Hi Dick,

Reference the message from Olly Martins, Police and Crime Commissioner (page 9 of your July issue). Whilst it is nice to know that we have an active Commissioner as a guiding light for law and order in Bedfordshire, I find his attitude of blaming lack of funding for any problems which may occur to policing rather crass, particularly as the Bedfordshire force has obviously worked very hard to achieve some very respectable results *despite* having less money. Perhaps *because* less money has been available they have, like the rest of us, made more of what they *have* got with better planning, up to date equipment and a can-do attitude. Our Commissioner should take a leaf out of their book, stop being so political and get on with finding more cost-effective ways to police on the available budget; after all, he is *in* the post now.

The new, additional police telephone number 101 is available to report incidents that are not exactly an emergency but give rise to suspicion, or to report a minor accident, criminality or disturbance. I feel that this information would have been far more useful in the Commissioner's Report (along with his contact e-mail address, perhaps) and would have shown that he really is interested in rousing our support.

# Edited from a report in Beds on Sunday 07/07/13 - Shocking report reveals horrific nature of neglect at Meppershall Care Home

During an unannounced inspection of the Meppershall Care Home, run by G A

Projects Limited, the Care Quality Commission (CQC) found that its 70 residents were being seriously neglected by staff with some OAPs lying in soiled bed clothes for up to 10 weeks.

Some of the more shocking discoveries included one case where inspectors found human faeces on the floor of a



bathroom and one instance where they observed a staff member picking up spilt porridge from the floor and putting it back into a resident's bowl for them to eat.

The CQC ruled that the Home had failed to meet the required standard of care in all categories and has taken enforcement action against the provider over staffing levels, the state of the premises and care and welfare practice. The Commission's report states that they found "a number of areas where practice was unacceptable and people living in the Home were put at potential risk of harm". Other concerns raised by the health watchdog included residents' choices not being respected, records being falsified, a high risk of spreading

infection, stained mattresses, and staff not being properly trained to deal with dementia sufferers.

Meppershall Care Home is now forbidden by Central Bedfordshire Council from admitting any new residents until further notice and was required by the CQC to submit an improvement plan by last Thursday. Julie Ogley, Director of Social Care, Health and Housing at Central Beds Council, which monitors the home, said: "We have raised concerns about the home's ability to improve care quality on a number of occasions. On each of these occasions we have restricted the Home from admitting new residents until the concerns have been addressed through an improvement plan. Since the CQC inspection in May, the Council has been sending in teams of social care professionals on a weekly basis to assist the Home in making the progress needed against the improvement plan. In the meantime, we are continuing with our more intense review and scrutiny of the Home and are taking the necessary action to ensure it puts residents' care at the centre of everything it does".

Since the report was published the former manager has left the Home. Sue Attley, who has now been brought in as new manager to make improvements, said: "We have had a lot of help and support from social services at Central Beds Council. This was all before my time as I've only been here a couple of weeks. The staff morale is very low at the moment and I am here to lift that. We are having two training programmes now every week and a new manager is coming in to help me. Most of the issues have now been addressed and we are working very hard on our improvement plan".

A spokeswoman for the CQC said: "The Commission carried out an inspection at Meppershall Care Home on 13<sup>th</sup> May, in response to concerns raised about the service. The CQC is taking action with regard to this service; however, our legal processes do not allow us to go into further detail at this time". The CQC has a range of enforcement powers which include restricting the services that a provider can offer or, in the most serious cases, suspending or cancelling a service.

PS. We now understand that the Home will be closing altogether. This news came too late for us to get details - Ed.

We had a particularly fun-filled and busy evening in Barton-le- Clay playing in



# **MEPPERSHALL BAKERY BEES by Roger**

Hi.

