EDITORIAL

I've been in a reflective mood as I pondered the challenge of my first editorial for the Messenger. I know from reading Dick's thoughts in the March issue that the magazine is a team effort, but the editorial is very much a personal view of the editor.



Starting with the April edition makes a great deal of sense to me. As a gardener, April is the beginning of the yearly cycle - up till then everything has relied on work done during the previous year, but from April onwards you can sow in reasonably expectation of a harvest in the current year. This impression of new beginnings is reinforced, as I write, by the memory of a string of mild sunny days, of walks in a local countryside filled with birdsong and just a hint of that especially bright green that is the early spring growth. We may be a long way from harvest, but April is a good month to think about new beginnings.

So, what does this mean for The Messenger as it reaches its 30th anniversary issue?

I value the Messenger's closeness to Meppershall village, its finger on the pulse of what is going on and for providing a forum to air issues of community interest. A few contributors have elected to retire alongside Dick, so the magazine will be slightly thinner until new contributors come forward. This presents an opportunity, to continue the analogy, for sowing new seed.

Letter from John Chapman:

Referring firstly to the correspondent in the February Messenger regarding road markings, I concur with his observations surrounding the footpath markings and red pinch point areas. I scoured the Internet and could find no precedent or information regarding these (only where painted pinch points indicate a 'Village Gateway'). One of the green strips is already in need of resetting as it is partially sinking; interesting to note that painted green strips in Shefford indicate cycle ways. Hopefully, the correct six signs for a crossing will be installed soon at all three points. Anecdotal evidence suggests that horses will not cross them easily either. It is also extremely patronising of the council to suggest that pedestrians are apparently incapable of crossing directly from one side of a narrow road to the other without direction although it is not, it seems, necessary across our road junctions (yet) or where children cross the High Street to catch school buses!

Over the last two years we have seen the Great Meppershall Street Lamp Experiment unfold. This began with the flat LED replacement lamps in Crackle Hill Road and continued with the orange lamps, which have lit our streets for decades, being arbitrarily replaced with various alternatives presumably to SAVE money in running costs. In a sensible way the Shefford Road lamps were then gradually replaced by white lamps seemingly as the orange lamps failed. Then, all but one of the lamps in Orchard Close were cut down and replaced with capping posts and white tubes. Recently ALL the lamps in the High Street and Shefford Road, including those already recently replaced, have been replaced with a totally different lamp. This extended to side roads including HALF of Orchard Close, which now has 3 different lamp types.

This leads me on to the bus stop debacle. Last year, bus stop signs and associated painted road markings were installed throughout the village. Within a matter of weeks the signs were then moved and the road markings burned off and repainted. There is still an orphaned post at the top of Orchard Close just to remind us of this.

In a time of austerity, how can the Council justify this sort of behaviour bearing in mind that a simple road sign can cost in excess of £500 to make and install (and re-position)? The many thousands of pounds wasted on the above may have been better used to repair our crumbling pavements, for instance.

I am very grateful for the opportunity to reply to the letter from John Chapman which came in 'on my watch' even though too late to be included in the last issue for which I was responsible.

I think I should first clarify that Meppershall Parish Council has no authority in the areas of road markings, street lights or bus stops: executive responsibility for all these matters lies with Central Beds Unitary Council (CBC). The role of a Parish Council is simply to act as a communications interface between CBC and parish residents. On that basis I asked for comment on John Chapman's letter from CBC.

Dear Editor,

I note your correspondent's comments on the coloured road surface sections included in the Meppershall Traffic Calming scheme carried out last September. The two locations of green imprint material had been included in the scheme to provide an optimum arrangement in highlighting crossing points aligned with the adjacent off road footpath route, indicating the continuous footpath route.

Monitoring of the Meppershall traffic calming scheme will provide the opportunity to assess the durability of the green imprint; we will also arrange for removal of the redundant bus-stop post near Orchard Close. Initial findings have shown the traffic calming scheme has raised driver awareness of the special nature of the village environment and had a positive impact on traffic conditions.

The variation in lighting along the length of Orchard Close comes from changes in lighting technology. LED is the current innovative light source being supported for 'roll out' across Central Bedfordshire. The remaining concrete column on Orchard Close is not fit for purpose, and will be replaced in line with the LEDs recently installed. The work has been scheduled to take place in April/May 2015, the same time as the six remaining white lights will be upgraded to LEDs too. The result being that all the lighting will be of the same 'type' and be more efficient.

