Meppershall Parish Council Report

The latest meeting of the Parish Council was held on Wednesday 15th July at Meppershall Lower School.

During the open part of the meeting Tony Brown, one of our Councillors on the new Central Bedfordshire Council, said that 91% of those who replied to the questionnaire sent out by the Conservative Party prior to the election were in favour of the new footpath to Shefford and that information had been added to the debate on how quickly the path may be constructed.

There were also representations from the owner/occupiers of The Pigling, Woodview Nurseries regarding the comments made last month about the recent retrospective planning application on their property. Two residents commented on the new gate across the track to the allotments and the chairman of the Village Hall Management Committee (VHMC) detailed the proposals so that a bonfire could be built for firework celebrations.

Highways & Lighting (spokesman Cllr. Roger Bryant)

A list of repairs to the highways and footpaths in the Parish which could be completed under the Enhanced Parish Partnership Scheme has been submitted to Central Bedfordshire. There is still no news on a start date on the additional parking in Fildyke Road opposite Buxton Close but it is due to be completed in this financial year.

Environment & Leisure (spokesman Cllr. Paul Merryweather)

The lighting equipment for Fosters Field has been ordered.

The annual inspection of the play equipment has taken place and items requiring attention have been placed with a contractor to carry out the necessary repairs.

A course of spot weed spraying has been carried out in Old Road Meadow. My apologies to the lady from Hoo Road who rang asking if the work had been carried out safely and was advance notification required, as I mislaid your telephone number. I can confirm that the work was carried out by an authorised contractor using a spray that was

safe once dry. As it was only spot spraying the contractor was satisfied that everything was dry before he left the site.

The gate across the track to Wry Close allotment field has been installed. Following representation from the residents it was agreed to keep the gate open until legal guidance has been received over what rights the residents have to use the track. Once this is received, a final decision would be made.

It was agreed that allotment rents would be increased to £10 per plot. The proposal from the VHMC for the control of the bonfire was approved.

Planning & Housing (spokesman Cllr. Peter Chapman)

There were no applications this month to consider. Regarding the representation from the owners of 'The Pigling', the property was constructed 15 years ago without planning permission. The complete planning procedure, including public enquiry, has taken place and an enforcement notice for the removal of the building is in place. The Council will always back the planning process.

Other Matters.

The plan of all the grass cutting requirements within the Parish has been received and it is hoped that the complete tender document for grass cutting for 2010/12 will be ready for distribution in October.

Meppershall Bakery Bees by Roger

All hives still okay with lots of honey. By the time you read this we should have started to harvest the main crop of honey, which is looking good. At my last inspection, 10th July, I spotted some Queen cells, not swarm cells, but supersedure cells also called Queen cells. The bees create these cells if they believe their queen is not performing up to par. Supersedure is a natural occurrence when the colony replaces an old or ailing queen with a new one. We have had some swarming this year. When a colony swarms half the population leaves with the old queen, looking for a new and more spacious home. With half the girls gone and several weeks lost while the new queen gets up to speed, we are left with far fewer bees gathering honey. We were lucky this did not happen until the first crop was taken at the end of May and with the June gap they have recovered well, with some supers already with honey. We have marked 3 of the new queens with a green marker pen so we can spot them easier in the hives. Green is the colour for 2009 each year having different colours.

The worker bee- The specific jobs and duties they perform during their short lives vary as they age but understanding their roles will deepen your fascination and appreciation of these remarkable creatures. From the moment the worker bee is hatched, she has many and varied tasks clearly cut out for her. As she ages these tasks are many: housekeeping, undertaking, nursery, attending royalty, going to the grocery (royal jelly stores) fanning, architecture and building, guarding the hive and stepping out foraging. (What busy bees!)

The Drone bee- This brings us to the only male bee in the colony. Drones make up a relatively small percentage of the bees' total population. At the peak of the season their numbers may be only in the hundreds. The drone gets a bad rap in many bee books, described as lazy, gluttonous and incapable of caring for himself. You might even begin wondering what he's good for? He mates! Procreation is the drone's primary purpose in life. Despite their high maintenance (they must be fed and cared for by the workers), drones are tolerated and allowed to remain in the hive because they may be needed to mate with a new queen, when the old one dies or needs to be superseded.

Financial News Update

One of the most commonly asked questions at the moment comes from 'people of a certain age' wanting to know where they can put their money to earn a decent return on it. Many retired people have relied upon the interest on their savings as a means of supplementing their incomes. As recently as eighteen months ago, they could get up to 6% p.a. from their bank/building Society accounts. Today, many are getting less than a tenth of that, which means they are rapidly eroding their capital. Furthermore, most people in this age bracket do not have the wherewith all to replenish it.

