

Hidemaro Konoye Complete Berlin Philharmonic Recordings

Viscount Hidemaro Konoye (18 November 1898—2 June 1973) was a conductor and composer of classical music in Shōwa period Japan. He was the brother of pre-war Japanese Prime Minister Prince Furnimaro Konoye.

Konoye attended the Gakushuin Peers School, where he became a close friend of Takashi Inukai. In 1913, he entered the Tokyo University of the Arts, where he specialized in the violin. In 1915, he went to study briefly in Germany to study musical composition, and became a pupil of Kosaku Yamada on his return to Japan. His debut as a conductor was in 1920, with an amateur orchestra led by Toukichi Setoguchi. Konoye returned to Europe for further studies in 1923 in Paris under Vincent d'Indy and Berlin under Franz Schreker. He also studied conducting under Erich Kleiber, and Karl Muck. In 1924, he conducted at the Berlin Philharmonic, and returned to Japan in the fall of the same year. Konoye co-founded the Japan Symphonic Asciation in 1925, and the following year became conductor of the orchestra. Konoe later founded the New Symphony Orchestra of Tokyo (the present day NHK Symphony Orchestra), and helped mold the orchestra over a 10 year period into an ensemble that was praised as competitive with many of the better orchestras in Europe.

Konoye made numerous guest appearances in Europe and America, conducting some 90 different orchestras in the course of his career including the orchestra of La Scala, Milan and the NBC Symphony Orchestra. He created friendships with Erich Kleiber, Leopold Stokowski, Wilhelm Furtwängler and Richard Strauss. He went to Germany and conducted Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra in the second half of the 1930s. Konoye wrote original compositions, but was more deeply interested in arranging existing music, including, for example, Modest Mussorgsky's Pictures at an Exhibition and Schubert's C major Quintet, which he orchestrated.

Recording and restoration notes

Konoye's earliest recordings were made with the New Symphony Orchestra of Tokyo for Japanese Parlophone starting in the 1920s. The most significant irem from these sessions was a Mahler Fourth from 1930, the première recording of the work and the first complete electrical inscription of any Mahler symphony. The orchestra plays with a decidedly rough ensemble, and things are little better in a series of discs with a seemingly under-rehearsed La Scala Orchestra from 1931 which include a complete Beethoven First Symphony.

The present series of recordings was the first Konoye made with a world-class orchestra. His association with the Berlin Philharmonic dated back to 1924, and his conductorial studies under Muck and Kleiber solidified his links to Germany and its symphonic tradition.

The recording of the Mozart cuts the fifth variation in the finale to fit the work onto seven sides, although the eighth side in the set was left blank and the work could have been accommodated complete. The Haydn symphony was fit on six 10-inch sides by omitting most of the repeats. The anthems disc was presumably made to celebrate the Axis alliance between Germany and Japan. (The "Horst Wessel Lied" was routinely appended to the German national anthem during the Hitler era. Not surprisingly, these tracks have remained unreissued in previous Konoye compilations.)

The sources for the transfers were laminated French Columbias for the Mozart and German Polydors for the Haydn symphony and the Mussorgsky. The rare anthems sides came from secondary sources provided by a Japanese collector. **Mark Obert-Thorn**
