

Vincent Dello Joio







As a composer, Vincent's music is known for its rhythmic vitality and lyricism. Although his music is essentially classical in form it is distinctly individual. The free tonality of his work makes use of what he calls 'paratonality': the predominance of a diatonic element in a polytonal or atonal passage. Vincent wrote numerous orthestral works, chamber music pieces, art songs, and choral works. He also wrote one baller, 3 Jacks (1942), a film score, Red Cross (1948), and an opena, Primoud V oid (1969). graduating with a diploma in 1927. He continued his studies at Georgie Peabody College where he earned a bachelors and a masters degree followed by doctoral studies at Harvard University from 1935–1935. While at Harvard studying under Walter Piston he won the John Knowles Paine Traveling Fellowship for two years of study with Nadia Boulanger. After transferring to Cornell University he earned his PhD in 1942. Vincent was head of the music department at Western Kentucky University from 1937–1945 and Schoenberg's John Vincent (May 17, 1902 – January 21, 1977) was an American composer, conductor, and music educator. He was born in Birningham, Alabama, and studied at the New England Conservatory of Music under Frederick Converse and George Chadwick successor as professor of composition at UCLA, a position he held from 1946–1969. He died in Santa Monica, California in 1977.

In 1939, he received a scholarship to the Julliard School, where he studied composition with Bernard Wagenaar. While he was a student, he worked as organist at St. Anne's Church, but he soon decided that he didn't want to make his living as an organist. In 1941, he began studying with Paul Hindemith, who encouraged him to come the studies of the study of the studies of the s Norman Dello Joio (January 24, 1913 – July 24, 2008) began his musical career as organist and choir director at the Star of the Sea follow his own lyrical bent, rather than sacrificing it to the atonal systems then popular.

By the late forties, he was considered one of the foremost American composers. He received numerous awards and much recognition. Perhaps Dello Joio's most finnous work in the wind ensemble eategory is his Fantasis on a Thome by Hajah, which was composed for the Michigan State University Wind Ensemble and has since been performed thousands of times across the world. Dello Joio also wrote several pieces for high school and professional string orchestra, including the difficult piece Chanegraphy: Thue Danas for String Ordestra. In 1948 he became associated with the dancer Martha Graham, for whom he wrote several works, including Disertion of Angels and Sensphite Dialogue, a recomposition for chamber orchestra of his Symphony: The Triumph of Saint Joan.

He won the 1957 Pulitzer Prize for Music for his Meditations on Ecolesiastes, first performed at the Juilliard School on April 20, 1956. His Variations, Chaomne and Finale won the New York Critics Circle Award in 1948. It is an orchestral version of his Piano Sonata Na. 1.

In 1965, Dello Joio received the Emmy Award for the "most outstanding music written for relevision in the 1964-1965 Season" for his score to the 1964 NBC television special "The Lamm." The composer created a five movement suite for wind band entitled 'Sennet from "The Lamm." The suite was commissioned by Baldwin-Wallace College for their symphonic band, and was premiered in on March 13, 1966 with the composer conducting.

Transfer notes

Although both recordings were made together in 1957, and therefore both, presumably, in stereo, I have been unable to track down a stereo release of the Dello Joio, which originally paired Vincent's Symphony in D on a mono Columbia release. The latter was latter reissued in stereo, accompanying his Vincent's Symphonic Poem after Descartes, recorded in 1959. All three recordings were well made for their day and sound splendid in these new XR-remastered transfers. AR
