MESSENGER AGM

A record number of people (22) packed into the front room of The Sugar Loaf (thank you Jenny) on 13th April for our Annual General Meeting. The Committee of Dick Bulley (Editor); John Thompson (Treasurer); Christine Elbourne (Advertising Manager); and Colette House (Distribution Manager) were joined by their latest recruit, Brigid Holmes (Youth Editor). In the house were Phyl Kidger, representing the Printers; Ruth & Denis Neilson, Collating Managers; and Tessa & David Heath and Elizabeth Wilson, representing Distributors; Jacqui Plumley, Joyce Smith, Joan Wood, Barbara & Maurice Horwood and Linda Parker, representing Collators. Emma Brightwell represented our younger readers. Also present were Janet & Trevor Thorley, Allison Roberts & Helen Roberts, to talk about the Village Fair.

The business of the meeting was despatched fairly quickly: The minutes of the last AGM were approved; Dick circulated an Editor's Report which summarised the many achievements of the past year; John presented his accounts which showed that The Messenger's finances had remained remarkably healthy, despite exceptional spending on the Souvenir Issue. A deficit for the year of £2,343 had been covered from reserves, leaving total assets of £9,678 at year end. The Editor thanked the Treasurer very sincerely for his significant personal contributions to this excellent result through his fundraising and astute purchasing.

Christine Elbourne reported that our advertisers had remained very faithful, despite the recession and we have acquired some new ones, attracted by our new colour facilities and our improved lay-out. She thanked all our advertisers and especially those who had supported the Souvenir Issue. We have been able to hold our advertising rates for another year.

Colette House reported that the body of distributors had also remained very constant, with the few honourable retirements being replaced from her reserve list.

The Committee was re-elected for a further year.

Under AOB the meeting discussed the Messenger's participation in the Summer Fair, and agreed that we should aim at entertainment rather than fund raising.

Meppershall Parish Council Report

This report is for the April 2010 meeting of the Parish Council which was held at Meppershall Village Hall on Monday 12th April.

PC Steve Busby reported that there were 3 crimes in Meppershall during March; a theft from a car in Coneygate, criminal damage and an assault outside the Village Hall. Also there have been numerous reports of nuisance youths; many have been made to sign a Contract of Conduct which, if broken, means the matter will be progressed further through the judicial system. If any Parishioner has information or actual details of these events please contact PC Busby on 01234 541212 (that is the number for all non-emergency matters).

In the open part of the meeting CBUA Councillor Brown stated that the Authority had started re-locating staff from the old County Hall to the refurbished offices at Dunstable but it would be about 2½ years before the process of relocating all the staff from Bedford would be completed. Also he gave details of CB's contingency plans for an incinerator in a brick pit at Stewartby which would be operational by 2016. This would not be needed if the plan for a larger incinerator operated by a private firm, as backed by Bucks CC, is built in the same location. With the cost of dumping rubbish into landfill sites due to rise to £80/tonne in 2012, a "do nothing" option is not acceptable.

Planning & Housing (spokesman Cllr. Peter Chapman)

Two planning applications had been received in this period: a retrospective one for a climbing frame at the school and the other for a replacement garden shed at the Manor House; no objections were raised.

The continuing saga of a footpath at the top end of Fildyke Road appears to be reaching a conclusion but not the one wanted by the Council. From comments received from Central Beds Planning section the length of time this has been outstanding and the inability of the Highways department and Environment Agency to decide whether the ditch should be piped and if there is enough room for the path means the condition on the planning approval will be dropped. The Clerk is to write to the Chief Executive of CBUC outlining our grave concerns of how the planning procedures work.

