Question 7 – This will be a short scenario where you must prove why the claim/justification would NOT succeed. You only have 5 minutes to write this, so you must be highly focused on the reason why it would fail rather than spending time writing about the elements which would succeed. (5 marks)

Police were called to the town hall by shoppers fearful of violence as noise levels and physical contact between protestors grew. Several shoppers had reported seeing a number of demonstrators holding their hands under their jackets and flashes of light reflections making them believe they might have had knives in their possession.
The first police vehicle on the scene took immediate action, shouting through a loud speaker and firing rubber bullets into the group. One of the rubber bullets hit Frank on his temple, he died on impact.
Suggest why, in law, Frank's family's claim against the police under Article 2 might not be successful.
Since its launch last year, Extinction Rebellion has shut bridges, poured buckets of fake blood outside Downing Street, and stripped semi-naked in Parliament. It has three core demands: for the government to "tell the truth about climate change", reduce carbon emissions to zero by 2025, and create a citizens' assembly to oversee progress. Controversially, the group is trying to get as many people arrested as possible. One of the group's founders, Roger Hallam, believes that mass participation and civil disobedience maximise the chances of social change. In their latest demonstration, a total of 52 arrests took place and five people were detained on suspicion of criminal damage at Shell's HQ  Suggest why, in law, Extinction Rebellion probably would not be able to make a claim under Article 11 ECHR.
Henry is a member of the far right group Britain First. He is also an illustrator. He regularly draws cartoons of

armoured Snatch Land Rovers. Private Hewett, who was driving, died of his wounds at the scene while being given first aid by members of the patrol. Question 11 – This will be a long scenario. There will usually be two/three substantive topics (human rights including justifications) to either prove or disprove. This is worth 23 marks. There will also be an evaluative theory element related to the scenario. This is worth 7 marks. (23 marks scenario + 7 marks theory)

A doctor's surgery was burgled one evening, footage from the surgery's CCTV showed a young female helping herself to drugs from the cabinet. After several days had passed without the police being able to identify the female, PC Jones saw Claire, a young female whose sister had a record of drug-related offences, walking down the street wearing a new designer jacket. PC Jones stopped Claire and questioned her about the burglary at the surgery. PC Jones was unhappy with Claire's answers and searched her pockets. He found some tablets wrapped in silver foil. Claire was taken to the police station, where she was detained and questioned about the burglary. Lab results determining the nature of the tablets showed that they were antibiotics for her cat, prescribed by a vet. She was released without charge 36 hours after she was brought to the station.

Claire's sister, Rebecca, was furious about the detention and handcuffed herself to the railings outside the police station, staging a hunger strike in protest of the police's abuse of power. Several others joined her, handcuffing themselves to the railings too. One protestor was a professional photographer and took photographs of police officers entering the building. After three days of asking the protestors to move, the police used machinery to cut the railings and removed the protestors themselves.

	New Horizons Productions created a successful weekly children's television show, 'Inside Olivia', which used hitech medical equipment to explain to youngsters how the human body works. The show won several awards, and its young presenter, Olivia became a national celebrity. The Daily Trash obtained photos of Olivia taken outside an alcohol treatment clinic during filming of an episode designed to warn young viewers of the dangers of binge drinking. The Daily Trash wish to publish the photos under the headline: "What Really Goes On Inside Olivia", together with an article claiming that Olivia was a secret alcoholic. The article contained an additional photograph of Olivia at a birthday meal, her glass of wine had been digitally altered and replaced by a two litre jug of alcohol.  The Minister for Youth, Jane Jones, was also sent the photos and made a speech in Parliament describing Olivia as a bad role model. She then repeated these comments on her Twitter page. The speech and Twitter comments resulted in thousands of complaints to New Horizons productions, which, as a result terminated Olivia's contract.