Meppershall Parish Council Report 9th March 2015

The Council received information regarding the Central Bedfordshire 2015 Budget and a proposed precept increase from Bedfordshire Police which will require a referendum as the increase is over 2%. The Police and Crime Commissioner is requesting an increase of 15.8% to fund the recruitment of 100 additional uniformed officers. This referendum will be held on 7th May 2015 together with Parliamentary, Unitary and Parish Council elections.

The Council also discussed the poor state of highway footpaths in the village, proposed signage for the crossings of the permissive path in Shefford Road, 30mph signs and white lines missing from bends. All these are being raised with Central Beds / Amey in the near future.

The Clerk is still trying to get Central Beds to install more visible signage to St. Mary's Church from the High Street and Rectory Road. In addition he advised that we will shortly be receiving new warning signs about Dog Fouling.

Wry Close allotment still has a large number of vacant plots that are available for letting from £12.00 per annum, depending on size. The meeting was advised that the Village Caretaker will be making regular inspections of the allotments in the future. This is to ensure that tenants maintain their plots to a good standard and not allow weeds to grow which affects other plot holders.

Are you considering becoming a Parish Councillor?

On 7th May 2015 there will be national and local government elections. Meppershall Parish Council has not been able to hold an election for many years due to a lack of candidates. This year a number of currently serving Councillors are not standing for re-election and we urgently need residents to come forward and assist with the running of our Village.

The Parish Council is a non-political group which meets 11 times a year for a couple of hours. If you are considering standing and would like more details, please do not hesitate to contact me 01462 851770. Nomination forms are now available for submission by 9th April 2015 to Central Beds at Chicksands.

Any resident is welcome to attend our meetings to speak about any subject during our open public session at the beginning of the formal meeting. Or you may just wish to come along and see what we do. We look forward to seeing you at our next meeting on Monday 13th April 2015 at 7:45 pm in the Village Hall. There will also be the Annual Parish Meeting on Monday 20th April 2015 at 7:45 pm where the Chairman of the Council presents his annual report to the Parishioners of Meppershall.

So we must rely on the people of Meppershall themselves: if you see a 'Sold' sign outside a house, let the Gnomes know so that we can follow it up. If you see a removal van unloading, be neighbourly and introduce yourself but please introduce the Gnomes too: we have a short leaflet about ourselves which we can either give to you to hand over or we can take it ourselves to the new family. WHERE MY CARAVAN HAS RESTED

A YEAR TOURING AUSTRALIA

Part 1 Getting there and selecting a car and caravan



Our time share of motorhome in the USA had given us the confidence to go it alone and awakened the wanderlust bug, so to speak. We decided that we should bite the bullet and tour Australia. We started to do our research and realised that the easiest visa to get was one for visitors which allowed us to spend 12 months in the country. Further investigation soon

proved to us that to hire a motorhome, or a car and a caravan, for a year was way above what we were willing to pay. Our only way would be to go out there and buy whatever we could then sell at the end of the trip. We were told that Australians visiting Britain do this all the time. A chance meeting helped us, as a friend of a friend would "look after us" in Australia.

A couple of weeks later we were given the contact details of a family in Woolagong, south of Sydney. We made contact with them and arrangements were made for us to stay at their house until we got everything organised. Although it is not necessary to have such a contact, this arrangement was definitely going to make it much easier to organise things when we eventually got out there. With our contact made, and a basic timetable agreed, it was off to Australia House to arrange the visa, which turned out to be relatively straight forward but time consuming. Although we had a visa granted for 12 months visiting, we could only stay a maximum of 6 months at any one time and had to leave Australia for at least 48 hours before being able to continue to use the remainder of our visa period. Bit of a bind, but rules is rules and we thought that we could pop over to Australia's Costa del Sol at Bali midway through our term. As it turned out this did not become an option. Next step was to book a flight. All very exciting.

Our departure date (Monday 11th February 2003) dawned, we closed up the house, climbed into a taxi and made our way to Heathrow. We had decided to break our journey at Dubai and Singapore rather than take the single 24 hour flight all the way through. Our departure was delayed because the driver of the vehicle that was towing the aircraft from its parking bay to the taxiway was suddenly taken ill. An ambulance was called and the poor man was taken away on a stretcher. Another driver came and we eventually got pulled out with our nose pointing in the right direction and we were off, only about 1 hour late. Dubai the next stop.