August is the time to remove our main honey crop and start to prepare for winter. I know it's still summer but to the bees August is already Autumn. In fact, the whole aim in life of a colony is to maximise its chances of survival over winter. Once we have removed the main honey crop, whatever honey the bees collect from now on is theirs to keep, so this is a good time to start our 6 week medication for varroa, check for any signs of disease and take action to help the bees to stay healthy. The queen can also be assessed and replaced if she is not a good one ie. old, bad tempered (sounds familiar?) or not a good layer. Replacing the queen now gives them time to make strong colonies to get through the winter ready for next spring. Here I am already in next year.

This year started late but picked up well with a good honey crop from the oilseed rape and horse chestnut, with some late spring flowers. It averaged about twenty pounds per super which is very good for this year. We will have to wait and see what the main crop will bring; not twenty pounds, I fear. Oh well, keep fingers crossed.

At the Summer Fair, I had an observation hive with some queen cells which I thought would hatch out on the day. Unfortunately they did not. I placed them in a nuc (a small hive) and they hatched three days later. We now have a small hive with this year's new queen coming along nicely. All the other hives are okay. One did swarm in the first week in July, somewhere over Meppershall. That hive also has a new queen, not laying yet, as I write this. She looks very big which is a good sign she is carrying lots of eggs. The last two years have seen very small queens because of the bad spring and summer and this has caused a lot of supercedure and small colonies. When a queen mates she will mate with a large number of males and hopefully lay eggs for the next two or three years or longer: when she only mates with a small number we get small colonies and small honey harvest. (Let's hope she had a good time with lots of males!)

In the last week or so, people have expressed concern that beekeepers may be at fault for the decline of the honey bee. How can we be blamed when we look after and keep them healthy and check their wellbeing over the course of the year? The honey we take is the surplus they make!

#### MEPPERSHALL PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The Parish Council meeting in July was on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, put back so as to reduce the gap between it and the next meeting in September. The 22<sup>nd</sup> was too late to include the report in this issue, so this meeting will be covered in the report on the Council's September meeting.

# Housing Development and New Village Hall in Meppershall

#### 1 - A Message From Meppershall Parish Council

In the near future, you will be able to study the proposals from Polehanger Farms Ltd and their developers, Bloor Homes Ltd. The Parish Council would like you to be very clear about where it stands. Basically, it stands on the sidelines. You might imagine that, as the lowest tier of local Government, the Council can dictate what happens with planning in Meppershall - that is not true; the Planning Authority is Central Bedfordshire Council, who will be conducting their usual consultation on this planning application if and when it is submitted. Anyone who believes that the housing development should not go ahead at all should contact CBC and make their views known. Your Parish Council will make sure that the dates of that consultation period are published within the village.

The planning regulations provide that there will be a 'planning gain' for the Village arising from the housing development. In so far as the Parish Council has an objective in this development, it is to do our best to make sure that this "planning gain" is used for the good of all Parishioners. The requirements to allow planning permission for the houses specify that funds will be provided for the benefit of the Village, and the PC has agreed with the Village Hall Charity that they will use the majority of these funds to build a new multi-purpose Community Centre, while the Parish Council will construct match-quality playing fields, changing rooms which will be part of the Centre, together with a Civic Burial Ground.

There is one area where the Parish Council is directly involved; it owns a parcel of land that will be used for the new Community Centre and part of the access road, i.e. the area known as Fosters Field. At a public exhibition in the Autumn, you will be able to see plans for the proposed development. This will require the Parish Council to lease the land to the Village Hall Charity, who will continue to own and operate the new Community Centre. The Council has debated extensively whether we should do that and we will be taking careful note of the comments and reactions of villagers at the exhibition. After that, the PC will decide whether or not to lease part of Foster's Field to the Village Hall Charity in exchange for a larger piece of the adjacent land, to

be provided by Polehanger Farms Ltd. This new Parish land will allow the new sports and play facilities shown at the exhibition to be constructed.

The Parish Council has no direct involvement with the housing development which will also be shown; that is entirely on land owned by Polehanger Farms Ltd.