Highways & Lighting (spokesman Cllr. Roger Bryant)

While potholes in the roads have been repaired quite quickly the same cannot be said of the footpaths. Cllr Bryant reported that Amey were not answering his calls and e-mails; it was agreed a letter go to Highways complaining about the lack of response. The Chairman asked Cllr Brown if he had found out whether Central

Beds had been represented at the meeting convened by Northants CC at Silverstone as a lessons learnt exercise on the impact of the recent cold weather on the highways. Cllr Brown said that CBUC had not attended. Once again the Council stated that while it was accepted that the decision to stop gritting the C roads had come from Government it felt that CBUC had not been in a position to cope and lessons need to be learnt. The Clerk is going to write to the Chief Executive of CBUC.

Environment & Leisure (spokesman Cllr. Paul Merryweather)

The installation of solar powered light on Foster's Field should happen in the near future as the company has been given the go ahead to cross the field. Further to a request from the Chairman of the Village Hall Committee in the open part of the meeting, the Council gave its backing to the use of Foster's Field for the Summer Fair and would investigate whether the Parish Council's insurance could be used.

Wry Close Allotments

The order to move the gate, install the height restrictor where the gate is and install fencing along the track has been placed and should be completed by the time you read this report. All the taps and pipe work on the allotments are to be checked.

Other Business

The Village Caretakers Contract has been signed by both parties although some fine tuning on the use of the report sheets was needed.

YOUR SHOUT

In April 2009, keen skier Darren took his family, with friends, for a holiday in St. Gervais in the Mont Blanc region of the French Alps. What happened during this holiday in a horrendous freak accident is described below. I am retelling the story at his invitation: Darren is a very modest man, which is why I have not identified him, but he says that if it is of any help to others in a similar plight, his message is to be strong, follow the advice given and NEVER GIVE UP!

Darren was riding a steep drag lift, a circular disk which is attached to a pole, placed through the legs, and cushioned on the buttocks, which then tows the skier to the top of the slope, with the skier holding on to maintain balance. Alex, the eleven year old son of their friends, was on the front bar, but fell when he reached the top and fell back down at speed, knocking Darren off his own lift; they then both fell approximately 60 feet down a very steep slope, out of control and totally unable to stop.... that is until they both hit trees. Alex was knocked unconscious and was only saved from death by his helmet, Darren collided with the tree with his right hip, and they both lay there until help arrived.

Darren was placed on a stretcher, taken down the slopes and then airlifted by helicopter 70 km to Annecy Hospital where he spent a week in intensive care on a life support machine. He spent another week in hospital for operations to repair broken bones and was then transferred to Oxford by air ambulance and then on to Lister Hospital where he stayed for 16 nights undergoing countless x-rays and scans. Returning home he spent seven weeks sleeping in his lounge and had to learn how to get from the bed into a wheelchair, how to get from the wheelchair onto a walking frame, how to walk with the frame, and then with crutches unaided.

As may be imagined, Darren's injuries were extensive and he still requires further operations, including two on his knee, which requires total reconstruction. Fortunately he is being treated by a top specialist in the Chelsea and Westminster hospital, but his recuperation is ongoing with lots of physiotherapy to help build up the muscles in his legs and lower body. A long time resident of Meppershall, Darren was brought up in the Village from 1972, and is now back looking after his own family.

TERRY LIGHTFOOT: The concert hosted by the Friends of St. Mary's Church on Saturday March 20 was a huge success and a first in bringing a

Financial News Update

By the time you read this we'll almost certainly be only a few days away from a General Election. Whichever way you cast your vote, there is no doubt that tough times lie ahead for the country, which basically means you and me! Although statistically our economy is out of recession, I'll bet it doesn't feel like it, does it? No, I thought not. That is because we didn't feel the effects of going in until many months after the statisticians told us we were in. So, similarly we won't feel any better for a while after we come out. This effect is compounded by the fact that whoever wins the election, taxes will have to rise.

As we all struggle to adapt our lifestyles and budgets to absorb the increasing costs of fuel, gas, electric, and food (yes supermarket prices are up some 25% in two years), we naturally look to see where we can save money. We examine what our money goes on each month, and try to cut out the non-essentials. Very often this means that we stop paying for things that bring us no immediate benefit such as pension contributions, life cover, critical illness, and savings plans.

