers and deposited it in the brood box for winter stores. We learn by our mistakes. Better luck next year. I have been feeding the remaining hives with sugar syrup and checking for the varoa mite: so far so good. All hives should get through the winter. They will need about 25 kilos of stores for winter food. Meppershall hives are now 6. Sadly swarm D was too small so I have united it with a queenless colony. To do this we take the queenless colony and place a sheet of newspaper over the brood box and place the Queen rite colony on top. Within 24 hours the bees will eat through the newspaper and become friends. This they have done.

I am feeding the bees with sugar syrup at 2lbs sugar to 1 pint of water. (Not as stated in Octobers issue. Typing error – Sorry!)

November is a good time to take stock of things and tidy up the apiary which at the moment looks like a tip with empty hives, lifts and supers all over the place. Some of the hives need a good coat of paint and a touch of t.l.c. so they are ready for next spring, which is just around the corner. This year I have some spare wax from cappings from the honey extracting and some dirty frames, so I might have a go at candle making.

Candle making is one of the most popular, educational and therapeutic of hobbies, beautiful shapes can be formed in a variety of ways. Bees wax is a 'green wax' from a renewable source and totally environmentally friendly. It burns evenly with a lovely aroma, it is pleasant to touch and easy to work. It is the King of the waxes and as such is highly sought after by cosmetic and polish producers as well as candle makers.

The Dolmus is the most practical form of mini-bus that is used to get around Turkish towns and villages, but you will rarely travel alone and often be accompanied by small animals and their owners.

The seaside resorts of Marmaris and Kalkan also provide a wide choice of hotels and holiday villas. If you're flexible or seeking alternative holiday accommodation, the southern coast resort of Antalya is extremely popular with golfers who are attracted to it's luxurious golf courses and mild climate throughout the year.

Once you have booked your hotel or villa accommodation in Turkey, consider a visit to the ancient ruins of Ephesus or the warm 'healing' waters of Pammukale. These can easily be arranged at your nearest Tourist Information Centre, both trips you'll never forget.

Put digital photos onto CD / DVD and share

So now you have all those precious digital images on your camera, you have plugged it into your computer and used the default automatic windows software to place them in My Pictures folder in My Documents. What now?

To let other people enjoy them there are several ways to do it. You can put copies on a CD/DVD disc, you can turn them into a slide show on your computer desktop and you can email them.

There is a very easy way to copy them to disc using *Windows Explorer*. Provided that your Computer has a re-writable CD or DVD and a blank re-writable disc loaded in, *Right Click on Start / Left Click on "Explore" /* and this will open *Windows Explorer*. Click on *My Documents (near the top) / My Pictures* and choose the photos you wish to copy by shading them. How to do this? If the photos all follow on from each other in sequence then click on the first one, hold down your *Shift Key* and click on the last one. If you want to choose odd ones here or there, click on the first one, hold down the *ctrl key* whilst clicking on each one you wish to copy. Your choices will now be shaded. *Right Click* anywhere in the shaded area and *Left Click* on *Copy*. Now go back to the left side of the screen and come down until you find your CD / DVD player and *Left Click* on it. Go to the now empty right hand side and *Right Click* choose *Paste* and all you photos will appear "ghosted" ready to be "written" to your disc.

Now go to the top left of your screen and choose *File / Write these files to CD or DVD*, give the disc a <u>short</u> name or date (no more than about 20 characters) and click on *Next*. The files will now quickly be written to your disk and just follow the easy instructions when this is accomplished.

You should now be able to share these photos with anyone who has a computer or domestic CD / DVD player bought in the last five years. Also, you may wish to use this method to backup your photos and keep them safe away from your home in case of fire or theft. To write on your disc buy a CD/DVD felt tip pen or be fancy and buy a labelling kit from PC World.

To change or place a picture on your Desktop, *Right Click* on any photograph file, choose *Set as Desktop Background* and it will magically appear there. Emailing and slideshows in the next article.

There are lots of stories about where the boxes go to on this web site and they are interesting to read on how a simple gift of a filled shoe box can give so much pleasure www.operationchristmaschild.org.uk/stories. These are just one or two examples:

A child overjoyed because he had pen and paper in his box and so would now be allowed to go to school.

Children who have **never** had a toy of their own.

"All the young children I meet have been born here. I visit a house, which measures 15 feet by 12 feet, where a family of four must eat, wash and sleep. Although it has basic equipment it is no bigger than the size of my room back home. The families tell of their total despair and depression they feel they have no future. But the children show sheer joy as they open their shoe boxes: Moma, 3, is delighted with his toy cars and plays with them transfixed. He does not let them out of his grip and beams for the camera, his wide smile animating his whole face. Angela, 10, shows off her new scarf and hat and is clearly very proud. She takes each item out of the box one by one, and then neatly places everything back in there even the elastic band." - description of the effects of boxes sent to Serbia.