At this exhibition, you will have the opportunity to complete a Parish Council questionnaire that will give you the opportunity to tell the Parish Council what you believe is good or bad about the proposals and if you would like to see any changes made to the plans. These will be fully reviewed and discussed by the Parish Council before it makes a final decision whether or not to enter into a contract with the Village Hall Charity and Polehanger Farms Ltd.

This will be your only formal opportunity to let your Councillors know what you think. Your opinion will be valued so please visit the exhibition and let us have your views.

#### 2 - The Evolution of the New Village Hall

The current Village Hall stands on land originally owned by my father, Michael Foster. That land was donated to the Village Hall Trustees at the time of construction in 1960.

During the 1990s, both Meppershall Parish Council (MPC) and the Village Hall Trustees (MVH) were in a number of conversations with Christine and me over the possibility of providing land in our ownership to facilitate extended recreation facilities and the construction of a new, larger Village Hall. However, this didn't overcome the major hurdle of the additional and substantial funding required for construction of a new hall. Various avenues were pursued but all fell short of those requirements.

In 1998/9 MVH, together with a developer, introduced the idea of building on an acre of our land to the west of the track and behind Hilltop View to raise funds for a new Village Hall. We were not convinced by that particular proposal and it went no further. We did continue discussions with MPC about the potential recreation land, and a quotation for drainage was commissioned together with a report from the Bedfordshire Playing Fields Association.

Between 2001 -2003 various letters and e-mails went to and fro saying that 'matters were moving on' or that 'matters were not moving on'. Problems with funding were the constant refrain.

In 2004 it all went quiet. Christine and I, however, remained keen to continue our family's long standing support of the village community. We hoped that whatever scheme might eventually develop, with any of our land that might be included, would be imaginative, long-lasting and having significant community benefit. Around the year 2006, two processes came together to give new momentum and progress to that concept. Mid Beds District Council (MBDC), as it still was then, began to develop its Local Development Framework (LDF), requesting Expressions of Interest: and MPC commissioned the Village Plan with a questionnaire sent to every household.

From the published results of the Plan, we began to see how a number of the stated objectives and desires of respondents could be caught up together with what we understood to be the increasingly urgent need to replace the ageing and original Village Hall, and the continuing desire for larger and more formal recreation facilities, especially football pitches. In particular we noted the following 'needs' highlighted: a new Village Hall; more sports facilities including changing rooms to enable the formation of local sports clubs; more bungalows, affordable homes and starter homes; a roadside footpath from Meppershall to Shefford; a satellite medical surgery in Meppershall.

Therefore, we started talking again with the Parish and District Councillors to try and develop a robust scheme in which we could combine most or all of those needs and overcome the difficulties experienced over the previous 12 years or so. It was recognised that if the area of Polehanger land between Hilltop View, the Fowlers Farm boundary, the track and the fall-line of Crackle Hill could be incorporated to develop a residential element, this would provide the significant funds needed to meet the overall objectives.

So, in consultation with MPC, we submitted a proposal to the MBDC LDF for councillors', officers' and eventually public scrutiny. The proposal went through all the stages culminating in being selected as a preferred site within the LDF. This was followed by the opportunity for objectors to submit their concerns to an independent Inspector. In 2011 the Inspector published his report on the LDF concluding that the whole process, including our proposal, was legal and sound; and accordingly, the Meppershall site received 'allocated status'.

Since that point, the three landowners concerned, namely Meppershall Parish Council, Meppershall Village Hall Trustees and Christine and I, as Polehanger Farms Ltd, have taken time to make sure that their respective interests will be protected and that the proposal will truly reflect the original ideas and objectives.

# 3 - <u>Update from the Meppershall Village Hall Trustees</u> and our planning for the future

Three years ago it was decided by Central Bedfordshire Council that house building should be allowed on the fields belonging to Polehanger Farms Ltd at the rear of the current Village Hall. This has given the trustees of the Village Hall, working together with both the Parish Council and Mr & Mrs Foster of Polehanger Farms, a unique opportunity to provide the new village hall, sports facilities and civic burial ground that the village needs now and for the future. Whilst the current hall has served Meppershall very well for many years, it is expensive to run and maintain, and inherently restricted in terms of both space and facilities.

