# Meppershall Parish Council Report

The latest meeting of the Parish Council was held on Wednesday 6th May at Meppershall Lower School.

This was the annual meeting of the Council when the Officers and spokespersons for the various groups of the Council were elected. The only change was at the top; the Chairman John Parsons asked not to be considered for another term so I was nominated and duly elected to the post. John was an excellent Chairman and I hope I can maintain the high standard he set.

At the open part of the meeting Linda Parker informed Councillors that a Gardening Club had been formed and that they would like to use their skills to plant up and care for the areas around the Village Hall. The Council had recently obtained four planters and it was agreed that the group, once permission had been granted from the Village Hall Management Committee, could use the planters.

# **Highways & Lighting** (spokesman Cllr. Roger Bryant)

A joint inspection of the village had taken place with numerous areas for repair being marked up. Repairs should be completed by the end of May. Paul Makin, Mayor of Shefford is actively supporting Cllrs Carne and Rogers in keeping the footpath to Shefford high on the agenda with the new Central Bedfordshire Council.

The additional parking in Fildyke Road opposite Buxton Close has no start date but is due to be completed in this financial year.

Environment & Leisure (spokesman Cllr. Paul Merryweather) Grass cutting is being undertaken by the existing contractor. As mentioned last month the area on Foster's Field affected by the village bonfire has been cleared and reseeded. It was agreed to inform the Village Hall Management Committee that they will not be allowed to have a bonfire on Parish Council land because of the costs involved. The annual inspection of the play equipment is due before the Spring Bank holiday.

The proposal for the low level solar powered lighting to the teenage area appears to be getting negative responses from planning representatives on the grounds that the light may attract youths to the area for longer periods. We await the final response late this month.

# **Planning & Housing** (spokesman Cllr. Peter Chapman)

Apart from the Council's own planning application re the lighting in the play area, there were no applications for consideration this month.

# **Health & Safety** (spokesman Cllr Michael Castle)

Cllr Castle highlighted some problems with lumps of concrete and protruding steelwork on and around Fosters Field. Once the Clerk receives a comprehensive list, he will instruct a contractor to do the necessary work.

# From our Shadow Councillors.

Cllrs. Carne and Rogers reported that the new Central Bedfordshire Council organisation is bedding in well with only IT problems causing concern. Also in attendance were Lewis Birt and Tony Brown the Conservative Party nominees for the two Shefford, Campton and Meppershall seats on the new Unitary Authority.

# Other Matters.

The village sign that resides at the junction of the High Street and Cracklehill Road has been away for refurbishment and should be back in place by the end of May.

The refurbished gates to the churchyard are now in place.

A grant of £500 was made to The Meppershall Messenger to assist in the financing of the 25th Anniversary Issue.

The installation of the CCTV should be completed by the end of May.

# Meppershall Bakery Bees by Roger

Meppershall bees are very busy. All 7 hives have colonies and are doing well. We have 3 new queens, from our own stock, who should be laying eggs by the time you read this. The old queens did not die; I have placed them in small nucs, or small hives, just in case the new queens fail. As soon as the oilseed rape turns green the honey will flow. So by early June there will be honey for sale at the bakery.(It's been a long 6 months!)

At one of the inspections, I noticed antennae coming out of the drone brood comb. As the drones take longest to hatch, the varoa mite prefer to lay their eggs in these cells. I watched George (a male drone bee) emerging from his cell and closely inspected him as his legs were kicking in the air, for varoa mites. He was clean and with a little help from me crawled away to wait for his wings to dry and to join his colony.

At the beginning of May I was carrying out artificial swarm control without the proper footwear. So... protective clothing is a must for all beekeepers. No-one should examine bees without a veil, gloves and boots etc. One feature of beekeeping today is a general prevalence of combined veil and bee-suits. These plus gloves and

boots offer the most complete protection available. When I visited the bees I was stung on the foot – twice. After the initial pain the sting produced swelling which was quite spectacular. As these swellings declined, the next reaction was spectacular itching, which lasted two days. I now wear my boots every time I visit the bees. You must be aware that your reactions to stings get less (or so I was lead to believe) However , if your reactions get worse rather than better, or you start to develop reactions like nettle rash, seek medical advice. It can get so bad that a single sting can cause death. However wonderful a hobby beekeeping is, it is not worth using it as means of giving work to the undertakers!

# **Financial News Update**

This is the first of what I hope will become a regular feature, with future subject matter being requested by you, the Messenger readers. Please either call or email me with topics you would like covered, although please be aware that I cannot answer issues personal to you in the pages of this magazine. That would require a meeting, so this (and following articles) can only deal with the generic subject matter.