The likelihood of people ever starting these plans again is almost nil, so in order to save money, people are exposing themselves to potentially catastrophic financial problems in the future. The most important of these are your life cover and/or critical illness plans, as not only does the cost increase with age if you decide to start them up again, your health may have deteriorated as well.

Think of it this way – your Sky Sports subscription costs the same whether you are 18 or 80, it can be restarted any time, your family protection cannot – well not at the same price anyway. In fact I did hear of a case about six months ago where someone was diagnosed terminally ill, having cancelled all their life cover a year prior to that on the grounds of cost saving. So, if you are faced with such stark choices with your budget, I would urge you to think twice before cancelling your protection plans.

I mentioned earlier critical illness plans, which seem to have a bad reputation largely because of a few well-publicised cases where a payout has been refused. There are many providers of this type of cover, however only a few abide by a code of practice which means they all cover the same (extensive) range of conditions using common definitions. Many online providers, and Banks offer shortened versions, which are nowhere near as good. Yes, it can be expensive and that is because you

are nearly four times as likely to have a critical illness, than to die before age 65!

The other day I was reading the claims history for Zurich Assurance for 2009. They are one of the largest providers of this type of cover, and paid out over £65 million in claims in 2009. They received 814 claims, and paid out on all but 80 of them (90.1% payout ratio). Of the 80 claims turned down, 71 were because what was claimed for didn't meet the definition in the policy. This can include strange claims like broken ankle skiing, bad back etc., The remaining 9 were for non-disclosure. This means the claimant hadn't been entirely honest on their application. People frequently try to disguise health issues in order to keep the cost down, but it is false economy if you need to claim!

So, my message is please think twice before stopping plans that could secure your family's financial future just to save money now. There are often other places to make savings. I understand that it is difficult to see the benefit of paying for these when money is tight, but the consequences of not paying for them can be even worse. By all means shop around to make sure you are not paying too much for your cover, but please keep it going if you can.

Easter will be long gone when you read this, but as I write, it is Good Friday and it is damp and cold. Last episode I confidently predicted spring, triggered by the annual appearance of our nesting duck. Since then our Chestnut tree leaves have just broken their sticky buds and the Wheatear has appeared on its way from North Africa to the Arctic Circle. Spring **is** still coming but has had a serious wobble in the last few days; nature seems to have pulled the duvet back over her head for a bit more shut eye after an initial look out of the window. I don't blame her though. Roll on warm, sunny, scented, bee humming spring days!

Field work on the farm is up to date, given the late season, thanks to high capacity equipment and a willingness to work long hours in the short weather windows presented recently. Crop growth will 'explode' once the air and soil temperatures rise.

In late February we visited 'The Real Van Gogh; The Artist And His Letters' exhibition at the Royal Academy. It was a fascinating, if overcrowded, experience and showed the development of his self taught style alongside correspondence, mainly with his brother, as his art developed towards the famous pictures we most associate with him. I was interested in his early drawings made in Holland where his upbringing 'taught him to observe and love nature and see in it deeper truths'. The text running alongside the artwork made some interesting statements; for example:

"From the outset, Van Gogh was attracted to simple folk who lived close to nature."

"With these monumental figures of farm labourers at harvest time, Van Gogh achieved his goal of depicting the heroic quality of peasant life."

Read today, these comments seem rather patronizing but no doubt at the time they may have been fair. It got me thinking about how those working on farms are perceived today by the 'man / woman in the street', whoever he or she might be. The popular portrayal of life and work in the countryside by media savvy young farmers hides the reality of the understated, businesslike application of most farmers who form the quiet and unseen backbone of food production and countryside management in the U K.