What a contrast from UK is Dubai. Nice and warm, crystal blue sea, skyscrapers galore, unbelievable traffic congestion and, outside the city, plenty of sand! The hotel was very nice and had a lovely garden surrounding a very large swimming pool. A very relaxing place, especially with a G&T in one's hand. The following morning's breakfast was buffet style with lots of choice. It would be worth a trip out here for the breakfast alone! We had decided to fill the day looking around a Dubai, however, that proved a little more difficult than one expected. Dubai is scattered and areas of interest are not conveniently placed together. We took the shuttle bus to "city centre" thinking we would be in the midst of Dubai, only to find that it was a giant shopping mall called City Centre. Looking at the shop names you could have been in England, America, France or any other European country. It even had a Debenhams and a Laura Ashley to say nothing of IKEA and Woolworths (an upmarket one at that)! Anyway we spent 4 hours there without difficulty but bought nothing!

The hotel shuttle bus came around and we caught it to the Gold Souk. Now this area had atmosphere. It was not a market as one would assume from the word Souk, but consisted of many inter-crossing streets, some wide, some narrow, with wall to wall gold and diamond shops. It made the mind boggle. It also confused one as to what was available and where. Again we did not buy but easily passed 2 hours. We did find out how things were priced; you simply chose your gold piece, it was then weighed and the gold price for the day was charged plus an addition for the workmanship and dealers profit. It is for this workmanship and profit that one is expected to haggle. No haggling takes place at all on the price of gold. Another interesting aspect of the area was the number of sellers actually offering fake designer watches at knock down prices! Unfortunately time ran out and we had to return to the hotel to collect our luggage and make for the airport and it was Singapore next stop. Our hotel in Singapore was not as good as the one in Dubai but its location was convenient for getting into the city. They did, like the one in Dubai, run a shuttle bus so we caught it to Orchard Road, took the underground to Raffles Place and walked to

the Merlion and to SunTec City. We had visited Singapore on a previous occasion so avoided Raffles Hotel this time having experienced the weak gin slings and dropping peanut shells on the floor. We failed to find the pickup point for the shuttle back to the hotel so had eventually to hail a taxi. Earlier we had booked for a night safari trip in Singapore Zoo so we had to get back. I would highly recommend this trip to anyone overnighting in Singapore. You are given a torch on arrival and escorted throughout. We were amazed at the amount of animals, reptiles and creepy-crawlies that were on the move and visible to us. The area you are taken to is separate from the main zoo and you travel on a train around the main parts with 3 walks should you wish to do so. The lighting is fantastic for it looks just like moonlight and because of Singapore's geographical position, it always gets dark around 7.30pm so it is ideal for an evening out especially if you have children. We saw lots of animals and the atmosphere was just marvellous. All too soon it was over and back to the hotel. We easily filled in the following day looking around Singapore but had to be at the airport for a 4pm take off and we were on the last leg of our journey to Oz. The flight was uneventful, apart from a symbolic spraying of the luggage in the aircraft lockers prior to take off whilst we all sat there! I say symbolic because two stewardesses moved through the aircraft opening the overhead lockers and giving the contents a cursory squirt from an aerosol can! We sat there in our seats, those in the aisle probably got splashed. We were reliably informed that the spray would only kill the bugs! In my opinion the way they sprayed, the bugs would have had no difficulty in surviving the ordeal.

Prior to landing we were given the inevitable immigration forms to complete. What you are not allowed to take into Australia leaves very few alternatives. Prior to landing, the lockers were again symbolically sprayed. It really is a mockery. All this, we read, was to prevent the importation of pests into the country. We had been up in the region of 38000ft so goodness knows what pests had entered the aircraft after the spraying in Singapore. Whatever had got in was not going to be deterred by a bit of aerosol now!!! We left the aircraft, and quickly went through the immigration check, then the collection of baggage and the examination of our "prohibited" goods and the entire activity only took 30 minutes. That, for me, is a record time through any international airport. I was very impressed with their efficiency. Dick and Bev, our hosts, were there to meet us with a sign which read "Denis and Ruth, welcome to Oz".

How Much Do You Support Local Businesses?