There has been so much going on in the world of finance these past eighteen months that it is difficult to know where to start, so I have chosen to kick off with some good news. I'm going to start with ISA's (or Individual Savings Accounts to give them their full name). These are tax free savings plans that are available to anyone who is over 18 and resident in the UK. There are two types of ISA – a Mini-ISA, and a Maxi-ISA, and you can have two mini-, or one maxi- ISA in each tax year (6<sup>th</sup> April to 5<sup>th</sup> April the following year). Mini-ISA's are usually marketed as 'Cash ISA's by Banks and Building Societies, and Maxi-ISA's are often called 'Stocks and Shares ISA's'. If you do not use your allowance in any year, it is lost for that year, you cannot roll it over. You can save regularly (e.g. monthly) or by paying-in lump sums, but you must not exceed your allowance for that year. Another little wrinkle is that it is the amount you put in that counts towards your annual allowance e.g. if you put in the maximum in a particular tax year, then draw half of it back out, you cannot put anymore in – you have used your allowance for that year.

Until the recent Budget the limits were £3,600 p.a. for a mini-ISA, and £7,200 for a Maxi-ISA; however the good news is that the Chancellor in his recent budget has increased the limits to £5,100, and £10,200 respectively. Sadly, the good news is tempered with the fact that only those over 50 can use the higher limits this tax year, and even then not until October (to give the providers time to

adjust their systems), with the new limits being open to those under 50 from next tax year (2010/11).

Despite this, everyone should use their ISA allowance to the best of their circumstances. The savings grow tax-free, and you can have it all back any time you like, again with no tax to pay, so it really does make sense to use your allowance to the full. For many this will mean using some or all of their mini, or cash-ISA limit (and please shop around for the best deals). For those fortunate enough to have larger sums available, please make sure you use as much of your allowance as you can. There are hundreds of investment funds to choose from covering the whole risk spectrum from cautious to speculative. If you have any stocks & shares already, make sure that as many of them as possible are "sheltered" in an ISA so that the earnings (if any!) are tax free. After all, there is little enough in this life that is tax-free!

# Polehanger Farm: A Farming Diary - Episode 4

Our crops really get up a head of steam in May and early June before the ear emerges and it starts the ripening process. Mark continues to apply nutrients to optimize this growth and to spray to try and keep on top of fungal diseases which would otherwise reduce the plants' ability to maximize the available soil moisture and sunlight. Difficult weeds that could compete with the crop have already been dealt with over winter and in early spring.

However it doesn't matter how competent one is and how much attention to detail is given, without sunlight and water a cereal plant is doomed to fail.

Which takes me back to the old saying I mentioned last month about when the Oak breaks leaf before the Ash - which it did quite markedly this year - we'll only get a splash. Father has kept rainfall figures for as long as I can remember and based on these for April we only had 1 inch of rain in the month and 6 inches so far this year, which extrapolates to only 18 for the year.

Our average annual rainfall here is around 22 to 23 inches, ranging from just over 16 inches in 1975 and 1976 up to over 30 inches in 1992. There are desert areas in the world that have almost as much rainfall as we do, the difference being that ours is generally spread out little and often throughout the year, rather than in one or two ferocious downpours. Incidentally I have a friend who recently moved out to Auckland in New Zealand. He wrote last week to say that they had had a wet day with just under an inch of rain but a place on the mountainous west coast of the South Island had 38 inches in 48 hours!

My instinct confirms the Oak / Ash saying that this year will be drier than usual which could well stress the crops, particularly the spring sown wheat. If so, then good soil structure is critical to

minimize this stress so that roots can go deep in search of moisture. Yield for each acre sown is simply a factor of two things; total grain numbers and the weight of a given volume of grain. Plump grain weighs more heavily than shrivelled grain.

So rainfall interspersed with sunshine is key to a successful harvest yield. But rainfall during harvest, which we had too much of last year, when the plant is no longer needing moisture, is not welcome. We're a fussy lot! Perversely in the UK a dry summer usually, but not always, means a hot summer. We all know the grey days that affect Eastern England particularly when we see neither sun nor rain.

On a global scale the availability of fresh water (as opposed to salt sea water) is becoming a critical issue for those who predict international affairs. The demand for an increasingly scarce resource to irrigate food crops, and the increasing consumption for meat - it takes about 15 cubic metres of water to produce 1 kg of beef compared to 1-3 cu m for 1 kg of cereals - is likely to cause tension and even hostilities between countries that share water sources.

Next time you (and I) mutter darkly about rain spoiling our plans, think positively about it as a vital part of farming life . . . and therefore your life!

As a nation we spend less of our salaries on our groceries than many other countries in Western Europe – we spend enormous amounts of money on looking good and preserving our outer body; anti-wrinkle creams, skin care, body wraps etc) but when it comes to nurturing our insides it appears to be a totally different story.

# But.....I haven't got the time!

In this day and age of wanting and needing everything to be done quicker than yesterday, modern life runs at a different pace. If you are unable to visit your local shops or farmers market (because of lifestyle constraints or simply that you no longer actually have these local amenities) the convenient solution is to do your shopping on the net. We are not commercial printers and we undertake work only for organisations or charities in the local community, but if that describes you, why not get in touch? We charge only enough to cover our costs and the work keeps our machine well exercised.

# **Computer Tips:**

# WHICH OPERATING SYSTEM?

There are currently three main operating systems available – Windows, MAC and "open source" Linux (in its various forms).