Have you heard about the storm created by the announcement of a planning application being prepared by Nocton Dairies to set up an 8,100 high yielding cow dairy unit, eight miles south of Lincoln? Somehow, in this

context, big is seen by some as automatically bad with vociferous campaigners claiming there will be animal welfare and environmental problems; or that farming should return to small family run units. Presumably returning to the heroic peasant life of Van Gogh's paintings. As an ex and profitable dairy farmer you will not be surprised to hear my views on this: but the constraints of space here mean you will have to wait for those in a later issue.

I was pleased to see the letter from John Chapman in the April issue in response to my comments on Climate Change. John introduces an interesting element which was not in fact implicit in my article, namely whether there are too many humans. This is a subjective topic, and I am not aware that there is a number which is commonly agreed upon that would be seen as either optimum or capacity. You could equally argue that the problem is more to do with inequality of wealth distribution and opportunity. It is a topic which can lead to all sorts of responses depending on whether you are living in relative luxury in the so called first world, or struggling to stay alive in the developing world. There need not be a direct correlation between numbers and waste if there are fundamental changes made to what creates waste and what is done with those waste products. I am not advocating a world population of 9 billion but I am advocating action that can conceivably improve the earth's environment and increase its capacity to maintain life, rather than a tendency towards self satisfied complacency.

Meppershall Bakery Bees *by Roger*

April was the month when colonies go from struggling to boiling-over. On the 9th April I carried out my first inspection, it did not go too well. Only 5 colonies left out of seven and two of the five hives are very small. I started with the smallest one first, only about 200 bees but I saw the queen and she was laying eggs, not much brood but some bees were flying and bringing in pollen. They had yellow trousers. I then went to hive 2, one of the stronger colonies: much better, lots of eggs, larvae and sealed brood. I saw the queen and about 2000 bees. I started to mark the queens in the hives so they are easier to see amidst thousands of bees on the frames.

Unfortunately, when I came to the next small colony, I could not see the queen at first. She had left the frame with all the bees on and was walking up the side of the brood box. I picked her up in my hand and gently held her between my fingers and marked her on the back with a green marker pen. After waiting 4 or 5 seconds, to let the ink dry, I replaced her back in the brood nest where 3 or 4 bees immediately smelt her and started to attack her and killed her as I watched! I could not believe my eyes. How sad! I wished I had not started. I quickly thought I now have no queen in this hive, so I went back to the strong colony and took two frames with bees, eggs, larvae and brood and placed them in the queenless hive. If the weather stays warm there is a good chance they will make a new queen. It will take about 28 days from eggs to eggs.

The next two hives were very busy and I marked one more queen. I did not see the last queen, but saw many eggs, which is a good sign that all is well. The reason for the bees' bad behaviour was probably that the queen smelt funny with the smell of the marker pen and the smell from me: she was a foreign body in the hive and the guarding bees destroyed her. This does happen from time to time but is very annoying. I wish them all good luck.

May is the month bees begin to swarm. We call it the swarming season, which lasts through May and June. As soon as we find occupied queen cells, we adopt our chosen method to manage the swarming process so that we don't lose half our bees over the horizon. Probably the most widely used method is known as the artificial swarm. This method will maintain the maximum foraging force, while the queen resumes egg laying without interruption; it therefore minimises the loss of honey production. If we follow the procedure carefully and do not miss seeing any queen cells it (nearly) always works. Last year I used this method on 14th April and it worked well. This year I think we will be about a fortnight behind because of the cold winter.

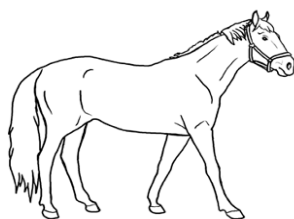

Much as I agree with a lot of the content of her letter, I and other families have taken this comment personally and feel that it is unjustified to presume that all families on Social Housing estates are troubled.

Resident of the Acres

As a family living in social housing on the Bovis Estate, I found Victoria Wolfe-Brown's labelling us as "TROUBLED" families very insulting. I have children in Meppershall Lower School and Pre School and feel very much part of the village community. We are not all privileged to afford our own houses like many others, so more houses are needed, and that's not just happening in Meppershall, it's everywhere. So please Victoria Wolfe-Brown, don't tar us all with the same brush.