Continuing the theme of local businesses, this month I chose to interview Colette House about her Bed and Breakfast called Old Joe's. It is at 90 Fildyke Road in Meppershall (the blue house).

Old Joe's B&B was started in September 2007. Colette decided to take on the job because she had "a lovely house with three spare rooms and a spare bathroom- and it would be a shame not to use it". She did some research and found out that there was very little cheap accommodation in the area. Colette told me that she was inspired from watching television episodes of people who owned B&B's and realised how easily she could set up that business.

During the first week of setting up, she noticed that the Biggleswade Chronicle was holding a competition to tell them in 60 words "why your business should win". Colette was surprised when she found out she had won, so she asked what it was that made her win. The Chronicle said that she had won because she was so unselfish and wrote about the benefits to the other local businesses (the pub, bakery, social club and shop) and her prize was a free website. Her website (www.oldjoes.co.uk) shows all the information you might need and it gives people an idea of the particular things that appeal to her guests. You can also view the testimonials and reviews from previous guests which are all up-to-date. Upon starting her business, Colette contacted 'Visit Britain' to get advice, the information she needed and how to register. She had an anonymous visit from a representative from 'Quality in Tourism' who gave her an accreditation of 2 stars. However, when she received her assessment report, each category (hospitality, cleanliness, facilities, furnishings

and food) received a four star rating. The two star rating reflects the lack of hand wash basins in the bedrooms. Colette said "Old Joe's is aware that a two star rating may put potential guests off, but the above explanation of my report may way-lay their fears".

She is open all year round and her guests describe it as 'home from home comfort'. After a good night's sleep, the guests go down for a continental breakfast with bread and cakes from Roger's Bakery, fruit from her allotment and her homemade preserves. Colette told me that her guests are mainly split into three categories: trades people, friends/relatives visiting people in the village and people who are going to events in the area. She said "The B&B has all the basic things it needs which is why it appeals to people (especially the trades people) who are looking for local, cheap accommodation". She also told me that some of her guests can be late for breakfast as the bathroom looks on to the wonderful fields behind and the B&B's lovely garden, and men seem to take a long time shaving while bird watching!

With supporting the local businesses, Colette said that she believes Meppershall people are very loyal to their village and try to support their community as much as possible, and that Old Joe's Bed and Breakfast also benefits the businesses in the area.

If you know someone who needs friendly and cheap accommodation, then why not tell them to support our village and consider Old Joe's B&B.

FINANCIAL UPDATE by PAUL SAVUTO

FILM REVIEW

With all the publicity and praise for Still Alice it has been easy to overlook STILL LIFE (cert.15 1 hr 32 mins.). In this little British gem, Eddie Marsan plays John May, a council officer charged with arranging the funerals of those who have died without relatives around. John has worked in the same office for 22 years. He researches the past lives of the deceased and tries to find anybody who has known the dead person in the past. Once these labours are complete John writes the funeral oration for the vicar to read out and finds appropriate music to suit the deceased.



John lives alone, eating the same food for lunch each day and the same evening meal at home. He always wears the same clothes and has a set routine for everything he does. When he finds that a neighbour has died, John realises that he didn't know anything about

the dead man, Billy Stokes, an alcoholic and that he is in a similar position in that no-one knows or cares about him. An uncaring new boss in the department dismisses John saying that he is being made redundant as the department is downsizing.

John continues to work on his last case, Billy, and while doing his research on Billy's background, finds his estranged daughter, Kelly (Joanne Froggatt). The two lonely souls begin to form a relationship. Just when all seems to be brightening up for John May - who even tries out some new food and changes his clothes for casual attire - disaster strikes.

Eddie Marsan is known for his fine performances, generally in smallish parts in good, solid British films such as Vera Drake with Imelda Staunton and the uptight driving instructor in Happy-Go-Luck. In this film he is finally given the main part and he brings a wonderful combination of vulnerability, loneliness, a conscientious work ethic together with truthfulness to the role which is rare these days. Joanne Frogatt gives a tender performance as Billy's daughter and the two share some sensitive moments together. Director Uberto Pasolini has given us a good picture of loneliness.

I found the ending unsatisfactory, but, apart from that, Marsan's outstanding performance, together with a sensitively directed and well-written story which manages to be moving but never sentimental, makes this a must-see film. It can still be found on limited release or buy/rent it on DVD.