A little girl of eight who has never even seen a Barbie doll before – and strokes the doll's long hair in wonder.

A girl of nine who has never seen herself in a mirror before – and makes little faces at herself in amazement.

Many thanks for all your support in earlier years and hopefully this year. Things may look bleak here at the moment with current economic problems but nothing like these children face every day.



Dear friends, 'to have and to hold from this day forward'...

One of the greatest delights of my job is to be able to get to know couples as they look forward to their wedding, and then to conduct the ceremony on their big day. It's always feels a great privilege to be so involved in something so important in their lives, and my hope is that something of the significance of the words and actions of the service stays with them as the months and years go by. Sometimes however I have found myself having to explain to enquiring couples that I am not in a position to conduct their wedding, usually because they are not able to satisfy the legal requirements for a wedding in this benefice. Either they do not live in the parish or they are not able to meet the fairly stringent demands of a 'Special Licence'. Often the sound of disappointment in their voice has been guite tangible. However, as from last month, the legal grounds for marriage in the local Church have been extended, and not I feel, before time. The Church authorities have always tried to protect the principle that there should be a genuine connection between those being married and the Church where their ceremony is conducted. This was established in the days where people for the most part lived their whole lives within the same neighbourhood, and where the local Church was the place of worship they naturally identified with. Today that is the exception rather than the rule, and often people feel that they connect with a particular Church even though they live far from it, and may never have lived within its parish.

So in recognition of changing social patterns, the Church has widened the grounds for permission to marry. In brief, couples who live outside the parish may now marry in the Parish Church if they can provide evidence that:

- One or other was baptised or confirmed there;
- A parent or grandparent was married there;
- One or other, or a parent, has lived in the parish for at least 6 months.
- One or other, or a parent, has habitually attended worship there for at least 6 months. (please note this is not an exhaustive summary). In addition, couples, as before, may marry at the Church where at least one has their name on the Church Electoral Roll, or of course where one or other lives in the parish.

So the opportunities are much greater now for Churches to welcome those who seek the assurance and the richness of a Christian wedding. Given certain safeguards and assurances there is also opportunity for those who have been previously married to apply for their wedding on the same grounds as above. I believe a key characteristic of the Church should be her willingness to say 'Yes' to those who seek her ministry, and I trust that this new legislation will extend that 'Yes' to many more of those who are looking for the blessing that marriage in the sight of God provides. Patsy or I will always be pleased to explain the options for a Church wedding and what is involved in preparation, to any who may wish to enquire.

COMMUNITY CHAPLAINS NEEDED

Community Resettlement Support Project is a new charity set up as a *Community Chaplaincy* which has been set up to support men who are preparing to be released from **HMP Bedford**, supporting them as they leave through the gate into the communities of Bedfordshire, Luton and N Hertfordshire and in the days and weeks following their release as they resettle in the community.

Why is there a need for this Project?

HMP Bedford is a Category B Remand Prison for adult men aged 21+. Nationally the re-offending rate for offenders returning to prison within 2 years of their release is 55% and higher for younger men. This is a situation which affects offenders, their families, their children and all our communities. Many men who are released face high levels of stress, anxiety and loneliness as they are released from prison and need someone who will listen to them and support them as they seek to turn their lives around.

The Community Resettlement Support Project has been developed by the multi-faith Chaplaincy Team at HMP Bedford. The ethos of the Project is based on the Community Chaplaincy initiative originally developed in churches in Canada with proven success at reducing reoffending rates.

Rev'd Sally White, Chaplain at HM Prison Bedford and a Trustee said "This work is one way for the Christian Community in our area and individual Christians to show the love of God in a practical way for a group of people outside of the life of the Church"

Bishop Christopher said "The virtues of courage, hope and patience are not very often found in civic society these days, but in the charitable sector they are alive and well. The charitable project led by Sally White and others is ground-breaking, committed as it is to some of the most needy and vulnerable people in society. I wish it every success."

CHOCOLATE AND PEAR TART

INGREDIENTS.

1 pkt shortcrust pastry

125g ground almonds.

2 eggs

125g butter, softened.

95g caster sugar

185g Luxury Continental Belgian dark chocolate, melted

3 conference pears, peeled, cored and quartered.

METHOD

- 1) Preheat the oven to 190 oC, 3750 F, gas mark 5.
- 2) Roll out pastry until ½ cm thick and use it to line a 24cm tart tin. Leave in the freezer to rest for at least 20 minutes, or as long as you can
- 3) Bake the pastry for around 10 minutes in the preheated oven, then remove, set aside, and reduce the oven temperature to 1700 C, 3250 F, and gas mark 3.
- 4) Mix your almonds, eggs, butter and sugar together, and stir in the melted chocolate while still warm.
- 5) Pour the mixture evenly into the pastry case.
- 6) Bake the tart for 45 minutes until the pastry is golden brown and the chocolate and almonds mixture is firm. Serve warm with crème fraiche.