Letter from Chris Foster

Victoria Wolfe-Brown makes some interesting points in her letter about the proposed new community hall. As I understand it, the plan is only a proposal at the moment, being put forward as a preferred site by Central Beds to the Inspector who will be looking at all such sites across the Central Beds area in line with local need and government policy requirements. I would like to comment on her main points. There is always understandable nervousness about the impact of any proposed new development. However, all communities are organic and dynamic and have to change if they are not to quietly degenerate. Victoria Wolfe-Brown is perfectly at liberty to question the benefit of this proposal but I would be interested to know on

what grounds she plans to contest its legality. In a situation such as this, there is often one person in favour of it, for every one who is against.

Our farm business is promoting this proposed development, with the support of the Parish Council. The plan has grown over the past 20 years in response to recognised social, sporting and infrastructure needs of the village.

It will not be our intention to hand over control of the development to any major, or local, house builder. Maintaining control will be an important part of retaining the overall shape and style of the development and therefore the proposed benefit to the village community in the long term. ‘Promises’ made at the outset will not be quietly dropped. The anxiety expressed about the impact of 68 new homes need not be the reality. Those homes can equally bring vitality into the community through increase in income from the precept and involvement of new people. The comments about ‘troubled families’ are unfortunate and unjustified.

The growth that could occur in the village will inevitably bring focus and pressure on infrastructure issues that are already evident. However a new community centre should be designed with flexibility and versatility in order to serve the developing needs of the village. For instance, if the local authority changes from the present policy of Lower / Middle / Upper to one of Primary and Secondary schools, then this could provide a positive solution to increased pupil roll and the traffic problems outside the Lower School at present.

I believe that the emotive comment “this site destroys the rural aspect of the village” is misplaced. Any housing proposed will be to the left of the track immediately behind Hilltop View and will not go as far as the ridge line. The track going down Crackle Hill will continue to be in farmland with rural views, as will the track along the top of Crackle Hill. Birds will still sing in gardens as well as hedges and peace will still be found where peace is now.

If the proposal is looked at carefully, it will be seen that it is more than just a replacement Village Hall funded by housing. There is recreation and football pitch space, an overflow cemetery area and the opportunity to develop an expanded community facility in the heart of the village. In summary, it is our belief that the development, as proposed, can bring much good to Meppershall.

The Bible Society

A notice from the Shefford & District Bible Society and an invitation to visit Southill House appears on the previous page. Perhaps some people may not know much about The Bible Society.

If I could have been anyone other than who I am, I think I would like to have been Mary Jones. She was born in Wales and used to visit the local farmer's wife where she would touch the large family bible. Mrs. Evans promised that if Mary ever learned to read, she could read this bible whenever she wanted.

When Mary was 10, a school opened near by where she quickly learned to read and longed to have a bible of her own. So she did jobs for people and saved whatever she could, until 6 years later she had enough to buy a bible. Hearing that a Mr. Thomas Charles had bibles for sale, Mary walked the 26 miles into Bala, only to discover that Mr. Charles only had 3 bibles left, which were all promised to other people. Mary cried in her disappointment and Mr. Charles

was moved to give her one of the three. Later, he went to London and told Mary's story to a group of gentlemen, among them, William Wilberforce, and they founded the Bible Society in 1804.

Today, 200 years after its founding, The Bible Society translates, prints and distributes the scriptures in 200 countries and territories, including Iraq and Afghanistan. The Amity Printing Press in China has printed millions of scriptures in the last 10 years for distribution in China and south east Asia. Braille scriptures in different languages are produced in Germany. Today, where people cannot read, or prefer the spoken word, cassettes, videos, films and DVDs are produced, which have led to the growth of churches, particularly in Africa and South America. In Brazil, for instance, they hope to reach 10 million Brazilians with an audio New Testament in 2010. The Bible Society produces materials for use in our schools and among young people.