It is of little comfort that the official rate of inflation is nearly zero; the official measures (the Retail Prices Index, and the Consumer Prices Index) are based on a basket of items that people might buy. Some of these have fallen in price (e.g. phones, plasma TV's etc.,) which serves to offset the items which have gone up in price. The problem is that pensioners tend to spend all their money on the things which have gone up (e.g. food, heating, cooking and so on), which leaves many of them with a personal inflation figure of as much as 10%!

It is still possible to get income of 5% p.a. net of tax, but it involves moving the money out of the bank, and investing in something else. Unfortunately that does involve a little bit of risk, but even here there are schemes which will preserve your capital. The major barriers I come across are emotional ones, and number one is usually that they feel their money is safe in the bank. The bowler-hatted friendly bank manager of yesteryear is long gone I'm afraid – we mustn't forget they are outright money-making institutions. They pay you 0.5% p.a. on your money whilst investing that same money in some of the highest risk investments there are.

Number two is often that they can get at their money if they need it, and yet in many cases they haven't touched that money for years, partly because they need it in place for the interest, and partly because it gives them an emergency fund for everyday needs.

It is true to say that some schemes require the money to be invested for typically five years, but then again there are many bank bonds which lock up your money for several years as well. In any event you can always get your money back if you really need it.

Number three is "What if that company goes bust, will I lose my money?" Well we all now know that only the first £50,000 is guaranteed in the bank; however, many of the schemes I use have protection of 90% of an unlimited amount.

So, in summary, there are ways of getting higher returns on your savings, but make sure you abide by the golden rules – don't put all your eggs in one basket, make sure you have access to sufficient funds for any conceivable emergency, and take professional advice.

So, my message this month is don't let your savings deplete to nothing, there are plenty of places to invest in which are low risk, and which will give you a better return than you are currently getting.

Polehanger: A Farming Diary, Episode 6

There is nothing more that we can do now. The rape and winter wheat crops are starting to ripen and lighten in colour and harvest will soon be upon us. The rape should be ready to combine at the end of July / beginning of August, the winter wheat by mid August and the spring wheat will follow soon after that.

Having been desperate for rain in May and June we would now rather it held off to let harvest happen on time and in the dry, unlike last year. Above 15% moisture, cereal grain in a big heap will heat up and deteriorate. Artificial drying is possible using heated / unheated air blown through the heaps in the storage barn, but the cheapest way to dry grain is to let the sun do it in the field! In order to get a decent length of day for harvesting, combines may have to start to cut above 16% expecting that moisture readings will fall as the day progresses and the sun gets to work. Harvesting is often done after dark before the moisture levels rise again with the dew.

The really heavy downpours of rain in early July have been very localized and we have missed many of them. We have even noticed differences in rainfall measurements at our end of the village compared to the top end. Anyhow, torrential rain at this time of year is of little use to crops and is likely to cause damage.

Have you heard of Georgina Downs? After suffering ill health that she claims is caused by chemical spray drift, she has been campaigning, very effectively against the use of agricultural pesticides next to residential properties that border cropped fields. Last November she won a 'landmark' case in the High Court when the judge ruled that DEFRA's policy on protecting bystanders from crop spraying was unlawful. On 7th July the Court of Appeal overturned this ruling. However it is quite likely that Hilary Benn, the Environment Minister there isn't a cabinet minister for farming and fisheries anymore - will introduce some form of compulsory restrictions to protect bystanders from crop spraying whatever the outcome of any further rulings on the Downs case.

Clearly pesticides are toxic to a point, as is the fly spray we use in our kitchen or the exhaust emitted from my car. However, farmers can only use products that are recommended after extensive testing and subsequent licensing before becoming available. So it feels rather harsh when the inference of some reporting of a case such as this is that we farmers are pouring vast quantities of poison indiscriminately onto our crops without a thought for the well being of anyone else.

Aside from any personal mutterings as a farmer, this does raise some interesting issues about the interface between the general public and industry of any kind. Noise, dust, fumes and smells are generated from a multitude of industrial and retail activities as well as agriculture. The difference, I suppose, is that no one pays a premium to live next to an industrial estate whereas they might consider doing so for a garden that looks out over fields!

How does our society reconcile the apparent conflict over the rights and needs of two significant sections: the public who have the right to enjoy the countryside, and the farmers who not only make a living from that countryside but also provide much of the basic foodstuffs for our table? How do you define a bystander in this particular matter of pesticide spraying?

I would be interested in your thoughts on this.

Jeremy Holden, pictured here in Cambodia where he currently works for Flora & Fauna International, was born in Meppershall. He attended Meppershall Lower School, Henlow Middle and then Samuel Whitbread, before going on to Nottingham University.

