

Richard Strauss Radio Recordings Ciemens Krauss





Richard Georg Strauss (11 June 1864—8 September 1949) was a leading German composer of the late Romantic and early modern cras. He is known for his operas, which include Der Roenkaudeir and Salum; his Lecker, especially his Four Last Song; and his tone poems and one-bestral words, such as Death and Turnfiguration. Till Elithophysics Meny Pends, Also aproble Zandaward. An Alphe Symphon; and Malamanphoson. Strauss, along with Gustav Mahler, represents the late flowering of German Romanticism after Richard Wagner, in which pioneering subtleties of orchestration are combined with an advanced harmonic style.

Struss completed the compositor of Metamorphosen, a work for 23 sols strings, in 1945. The tile and inspiration for the work comes from a profoundly self-examining poem by Goethe, which Struss had considered setting as a choral work. Generally regarded as one of the masterpieces of the string repertoire, Metamorphosot contains Strusses most sustained outpouring of tragge errodion. Conceived and written during the blackest cays of World War II, the piece expresses in music Strauss's mourning of, among other things, the destruction of German culture – including the bombing of every great opera souse in the nation. At the end of the war, Strauss wrote in his private diary: "The most terrible period of human history is at an end, the twelve year reign of bestality, ignorance and anti-culture under the greatest criminals, during which Germany's 2000 years of cultural evolution met its doom.

almost immediately. The response from music critics was overall very positive, although some responded negatively to Strauss's use of wallzes, a music form out of fishion at that present moment. Of the Rosenkavalier Waltzes Strauss wrote on October 29, 1944 to Krauss Wife, the singer Voiroit Otsulear: "I have just finishled a new arrangement of my own of the 'Rosenkauder' waltzes, as the existing version, with those atrocious transitions, has been getting on my nerves for some time". Der Rosenkavalier premiered in 1911 in Dresden under the baton of Ernst von Schuch, who had previously conducted the premieres of Strauss's Fauerman, Salama and Eicklin. The reaction to the 1911 premiere was nothing short of triumphant. The opera was a complete of Strauss's Fauerman, Salama and Eicklin. success with the public and was a great financial boon for the house; it is reported that at the time of the première, tickets were sold out

Strauss' second Suite based on clavier pieces by Francois Couperin appeared as Opus 86, and entitled **Divertimento**. Its very existence is due to Krauss who first performed it in Munich in 1941 as a ballet called "Verklimgue Fend". A concert performance, with Krauss conducting the Vicenna Philhamnonic Octoberra, followed in Vienna in 1943. On January 4, 1941 Krauss wrote to Strauss: "Just back from Vienna to find the first Couperin instalment, and the second followed today. I am so glad you have augmented the Suize for us, and I thank you with all my heart for all the trouble you have taken over it. The scoring of the individual pieces is absolutely masserly, and their contrasted sequence is most effective".

Notes on the transfers

These recordings were made in the studios of Bavarian Radio for broadcast in the early 1950s, and emerged on 1960s LPs from Philips. The notes to one of these class includes the following text: "These recording, girl," were not made expressly for the gramophone, yet even if the recording guality does not come up to the standard of perfection one is accustomed to novadays, it seemed well worth while rescuing them from the oblivion of radio archives, in the belief that the public will be eager to appreciate the authenticity of performances by a conductor so intimately connected with Richard Strauss." My arm in applying modern 32-bit XR remastering techniques to these recordings, was to do away with Philips "recording quality" cavet as much as is now possible, and Im glad to say that in all three class major improvements in sound quality have been achieved. Gone is the boxy, veiled tone of the originals, and in its place is a full, clear sound that would bear comparison to the finest recordings of the era. AR