Along with its work on the scriptures, The Bible Society engages in humanitarian projects in many countries and also produces materials to educate people, particularly at this time concerning HIV and AIDS. The Bible Society is also a means of bringing together different branches of the church and different groups, e.g. Christians and Moslems on the West Bank and in Gaza.

The Shefford and District Interdenominational Action Group (two of whose founder members were Michael and Kathleen Foster) meets on the second Monday evening of each month in a different venue for prayer and bible study, and we give, or arrange events, to raise money. Last year's sponsored walk raised a record £1,000. We hope that, if possible, you will be able to join us for the tour of Southill House and gardens on 5th May; see notice for details.

Junior Church

On Easter Sunday we celebrated Jesus rising from the dead and St Mary's marked the occasion in fine style – the Church was decorated with beautiful floral arrangements and the choir led the congregation wonderfully in song.

Jesus said, "Let the little **children** come to **me** ..." Matthew 19 v14.

Well - we were also blessed with the attendance of 23 children at our Easter mini SPARKS who also went on to enjoy our JC (Junior Church) sessions during the Family Communion service. Thank you so much to all of the children who attended and behaved so well during the SPARKS and Family Communion service.

I cannot help but reflect on what Easter means and the sacrifice God made for all of us; sending his only Son to die to take away our sins, then Jesus rising again giving us hope.

At JC the message of God's love is told in a fun and easy to understand way. We are always pleased to welcome new children.

CHOCOLATE MUFFINS

Makes 12 large, or 24 small muffins.

100g (3 1/2oz) Plain chocolate, broken up

250g (9oz) Self-raising flour.

2 tsp baking powder

50g (2oz) Cocoa powder.

50g (2oz) Light brown soft sugar.

2 Eggs, beaten

50g (2oz) Butter, melted

250ml (8fl oz) Fresh milk.

1 tsp Vanilla essence.

200g (7oz) Milk chocolate chips.

Method

- 1) Pre- heat oven to 200o C /400o f /Gas mark 6.
- 2) Line muffin or small bun tins with paper cases.
- 3) Melt plain chocolate in a bowl set over a pan of hot water.
- 4) Sift flour, baking powder, and cocoa powder into a bowl, and then stir in sugar.
- 5) Beat eggs, butter, milk, and vanilla essence.
- 6) Add flour mix, chocolate chips, and melted chocolate.
- 7) Stir briefly until the flour is only just incorporated.
DO NOT OVER BEAT.
- 8) Spoon the mix into the paper cases, making sure the cases are filled almost to the top.
- 9) Bake for 20 -25 minutes.

- Water plants that need it regularly.
- Prune spring-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering.
- Take softwood cuttings of shrubs.
- Lightly trim box and other formal hedging.
- Prune *Clematis montana* after flowering.
- Take cuttings from herbaceous perennials.
- Cut back and divide spring-flowering perennials.
- Plant out dahlias at the end of the month.
- Protect young plants from slugs.
- Clear out spring bedding and begin hardening off summer bedding plants.
- Thin out annuals and vegetables sown outdoors earlier.
- Feed fish regularly and give a special aquatic fertiliser to water plants.
- Feed and weed lawns to encourage growth as well as mowing regularly.
- Sow and plant out tender vegetables at the end of the month.
- Protect crops from carrot fly.
- Continue successional sowing of vegetables.
- Remove all frost protection from fruit trees and start pruning trained plums and cherries.
- Move tender plants in pots outside for summer
- Ventilate greenhouses and conservatories and think about permanent shading for summer

LAST CHANCE

- Sow or turf new lawns before it gets too dry.
- Finish planting evergreen shrubs.

GET AHEAD

- Sow biennials for next year's spring bedding plants.
- Inspect plants regularly for signs of pests and diseases, and nip potential problems in the bud.