MAC requires an Apple MAC computer to run it and is not commonly used as a domestic operating system.

Linux derived from the UNIX platform used in Server computers and is still very much a "nerds" territory but is appearing in the new "netbook" very small laptop type PCs as it does not take up much hard drive space and is quick to run, it feels nice to use but is still a bit quirky.

MS Windows XP pretty much runs the world at present and has become a stable and fast platform from which to run your programmes. It is taught in most schools and is still available (despite Microsoft trying to kill it off) for most computers. It is still the choice of most business users because it gets the job done with little fuss and few crashes.

MS Vista started life in the usual Microsoft fashion of only partial development, leaving the computing public to find the bugs and the software manufacturers to play catch-up. It was (and is still) slow unless you invest in a computer built within the last 18 months with at least 2 GB of RAM. As an operating system it works generally like XP but well recognised items have been moved around to make it feel "new" and a lot of clutter was added to make the user interface look different. Essentially it was an upgrade to XP.

MS Windows 7 is the next vaunted release to move on from Vista. It is in Beta testing which means "nerds" can download it and use it to help Microsoft find bugs before releasing it to us in its usual part finished form. The only really positive attributes I have seen so far are that it is a slimmed down version of *Vista* to make it run faster and the cluttered feel of *Vista* has been removed. As with *Vista* over *XP*, the user interface has been changed and well known actions altered yet again to make it seem different. In substance, very little has been achieved to improve the customer experience over *XP*. What Microsoft has done in style is, whilst offering a smooth upgrade path from *Vista*, it has decided to "punish" all *XP* users by not offering them the same. To upgrade you will have to wipe everything off your hard drive and literally start from scratch, a task best left to the professionals perhaps?

How can you, when you say you have the power to heal, listen to the agonising, constant screaming of an innocent child?"

I began to doubt God's existence and screamed at him. "Do something or else! Holy Spirit heal her!. When she wakes up tomorrow may it be alright. May she not have any more manipulations or X-rays".

The next morning Zahra woke up whimpering. At breakfast she began to move her arm a little. Two hours before the appointment, she took her sling off, for a while. At the hospital many of her arm movements had returned and the consultant decided not to do any more manipulations. By the end of the day she was almost 100%.

The sceptics could say it was sheer coincidence. But 'coincidences' happen more than is statistically probable in the lives of committed Christians. For example, this month I went to a healing service and from that point made a rapid improvement from sciatica. And my husband, John, got something embedded in his eye that could not be removed at A&E. When he returned for further investigation, it had disappeared.

It feels as if God's healing hands have been over us. In response to God's love, a prayer chain will be starting so that Christians and non-believers may all benefit from God's healing power. Look out for further information in next month's magazine.

Serves 6

# For the dough

6 oz self-raising flour 1 oz margarine A pinch of salt The drained tomato juice from the can

# For the topping

14 oz can chopped tomatoes, drained ½ lb chipolatas, halved lengthwise
1 small onion, chopped
1 level teaspoon basil
2 level tablespoons tomato or own choice chutney
Salt and pepper
1 oz cheese, finely grated

# Method

- 1) Set the oven to hot, gas mark 6 or 400F / 200C
- 2) Rub the margarine into the flour and salt until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs then using the drained juice from the can of tomatoes, stir in enough to give soft, rollable dough.
- 3) On a lightly floured working surface, roll the dough into a 10 inch round and place on a well-oiled baking sheet.
- 4) Mix the drained tomatoes, onion, basil, and chutney, salt and pepper together and spread over the dough, then lay the halved sausages over the top like the spokes of a wheel. Sprinkle the cheese in between the sausages.
- 5) Bake the Sunburst Pizza towards the top of the oven for 30 to 35 minutes.

# **GARDEN TIPS FOR JUNE**

- Keep weeding and deadheading to maintain beds, borders and container displays.
- Water new and young plants as necessary.
- Look out for pests and suckers on roses.
- Prune spring-flowering shrubs.
- Propagate climbers by layering.
- Cut back and tidy up spring flowering perennials.
- Take cuttings from pinks.
- Sow seed for perennials.
- Cut down faded foliage of bulbs; lift and divide overgrown clumps.
- Plant out summer bedding in borders and containers, including hanging baskets.
- Sow plants for winter and spring colour, such as polyanthus and pansies.
- Introduce new fish into the pond.
- Remove blanket weed and duck weed to prevent them clogging up features.
- Mow the lawn and trim edges regularly.
- Give tired lawns a boost with a liquid feed.
- Water new lawns made in the spring.
- Harvest vegetables as they mature.
- Plant winter brassicas and protect them from pets.
- Keep fruit and vegetables well watered during dry spells.
- Shade and ventilate plants in the greenhouse.

## LAST CHANCE

- Plant new plants before the summer heats up.
- Sow hardy annuals outside to flower this year.
- Plant out tender vegetables such as tomatoes and runner beans to get good crops this year.

# **GET AHEAD**

- Sow chicory to force in winter for salads.
- Peg down strawberry runners to make new plants.
- Sow seed for pot plants to flower in winter.