We have carried out detailed research into the role that a village hall needs to fulfil in the 21st century, including visits to other similar community facilities, and we have worked with existing users and professional surveyors to create an agreed design that not only meets all of the aims and objectives which have been identified, but will provide one of the best community buildings around.

The proposed eco-friendly building will include a larger hall, stage and bar area, together with separate space for the pre-school, a separate smaller meeting room, changing rooms to Sport England guidelines, and a larger car park.

The hall and facilities will be built within the available financial resources without imposing additional burden on either fundraising or local taxes. The building has been designed to be more efficient to run than the current hall, and the increased and improved spaces will also allow for new and increased letting opportunities.

The new hall will be built on the Playing Field land owned by the Parish Council at the rear of the current hall, with the current site providing access to the development. There will continue to be a play area with equipment for all ages.

We are close to finalising the details of the agreement and lawyers will be addressing the legal documentation in the next few weeks. The detailed proposals and design will be the subject of a village exhibition to be held in the autumn. The proposals are naturally subject to formal planning permission, although early indications are that the proposed hall should receive a favourable response.


We have been mindful of our obligations as trustees of the charity that owns the land and runs the Village Hall, and in our view the proposals that will be showcased in the autumn will be entirely in keeping with those obligations and will provide the best provision for community facilities in Meppershall for the foreseeable future.

#### FINANCIAL NEWS UPDATE

#### YOUR FAMILY SHOULD INHERIT YOUR ESTATE - NOT PROBLEMS

Most of us don't want to think about dying, so it is perhaps no surprise to learn that 6 out of 10 British adults do not currently have a Will. It is easy to defer this crucial decision by thinking it can always wait for another day, but delay can prove costly.

Most of us will die leaving some sort of direction as to who should inherit our assets. What actually happens will depend on whether you have chosen to write a Will; if you haven't your assets will be dealt with according to the rules of intestacy, in which case the State will determine how your estate is divided up. This is unlikely to match your wishes.

Making a Will is crucial to protect the family from unnecessary anxiety and expense after you die. Only with a valid Will can you be certain that your estate will go to the right people. If you do not draw up a proper will, you run the risk of depriving your spouse or partner of their home, increasing their inheritance tax (IHT) burden and leaving parts of your estate in the wrong hands. One of the most common misconceptions is that if you do not have a Will, your nearest and dearest will decide how your assets are split. Sadly, this is not the case.

Not leaving a Will can also mean extensive legal costs for your beneficiaries; failing to provide for a partner or dependant will mean they will have to consult a lawyer to contest the State's decisions, with no guaranteed result. Complex cases can require a genealogy expert, at great cost, to clarify relatives' rights to your estate.

It is particularly important for unmarried couples to have a Will - an unmarried person will receive nothing if their partner dies intestate, regardless of how long they have lived together or whether they have children. (There was a time when you couldn't go past a bus shelter or stand on a railway station platform without seeing a poster for 'The Girl with a Dragon Tattoo', written by the late Stieg Larsson. But the Swedish author did not leave a Will, so when he died his considerable estate went to his father, rather than his partner of thirty years. Source: www.guardian.co.uk November 2009).

There is an old saying in the legal profession: "Where there is a Will there is an argument; or better still, litigation". This does not mean that there is no point in making a Will; it simply refers to the fact that many Wills contain elementary mistakes. These mistakes may mean disgruntled relatives can challenge the Will after your death, generating more work - and fees - for the legal

profession, so seeking professional advice at the outset is always the most sensible approach.

Many people opt for a so-called do-it-yourself Will, on a form which can cost as little as £10 from your local supermarket. Not surprisingly, many people who opt for the DIY route make basic errors: something as simple as naming someone in the Will by a shortened name may create later problems when the Will does not match the name that appears on their birth certificate. Such errors can be costly, both financially and emotionally.