The Rolls Royce Merlin

To all the petrol heads out there you will truly understand about the great

mechanical landmarks that have stamped their place in engineering history. Through the numerous stories I have penned over the years very often I refer to the completed product, the Lamborghini

Aventador, the Suzuki X7, the Dehavilland Comet and many more.



But very rarely does a component of such masterpieces reach the same heights of recognition, such as an engine. In this case I refer you to the Rolls-Royce Merlin. As a write, I can hear the sounds of a Merlin powering a Spitfire through the air which such theatre. For those who know what I am talking about no further words are needed to explain the emotions when experiencing the wave of sound. Even those with less enthusiasm for the world of engineering, will stop and take in the aural spectacle of Merlin engine regardless of its final suit of clothing as a Spitfire or Lancaster Bomber, to name but a few. So how did the Merlin claim its distinctive place in the hall of

engineering fame?



In the early 1930s, Rolls-Royce started planning its future engine development program and realised there was a need for an engine larger than their 21litre (1,296 cu in) Kestrel which was being used with great

success in a number of 1930s aircraft. Consequently, work was started on a new 1,100 hp class design known as the PV-12, with PV standing for *Private Venture*, 12-cylinder, as the company received no government funding for work on the project. The PV-12 was first run on 15 October 1933 and first flew in a Hawker Hart biplane in 1935. The engine was originally designed to use the evaporative cooling system then in vogue. This proved unreliable and when supplies of ethylene glycol from the U.S. became available, the engine was adapted to use a conventional liquid cooling system. The Hart was subsequently delivered to Rolls-Royce where, as a Merlin test bed, it completed over 100 hours of flying with the Merlin C and E engines.

In 1935, the Air Ministry issued a specification, for new fighter aircraft with a minimum airspeed of 310 mph. fortunately, two designs had been developed: the Supermarine Spitfire and the Hawker Hurricane: the latter designed in response to another specification. Both were designed around the PV-12 instead of the




Kestrel, and were the only contemporary British fighters to have been so developed. Production contracts for both aircraft were placed in 1936, and development of the PV-12 was given top priority as well as government funding. Following the company convention of naming its piston aero engines after birds of prey, Rolls-Royce named the engine the Merlin after a small, Northern Hemisphere falcon.

The Merlin consumed an enormous volume of air at full power (equivalent to the volume of a single-decker bus *per* minute), and with the exhaust gases exiting at 1,300 mph it was realised that useful thrust could be gained simply by angling the gases backwards instead of venting sideways. During tests, 70 pounds-force thrust at 300 mph, or roughly 70 horsepower was obtained which increased the level maximum speed of the Spitfire by 10 mph to 360 mph. The first versions of the ejector exhausts featured round outlets, while subsequent versions of the system used "fishtail" style outlets which marginally increased thrust and reduced exhaust glare for night flying.

In September 1937 the Spitfire prototype, *K5054*, was fitted with ejector type exhausts. Later marks of the Spitfire used a variation of this exhaust system

fitted with forward-facing intake ducts to distribute hot air out to the wingmounted guns to prevent freezing and stoppages at high altitudes, replacing an earlier system that used heated air from the engine coolant radiator. The latter system had become ineffective due to improvements to the Merlin itself which allowed higher operating altitudes where air temperatures are lower. Ejector exhausts were also fitted to other Merlin-powered aircraft.

Central to the success of the Merlin was the supercharger. A brilliant engineer by the name of Sir Stanley Hooker improved the performance of the Merlin by developing a supercharger which gave the Merlin an extra 30% in power and



also added a distinctive whine when powering through the air. There are some examples of the Merlin on display at the Shuttleworth collection with the bonus of hearing them in action during the displays.




We have already started our plans for this year's fair.

Lewis' Further Adventures

Deployment at R.A.F. Seletar.

This should have been a text book exercise but unfortunately the Battery had a number of Young Officers who had joined the Regiment straight from continuance training at Manorbier and were not aware of the wealth of experience afforded by the No1 Gun Sergeants. Against the advice of his senior No1, orders were given for a Gun Sub comprising three Matador tractors, a 40/70 gun, a Fire Control FCE No 7 and a Meadows 27.5 kva generator to drive in and deploy in a mangrove swamp. I received a frantic call over the Regimental Radio Net for urgent help; I arrived to find the floor of the driver's cab of the lead Matador about to disappear into the heaving mess of the swamp. I ordered the No1 to uncouple the gun and using his remaining Matadors to clear all the equipments onto firm ground at least three hundred yards from the impending immersion. I advised the Y.O. to return to the Battery H.Q. and not to return to the site.

