## Academic Vocabulary:

African American	A black person living in America whose family originated from any of the racial groups of Africa.
Black History Month	Celebrated in February, a period to honor and celebrate the contributions, struggles, and achievements of African Americans in U.S. history and culture.
Deborah DEEP Mouton	The first Black Poet Laureate of Houston, TX; award-winning writer, director, performer and critic.
Emanuelee "Outspoken" Bean	Houston's Poet Laureate through 2023. Commissioned to write and perform a national campaign on diversity for Pabst Blue Ribbon and VICE, while creating and producing his own festival, Plus Fest: The Everything Plus Poetry Festival.

(A small sampling of famous Africans and African Americans)

Queen Nefertiti	A queen of the 18 <sup>th</sup> Dynasty of Ancient Egypt, royal wife of Pharaoh Akhenaten. Portrayed in a famous bust of her head and numerous ancient sculptures.
Nelson Mandela	Leader in the fight against apartheid in South Africa. First Black President. Winner of Nobel Peace Prize.
Desmond Tutu	South African bishop and theologian. Human rights activist. Nobel Peace Prize winner.
Kofi Atta Annan	A diplomat from Ghana. Seventh Secretary-General of the United Nations. Awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.
(Edward Kennedy) "Duke" Ellington	American composer, pianist, and jazz bandleader with a career of over 50 years. He composed thousands of songs including "Take the 'A' Train" and "Mood Indigo."
<i>Ketanji Brown Jackson</i>	American lawyer and jurist; Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States.
Rosa (Louise McCauley) Parks	American civil rights activist, known for her refusal to move from her seat on a bus in Montgomery, Alabama, in defiance of Jim Crow laws, which sparked the Montgomery bus boycott. Known as the "mother of the civil rights movement".
W.E.B. (William Edward Burghardt) Du Bois	American sociologist, socialist, historian, and Pan-Africanist civil rights activist.
Martin Luther King, Jr.	American Baptist minister, civil rights activist and political philosopher who was a leader of the civil rights movement from 1955 until his assassination in 1968.
Frederick Douglas	American social reformer, abolitionist, orator, writer, and statesman. He was the most important leader of the movement for African American civil rights in the 19 <sup>th</sup> century.
Harriet Tubman	Escaped slave who became a conductor on the Underground Railroad, leading many others to freedom.
Maya Angelou	Poet, author, and activist known for her powerful autobiographical writings and contributions to literature and culture
Jackie Robinson	Baseball player who broke the color barrier in Major League Baseball, paving the way for other Black athletes.
(James Mercer) Langston Hughes	James Mercer Langston Hughes was an American poet, social activist, novelist, playwright, and columnist from Joplin, Missouri. An early innovator of jazz poetry, Hughes is best known as a leader of the Harlem Renaissance.

#### Martin Luther King, Jr. “I Have a Dream” speech excerpt:

And so even though we face the difficulties of today and tomorrow, I still have a dream. It is a dream deeply rooted in the American dream.

I have a dream that one day this nation will rise up and live out the true meaning of its creed: “We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal.”

I have a dream that one day on the red hills of Georgia, the sons of former slaves and the sons of former slave owners will be able to sit down together at the table of brotherhood.

I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character.  
I have a dream today!