Arranging for a Will to be drawn up is relatively straightforward and, in most cases, should not take much more than an hour or two. A Will needs to be accurate, unambiguous and comprehensive. Arranging a Will which specifically sets out your wishes will give you the certainty that your assets will be passed to your intended recipients. Importantly, if there is any change in circumstances once the Will has been drawn up, for example if you divorce, have more children, or your financial situation changes, then your Will must be updated accordingly.

In addition to writing the Will, you will need to appoint executors to make sure your wishes are carried out properly after your death. It is advisable to appoint more than one executor and ideally both should be younger than you. If you have children who are under the age of 18 then you should also nominate a Legal Guardian in your Will to look after your children. Whilst it is extremely unlikely both parents will die at the same time, it is wise to have arrangements in place. Some people may also want to specify their funeral arrangements, to reflect their wishes and to take into account religious beliefs.

Bereavement is a distressing time so it is crucial to do all that you can to ease the upset and worry for your survivors. Seeking specialist legal advice when arranging your Will, is one, if not the most important aspects of estate planning.

#### **POLEHANGER: A FARMING DIARY**

#### Episode 45



#### **Harvest Prequel**

Following my upbeat comments last issue, we now have done all we can to influence this harvest's yield. Final fungicide was sprayed to protect the wheat ears in the second half of June. The crop is likely to be a little later than average to harvest date. Until then it will ideally need plenty of sunshine and no torrential thunderstorm rain that can flatten the crop. This then makes the ear difficult for the combine to pick up from near ground level and consequently straw remains long and rooted in the ground rather than cut and chopped, presenting potential blockages to cultivating equipment.

A high yield is only a good yield once it is safely in the barn!

Blackgrass patches are showing above the crop canopy. It is potentially a very aggressive competitor and not cheap to control. The dreadful Autumn weather meant that control was not as good as it should have been. These patches will be noted for particular attention in the Autumn. One seed head can produce 200 seeds!

#### **Footpaths and Conservation**

On 20<sup>th</sup> June we hosted an evening walk for The Council for the Protection of Rural England; or CPRE for short! Having met up at Polehanger, we walked to the top of Crackle Hill, down to Woodhall Farm and along the river bank before diverting into the riverside plantation to return to the farm. The contrast between mature woodland, open hills and fields, and then the river-side grass and trees was an 'eye-opener' to those on the walk who didn't know the area. More than one remarked that they didn't know Bedfordshire could be as varied as that within such a short distance!

You may recall that we have put 6 metre grass margins on the edge of fields where there is a ditch. As well as developing wild life corridors and insect 'sanctuaries' this prevents chemical spray and fertilizer from accidentally drifting or leaching into the watercourses and thus carried down to rivers. When these margins were established, we tried to incorporate wild flowers into them but the vigorous growth of the grasses has suppressed most of the flowers.

Next year we will try and see if we can re-establish some flowers by altering the cutting dates of the grass (which are controlled by Natural England who 'police' the grant payments for the Entry Level Scheme of conservation measures) and planting additional flower seed.

Motorbikes continue to be a nuisance on our tracks and paths from time to time, usually at weekends. I think I have mentioned before that we never give permission for motor bike access and would encourage walkers to point this out explicitly to riders if you come across them!

#### **Future of the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP)**

After almost two years of negotiating, the EU has finally reached agreement on the way forward. With 28 member states (Croatia joined on 1<sup>st</sup> July) and 3 layers of officials and Ministers it is a wonder that this ever happened, even if much compromise was needed.

The budget has been cut, 'greening' (environmental measures) will be compulsory and member states have been given the freedom to tailor and deliver changes to their individual needs within certain parameters.

That should be a good thing except that our DEFRA minister, Owen Patterson, has signalled his intention to 'disadvantage' English farmers in comparison with our counterparts on the continent. He intends to transfer 15% of the direct payments into higher environmental standards and rural development projects. This is not a bad thing in itself, but other EU members have signalled that they will transfer monies into direct payments (not out), thus putting them at a competitive advantage in what is now a global marketplace.

