Dear Parents and Students

I hope you are all well and enjoyed the video message from the staff last week. It has been lovely to receive positive comments back from you, in particular the reciprocal Youtube video from students who take part in Music and Performing Arts.

This week's e-newsletter is slightly earlier as it is a Bank Holiday on Friday marking the 75th anniversary of VE (Victory in Europe) Day. School will be shut on Friday to all to allow us all to reflect upon the significance of this day at a time when the modern world is facing so many challenges.

Thank you for your on-going commitment to remote learning. I know there has been increased communication this week to support this. Please ask your son/daughter to log in regularly to their school email account to check for these messages.

I am aware that it is difficult for some students to complete work requiring IT access during the school day if there are limited devices within the home. I would like to reiterate that our advice to students is to spend approximately the same amount of time completing work for a given subject as they would have during lessons for that subject in a week. This can be at a time that suits your household. I would kindly request that questions or queries about the work set, be made by email between 9 am and 3 pm. You teachers will respond as soon as possible as they too are having to work flexibly due to their household needs.

Whilst there is plenty of work being set by your teacher and clear guidance on what needs to be submitted, we don't expect every piece of work to be completed. There are also new resources available through BBC Bitesize and the Oak National Academy which you may wish to use. Oak National Academy has over 80 teachers from a range of schools and trusts who have produced over 180 online lessons for each week students are not in school. The lessons cover a wide range of subjects and are available for children from reception to Year 10.



A reminder that there is a national support service, StarLine, in place, offering advice to families on how to educate their children at homes while schools are closed. StarLine is run by a team of teachers and education and parenting experts, who will share tips and resources to help home-learning and behaviour. The following information may be of use to some of you with younger children. The government has announced that any working parent usually eligible for 30 hours free childcare or Tax-Free Childcare will remain eligible if they fall below the minimum income requirement due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak. Subject to Parliamentary approval, parents who are critical workers will also remain eligible for these entitlements if their income has increased over the maximum threshold during the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak.

This temporary flexibility will ensure critical workers can continue to access the childcare they need to enable them to work. These arrangements will be reviewed over the summer.

The Oxford ARC Study: Achieving Resilience during Covid-19

The Oxford ARC are currently co-ordinating a large online study to investigate resilience and how adolescents and their parents are coping during the COVID-19 (Coronavirus) pandemic. They want to find out why some young people cope extremely well with stressful situations, while others find it more difficult. They hope to better understand how psychological factors relating to worry, mental health, and social isolation affect the wellbeing of adolescents during this pandemic.

They are inviting young people (aged 13 – 18 years old), and their parents, to take part in an online study run by the University of Oxford. Your responses will help them understand how worry and resilience affect us during the challenges and uncertainties of COVID-19.

They will ask you to complete a survey each week for three months or until after social isolation measures are in place. The first one takes about 20 minutes and each follow up takes 10-15 minutes. They will then re-contact you monthly until 12 months from the start of the study for further 10-15 minute surveys.

The OSA Certificate of Online Safety

The current situation has resulted in an increase in online concerns for many young people across the country. As Woodkirk's Online Safety Evening for parents has had to be cancelled this term, Woodkirk Academy has signed up to the Online Safety Alliance which provides training for parents.

Once you are signed in you will be asked for an **enrolment key** – this is **woodkirk**.

The course is free and it would be great if you could sign up and complete the course over the coming weeks.

It is also important you are confident your son/daughter knows how to be safe and responsible when using the Internet. As part of our Online Safety education programme we would like students to complete a course delivered by the Online Safety Alliance. The OSA Certificate of Online Safety will provide valid and tangible evidence that your son/daughter understands how to stay safe online, what to do if things go wrong, and what the possible consequences of bad choices could be.

Leodis Support Service

Leodis Support Service are continuing to support our young people and their families during the partial closures of all schools.

We are regularly updating our website to keep you informed of the services which are still operating locally and nationally such as Foodbanks, debt advice services, mental health support services etc. so that families can continue to access the help that they need.

Our Family Support Workers and Pastoral staff including Child Protection staff are continuing to provide 1:1 telephone and email support and where necessary home visits are being carried out.

Our Counsellors, Wellbeing Workers and Therapists continue to work remotely with young people to support their emotional wellbeing and we are continuing to update our Leodis Support Service Website with self-help resources for families to work through together.

Family Support Workers across the Trust are still working to maintain contact with families who need advice and guidance around Parenting. We have Online Parenting Support Courses available for those who wish to complete these online.

As a Cluster Service we are continuing to work with the Local Authority in partnership to ensure that the safety and wellbeing of our families is upheld and that all of our young people and families are safeguarded and know that although we are in isolation at this time, we are certainly not alone.
