PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Staffing

Salaries increase was due to annual increments for both ongoing staff and the SU President and to the introduction of the temporary post of Advice Centre Co-ordinator. The A/C Co-ordinator position was set at 10 hours a week to be spread over two evenings. The service was well received by both the College and the Students and has been made permanent this year.

Welfare

Welfare expenditure remained relatively unchanged despite the redefinition of the manner in which the SU offers its academic support. The existing Academic Learning Support (ALS), which operated for three hours every Saturday was scrapped and a series of topical seminars, were developed. Each topic was covered several times with the relevant sessions being spread over various weekday evenings to allow for maximum accessibility. The improved service was very successful and annual participation levels rose from 56 students under ALS in 1998/99 to over 300 students for 1999/00.

Social Activities

Despite the redundancy of two societies, the Clubs & Societies attained an overall membership level of over 700 students. Societies made good use of the Bar facilities in two ways: a) as a venue in itself and often in conjunction with Union events and b) for the purchase of 'sale or return' beverages for their events in general. Both cases represented a saving for both the Union Entertainments budget and individual societies as well as serving to increase Bar takings.

Communications

The content of the handbook was extended to include the College Regulations and Procedures as well as the SU Constitution. The increase in this heading represents the Union's cost after a one off payment from External Relations of £1,400.

The Lamp & Owl was produced twice a term throughout the year for the first time.

An 'all-student' mailer was introduced this year to increase the Union's profile with students and help raise participation levels. Student response was very positive and the cost of materials, photocopying and postage were placed under the heading of Campaigns.

Shop

The temporary move to the ground floor of the main Malet Street Building led to a 122% increase in sales. This generated an increase of net income of 839% from last year's figures.

Surplus

The Union worked to a balanced budget in 1999/00. The surplus for the year can be attributed to savings from the headings of Entertainments and Clubs & Societies and the increase income associated with the Bar and Shop.

UNION MANAGER'S REPORT

INCOMING RESOURCES

COLLEGE GRANT

Our Direct Grant has increased in line with cost of living this year and our Staffing Grant has seen an increase due to the new staffing position of Advice Centre Co-ordinator. The Bar Grant has seen an increase with sales improving from last year.

INCOME FROM SERVICES

The Union Shop was relocated to the ground floor of the college building and in larger premises allowing us to offer a wider range of products and services. As a result The Union Shop turnover has increased by 122% and income increased by 839%. The Union Shop is going to be relocated temporarily to a smaller premises on the forth floor of the college building, this due to the new extension building work. We envisage a reduced turnover and foot flow in the next financial year, which is likely to affect our income from The Union Shop next year.

OTHER INCOME

Income from commercial advertising in our publications such as the Handbook and Lamp and Owl has increased which reflects the improvement in the quality of our publications. Income from gaming machines declined, this has been the general trend in this area and we are no different in this respect with other students' unions. Misalliance income has seen a decline largely due to the termination of the Institute of Education Students' Union arrangement of buying in to our Counselling service.

RESOURCES EXPENDED

STUDENT SUPPORT

The Sabbatical remuneration costs have increased in line with the usual annual grading and cost of living increase. Union Activities costs has increased as we try to raise the Students' Union profile through direct mailings to our students and more regular publication of Lamp and Owl. Other categories have not seen any substantial increase or decrease from last year.

ADMINISTRATION AND MANAGEMENT

Salaries costs have increased to reflect the new post of Advice Centre Co-ordinator and also the usual annual grading and cost of living increase. Administration costs overall are in line with last year but there has been a shift towards higher costs for Postage and Telephone to increase communication with our membership.

Finally, I would like to thank the Union Executive and Staff for their hard work and commitment and look forward to their collaboration and support in the future.

STATEMENT OF OFFICERS' RESPONSIBILITIES

In accordance with the Students' Union Constitution, the Officers of the Students' Union are responsible for the administration and management of the affairs of the Students' Union and are required to present audited financial statements for each financial year.

The Officers are responsible for keeping accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Students' Union and to enable it to ensure that the financial statements are prepared in accordance with Students' Union's Statutes, Guidance from the HEFCE and other relevant standards. In addition, the Officers are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the statement of affairs of the Students' Union and of the surplus or deficit and cash flow of that year.

In causing the financial statements to be prepared, the Officers have to ensure that:

- suitable accounting policies are selected and applied consistently;
- judgements and estimates are made that are reasonable and prudent;
- financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Students' Union will continue in operation.

The Officers have taken reasonable steps to:

- ensure that funds from Birkbeck College are used only for the purposes for which they have been given;
- ensure that there are appropriate financial and management controls in place to safeguard public funds and funds from other sources;
- safeguard the assets of the Students' Union and prevent and detect fraud;
- secure the economical, efficient and effective management of the Students' Union resources and expenditure.

AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF BIRKBECK COLLEGE LONDON STUDENTS' UNION

We have audited the financial statements on pages 8 to 15 which have been prepared under the accounting policies set out on page 10.

Respective responsibilities of the Officers of the Students' Union and auditors

As described on page 6 the Officers of the Students' Union are responsible for the preparation of financial statements which are required to be prepared in accordance with applicable United Kingdom law and accounting standards. It is our responsibility to form an independent opinion, based on our audit, on those statements and to report our opinion to you.

Basis of opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with United Kingdom auditing standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board, except that the scope of our work was limited as explained below.

An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of any significant estimates and judgements made by the officers in the preparation of the financial statements and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Union's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error.

In forming our opinion, we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

Opinion

In our opinion the financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of the Union's affairs as at 31 July 2000 and of its incoming resources and total resources expended in the year then ended and have been properly prepared in accordance with the Union rules.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the Union's accounts, which have been prepared in accordance the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting by Charities" published in October 1995 and applicable accounting standards.

a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

b) Depreciation

Depreciation has been calculated so as to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets over their remaining useful lives at the following rates on the reducing balance method:

Equipment 25% Computer equipment 25% Fixtures and fittings 15%

c) Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value and consist of shop consumables.

d) VAT

The Union is not registered for VAT. Birkbeck College accounted for VAT in respect of the Unio tax activities until 30 June 1994. After this date the Students' Union ceased to pay VAT, with the permission of H.M. Customs & Excise.

e) Investments

Investments held as fixed assets are stated at cost less provision for permanent diminution in value. Those held as current assets are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

f) Income Tax

The Inland Revenue treats the Students' Union as having charitable status, hence, there is no Incor Tax charge.