I would much rather we could operate in a subsidy free market but whilst we don't we should be able to compete on a level playing field!

Do subsidies distort markets or underpin strategic industries?

Or do you think this farmer 'doth protest too much'?

#### Michael Foster's Diary, August 1963 (Italics = my comment)

Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup>. To Luton airport to inspect 1000 bales of hay made on the airfield. It would be a good buy if there is no more rain to come: but it started whilst up there and continued all day

Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup>. Rogueing (pulling up) Wild Oats; (an aggressive arable weed if not controlled.)

Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup>. Went to Northampton with 9 members of the Sunday School cricket team to watch match against West Indies. Play delayed by rain until 1pm (*Fieldwork on farm delayed all day!*)

Friday 23<sup>rd</sup>. Start combining with Winter Oats behind Crackle Hill Rd. Some over-ripe and shelling out on the floor and some under ripe and still soft. Estimate third to half of crop lost. (This was probably 10 days later than average and consequently put pressure on the rest of the harvest as days get shorter and morning dews get heavier.)

# LIFE ON THE WILD SIDE

#### **Ascension Island**




Locating Ascension Island on Google Earth without first typing in a coordinate is almost impossible. Like a cake crumb on a huge blue bedspread, it is tiny point lost in the wilderness — in this case the vastness of the South Atlantic. The nearest mainland is over a thousand miles in any direction. It lies almost equidistant between the coasts of Brazil in South America and Angola in Africa, and is a nine- hour flight from RAF Brize Norton in Oxfordshire. But it is not quite alone. It shares the ocean with two siblings: its older sister St Helena — famous for being the place Napoleon was incarcerated — and its bigger brother Tristan Da Cunha — whose claim to fame is being the "remotest populated archipelago" on earth.

Ascension is the smallest of the three. It is so small (only 35 square miles) and lies so far from any mainland that it seems amazing that it was discovered so early. The Portuguese stopped there in the early 16<sup>th</sup> Century, and within a couple of hundred years it was an important stopover for British ships plying the trade route to India. These early mariners brought the usual vermin responsible for so many island extinctions: rats and cats and goats. There wasn't much for goats to feed on as Ascension is a relatively recent volcanic cinder cone and is almost barren. The rats and cats had a better deal. Huge colonies of seabirds once covered the volcanic lava flows and were easy pickings. The birds are now long gone, but the remains of the colonies can still be seen as a spectral white stain on the otherwise black lava. They are known locally as the 'ghost colonies'.

By the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century both Ascension's endemic birds were gone from the mainland: the flightless Ascension crake became extinct, while the frigate bird was extirpated. Luckily for the Ascension frigate bird – which is found nowhere else – there was one small rock offshore where they could breed in safety. Known as Boatswain Bird Island, it is no more than a chunk of rock, undercut by the rough swell and stained white by guano and the dust from generations of bird bones and eggshells. The frigate birds laid claim to Boatswain Bird Island and it has been their saviour.

As with many small isolated islands, conservation work has started with the removal of destructive alien species. Feral cats are no longer tolerated on Ascension (they were eradicated in 2006) and as a consequence in Spring 2013, when I visited, I saw a single frigate bird chick on a bare cliff above the pounding surf. It was the first mainland-born chick in over a century. By next year there will undoubtedly be more as the squabbling Boatswain Bird Island residents realise there is plenty of empty real estate on the mainland.

Although Fauna & Flora International (the conservation NGO I work with) has no projects on Ascension, they do similar work in the Caribbean, removing vermin species. This seemed enough of a reason to put together a small gallery of photographs I took while I was there. Every year Operation Christmas Child sends over a million shoe boxes from the UK to children in hospitals, orphanages, homeless shelters and poor communities in other countries. The shoe box is often the only Christmas present the children will receive.