But even while still at Meppershall school he had such an interest in wild life that he was often called upon to identify minibeasts that someone else had found. From that early age he knew that he wanted to be a professional wild life photographer and his chance came while he was back-packing in Indonesia in 1993. He has never looked back.

But he does come back, and this summer he saw in our own Old Road Meadow the Marbled White butterfly, pictured below.

The internet will tell you that the Marbled White is almost extinct and the remaining specimens are to be found only in the west of England; yet on 1st July 2009 this one was in Meppershall! This just goes to show what a special wild life haven we have in our own village.



Computer Tips:

HYPERLINKS

Nothing to do with agitation or e-numbers, these are the links you click on when surfing the Internet to get you from page to page. They are displayed in the browser address bar (the one at the top) and can be shaded, copied and pasted into any document, where they become a "live" link. Try this with an email to yourself for practice. You can also type a web address into your email – just start with **www.** and the link will become "live" for the recipient.

It is also possible to make your own hyperlinks on your own computer. Take an Excel spreadsheet for instance: you may have cells which refer to another document, photograph, video file or even a folder on your computer. It can be time consuming and fiddly to bring up those items in the normal way so why not hyperlink them from your spreadsheet? *Right click* on the cell and choose "Hyperlink" from the drop-down menu. In the Explorer box navigate to the file or folder you want to access and either *double click* it or *click OK*. Your cell script will now turn another colour (default is blue) to show a Hyperlink has been set. Click out of the cell (to embed the link) and then click on it and the file or folder you chose will come up on screen. To remove the Hyperlink, *right click* on the cell and choose "remove hyperlink"; easy as that.

For Word (or any supported text), shade the text you wish to use as a Hyperlink, *right click* on the shaded area and proceed as above. This also works in Open Office etc. If you do not wish to use the *right click* option, there is a "globe with glasses" icon on the toolbar which does the same thing.



RECIPE CORNER

AUGUST/SEPT 2009

Fruit Fool + Shortbread

450g (11b) of any of the following fruits gooseberries, apples, black or redcurrants, rhubarb, blackberries or raspberries.

45ml (3tbsp) water

75-175g (3oz) caster sugar, to sweeten depending on sharpness of fruit 350ml (12fl oz) fresh double cream 30ml (2tbsp) fresh milk

METHOD

- 1) Prepare fruit according to type. Put into a saucepan with water.
- 2) Bring slowly to the boil. Cover with lid and simmer until fruit is soft.
- 3) Remove from heat. Add sugar to taste. Either rub through a sieve or liquidise. Leave until completely cold
- 4) Whip 300ml (1/2pint) cream and milk together until lightly stiff then gradually fold in fruit puree
- 5) Transfer to 4 sundae glasses and chill.
- 6) Before serving, whip remaining cream until thick, pipe whirls on top of each fool, then decorate with nuts, grated chocolate or fruit that has been used.

SHORTBREAD - can be served as a Cake, Biscuit, or with fruit and cream, or Ice Cream.

8 ozs flour 4 ozs castor sugar.

4 ozs rice flour. (Ground Rice) 8 ozs butter.

METHOD.

- 1) Sieve dry ingredients together.
- 2) Add the butter, work it in with the hands.
- 3) Knead till the mixture binds together.
- 4) Form into two balls and flatten into two 7 inch round sponge tins; prick well.
- 5) Bake in moderate oven till beginning to change colour. Mark 4 / 380 F
- 6) Reduce heat until cooked approx I hour.
- 7) Cut while still warm.

GARDEN TIPS FOR AUGUST

(With acknowledgements to the RHS)

- Make sure birds and other wildlife have fresh water and keep ponds topped up
- Water plants that need it regularly
- Collect ripening seed from plants you wish to propagate
- Trim hedges
- Prune rambling roses after flowering
- Trim lavender after the flowers have faded
- Layer rhododendrons, pinks and clematis
- · Protect dahlias, and chrysanthemums from earwigs
- Feed and water all plants in containers
- Take cuttings from tender perennials such as pelargoniums and fuchsias
- Mow lawns less frequently if the weather is hot and dry
- Lift and dry onions
- Cut and dry herbs for winter use
- Prop up heavily laden branches of fruit trees
- Summer-prune gooseberries and redcurrants
- Water and feed tomatoes regularly and remove yellowing leaves
- Plant new strawberry plants and keep them well watered
- Harvest the first apples and pears
- Start potted cyclamen and freesias into growth

LAST CHANCE

- Finish summer-pruning apples, pears and other trained fruit trees
- Complete summer-pruning of wisteria
- Plant colchicums for autumn flowering

GET AHEAD

- Force hyacinths for Christmas
- Start planting spring bulbs, especially daffodils
- Prepare ground for making new lawns
- Divide perennials towards the end of the month
- Sow parsley and pot up herbs for later use.