After a lift to my hangar, the Scammel Wrecker was brought to the immersion site. Pacing out the deployment of the recovery equipment, two pulley blocks were set out with fishplates and ground anchors to provide a four to one pull, the three equipments and two unscathed Matadors were all lashed together to provide a substantial anchor for the Scammel to pull against. Now came the time to dig the ooze away from the Matador and lay sand channels behind the rear wheels: we were very soon covered head to foot in the evil smelling sludge but after an hour all was prepared for the first pull. The driver of the Matador repaired to his cab, the floor of which now below the surface, engaged reverse gear and together with the winch of the Scammel doing its worst, the Matador inch by inch eased out of the evil resting place. The trucks were driven to the wash down and with the crews simultaneously hosed down and we completed a six hour strenuous welcome to Singapore. I suggested to the battery Commander that the perpetrator of the mishap might consider delivering a crate of Tiger beer to the Gun Sub and surprise, surprise, he did so.

About ten p.m. one evening I received an urgent call to say that a Captain of the Royal Malta Artillery attached to the Regiment had crashed an RAF motorcycle into a monsoon drain on the perimeter of the airfield. Monsoon Drains built by the P.W.D. were some six feet deep with sloping sides down to the drain but the Scammel would be the means of recovery. I arrived at the

crash site to find a bruised and battered "Maltese Falcon" and a severely bent 500cc Triumph twin motor cycle upside down in the ditch. Fortunately a couple of my sergeants had accompanied me so we rigged a couple of slings under the bike and with the Scammel backed up to the ditch, let down the hook of the jib to reach the slings. The jib was not powered so it took fifteen minutes of turning to raise the bike clear of the ditch, then back to the hanger and the bike was soon offloaded. We retired to the mess and I made sure the cost of the Tiger Beers were passed to the Officers Mess and the Falcon's mess bill. The next day I visited the RAF vehicle section and came to an arrangement with the W.O. i/c that he would supply the necessary spares to repair the bike, we would carry out the repairs and the "Falcon" would provide the sustenance to everyone involved (No damage report etc).

The RAF Mess in Seletar was excellent, the living in members made us most welcome and the evenings were to say the least somewhat lively with the attendance of the wives living on the patch and the dance floor of the mess was crowded most nights. We were enjoying our sojourn in Seletar however it was not to last: orders were received to the effect that 22 Regt was to move to Kuching in Borneo in ten days' time

to replace 16 Lt Air Defence Regiment. Equipment would be left in situ and signed off to the incoming Regiment. This was something I feared most, as we had spent the last months getting all the equipment up to scratch and with my experience of 16 Regiments equipment, which I had inspected on a number of occasions in BAOR, I knew we would have another hard task in front of us. An AQMS was drafted in from 12 Regt workshop to accept the handover of my Workshop Equipment and Vehicles which he would in turn hand over to 16 Regt workshop when they deplaned from Kuching.

Very soon we emplaned, personnel only, into Argosy and Beverly transport aircraft for the relatively short hop to Kuching Airfield.

SWEET AND SOUR CHICKEN

APRIL 2015

500g skinless, boneless chicken breast fillets, diced.

- 2 teaspoons vegetable oil.
- ½ green pepper, sliced.
- ½ red pepper, sliced.
- 3 spring onions, chopped.
- 2 carrots, cut into matchstick strips.
- 1 clove garlic, crushed.
- 1 teaspoon cornflour.
- 4 teaspoons soy sauce.
- 1 small tin pineapple pieces, juice reserved.
- 1 teaspoon rice vinegar.
- 1 teaspoon light brown soft sugar.
- ½ teaspoon ground ginger.

METHOD (serves 6 persons):

- 1) Brown the chicken breast pieces in the vegetable oil in a large wok over medium high heat.
- 2) Add the green and red peppers, spring onion, carrot and garlic and stir-fry for 1-2 minutes.
- 3) In a small bowl, combine the cornflour and soy sauce and mix. Pour into the wok.
- 4) Add the pineapple and juice, rice vinegar, brown sugar and ginger.
- 5) Stir together and bring to a full boil.
- 6) Serve over a bed of white rice.