Last year Meppershall Brownies sent over 120 shoe boxes to children in Africa and you can see below the brownies holding just a few of them. What do we do:

- We collect empty shoe boxes
- We cover them with Christmas wrapping paper
- We sort the toys and clothes donated into age groups and suitable for a girl or boy
- We fill the shoe boxes with donated items
- We include a Christmas card from the brownies
- We donate £2.50 per box to cover the transportation costs
- Boxes are collected by the Samaritans and transported to the children
- We receive an email back telling us where our boxes went to.

We would therefore be really grateful of any donations of shoe boxes, wrapping paper and items for the shoe boxes, such as small children's' toys, jewellery, hats, gloves, stationery, toothpaste, toothbrushes and soap.

We also need to raise money to send the shoe boxes and we are holding a tabletop sale, craft event and games afternoon at the village hall from 2 pm to 5 pm on Saturday 19th October 2013. If you would like a table at the sale please contact Gemma on 07968 529282.

We also plan to hold a supper evening in October where the brownies, as part of their hostess badge activities, will prepare and serve a dinner and provide entertainment.

# **Henlow Church of England Academy**



30 pupils from Henlow Church of England Academy were invited to participate this year in the E2BN conference. E2BN supply broadband connectivity and online resources to schools in the East of England, and their annual conference provides an opportunity for teachers and ICT staff in schools to see a range of products from ICT suppliers throughout the country.

Our pupils (15 on each day) were able to look at, and in many cases use, many of these products. They were particularly impressed with the 3D printer, and most of them took away an example of an item produced on this. "The 3D printer was the coolest thing there," said one pupil. "We think we should definitely have one at Henlow!" They also tested a printer powered by a bicycle, which they thought would be fantastic for our link school in Utange, Kenya.

Several pupils had the opportunity to interview celebrities attending the conference. Lord Jim Knight told them about his work in the House of Lords, and Maggie Philbin was very informative about her interest in ICT, particularly for young people. Six of our pupils also gave a presentation to the conference about their current ICT unit, Shakespeare's Agent, for which they have used E2BN resources.

Pupils demonstrated some of the online resources produced by E2BN, including their Picture Teller and Making the News applications, both of which are available for students to use in and out of school. 

#### **FILM REVIEW**

Following on from the first Despicable Me we find Gru (voiced by Steve Carell), who was once evil, but is now a kindly family man looking after his three sweet little girls, Edith, Margo and Agnes in DESPICABLE ME 2 in 3D (cert. U 1hr. 38mins.). Aided by his very funny little creatures the Minions, Gru has left his life of crime.



But just as he is settling into his new proper life as a family man, he is recruited into an ultra-secret organisation dedicated to fighting evil around the globe. Agent Lucy Wilde (Kristen Wiig) comes to get him and together they set out to discover who has the special serum which could destroy mankind. Gru and his partner meet with various strange and hilarious characters in their quest to save the world. A host of good actors, including a number of Brits voice these characters.

Ken Jeong voices Floyd Eagle-san, proprietor of the local hair replacement club for men and a key suspect in this despicable crime. Steve Coogan is Silas Ramsbottom, Lucy's boss in the Anti-Villain League and a superspy whose surname offers an endless source of amusement to the Minions; Moises Arias plays Antonio (the young lad who captures the heart of Margo); and Benjamin Bratt is Antonio's father, owner of Salsa & Salsa restaurant, and is also the big villain known as El Macho. Dr Nefario who moves from working with Gru to the other side is played by Russell Brand.

As with the first film this is directed by Chris Renaud and Pierre Coffin. They make good use of the 3D format and have managed to create a film as funny and with as lovable characters as the first film. It is well-written and amusing. Go and see it at one of your local cinemas. Great outing for the whole family!

One such tip came from correspondence between one of our members, Viv Harvey, of The Messenger 'Top Tasks' fame, and Alan Gray of East Ruston Old Vicarage Garden. He confirmed the advice given in Gardening Which, that newly planted perennials should be gently 'puddled in' rather than the ground around them being firmed down. This prevents air gaps round roots. This treatment works equally well will perennials that are moved whilst in flower. If you want to know more do contact us.

#### 11 Top Gardening Tasks for August/September

- 1. Ordering and buying autumn bulbs early means you get the best choice and healthy specimens. Catalogues have a wider variety than garden centres.
- 2. Continue to dead head, especially roses and annuals.
- 3. Feed late flowering plants such as asters and dahlias, using the same feed you give your tomatoes.
- 4. Prune ramblers and climbing roses that have flowered once in early summer. Cut some of the oldest branches to ground level, to encourage new shoots.
- 5. Harvest onions, early apples, and keep picking beans, peas, cucumbers and courgettes, or they will stop cropping.
- 6. Remove the tops of outdoor tomatoes after 4 trusses have set. In the greenhouse, stop tomatoes as they reach the roof, but keep feeding them.
- 7. Later: keep an eye on the weather forecast in case of cold nights. Tender plants might need some protection.
- 8. Take cuttings of tender plants like pelargoniums and fuchsias, into September.
- 9. Divide spring-flowering hardy perennials, and re-plant. Also plant new ones whilst the soil is still warm.
- 10. Plant the bulbs you ordered in August. Lilies, Alliums and Daffodils will especially like getting their roots down before autumn sets in.
- 11. Hoe weeds that still appear in September. If we ever get a fine dry morning this is the best time to do it, before you sit down with a cup of coffee and admire the results of your hard work. This activity is also good for your waistline (the hoeing, not the sitting down!)

**BEASTS: Watch out for:** 

Black spot on roses. Damp days create the perfect conditions for this fungus. Pick up infected leaves, but do not compost them.

Potato and tomato blight can become a problem if late summer turns wet.

Clematis wilt can cause the plants to collapse quickly. There is no chemical cure, but try cutting all affected stems down to the ground, and new ones might grow in their place. Planting very deep can help prevent this devastating disease.

Slugs and snails seem to be finding it a perfect summer. Encouraging birds and hedgehogs into the garden helps - and this is safer for pets than chemicals.

Vine weevils, or more accurately their grubs, can cause pot plants to die. Always use fresh potting compost when making up your autumn pots.

BEAUTIES: Enjoy in flower:

Bulbs and Perennials: Agapanthus, Crocosmia, Dahlias, Evening Primrose and later on: Anemone japonica, Amaryllis, Cyclamen hederifolium, Aster, Red Hot Pokers, Chrysanthemum and Rudbeckia

Shrubs: Buddleia, Fuchsia, Hydrangea, Roses, Clematis, and towards the end of summer the less well-known but easy and wonderfully fragrant, ABELIA, which has been hardy in Meppershall for at least the last two cold winters




#### The Bikers Classic – Spa Franchorchamps

#### **CORNISH PASTIES**

#### **AUGUST / SEPTEMBER 2013**

Ingredients - makes 4 pasties.

1 potato, peeled and finely diced
1 carrot, peeled and finely diced
1 small onion, peeled and very finely diced
225g (8oz) lean beef steak, trimmed and cut into small pieces. (or minced beef)
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
450g (1lb) shortcrust pastry
1 egg, beaten

#### Method

- 1) Preheat the oven to 220°C /425°F /Gas 7. Mix together the potato, carrot, onion and steak and season well.
- 2) Roll out the pastry thinly on a lightly floured surface. Cut three saucersized circles, then use the trimmings to make a fourth. Divide the meat and vegetables between each circle, and brush the edges with egg.
- 3) Bring up the edges of each pasty to meet at the top. Crimp together the edges by pinching gently with the finger and thumb to seal.
- 4) Place on a baking sheet and brush all over with beaten egg. Bake for 10 minutes, then reduce the heat to 180°C /350°F /Gas 4, and cook for a further 15-20 minutes until golden and cooked through. Allow to cool for 10 minutes before serving.
