Lesson Study

The West Dorset Schools Collaboration is currently undertaking a series of Lesson Studies. This allows us to work together to improve outcomes for children across all the schools.

Teachers are planning and delivering lessons together and meeting to evaluate the impact of the lessons they have taught. The Lesson Study is allowing us to share good practice and learn from each other.

The areas of focus were decided by looking at outcomes for children across the collaboration. After analysing the outcomes, it was decided to focus on three key areas.

- Girls and higher ability maths
- Early writing for boys
- Children working at greater depth in Reading, Writing and Maths

We will be evaluating the impact at the end of the lesson study project in July. This is an exciting opportunity for teachers across the collaboration to work together to improve outcomes for children and drive improvement in all our schools.



Speech & Language report

Summary of Consultations within the West Dorset Schools Collaboration.

Each school was allocated 2 hours input (funded by the collaboration) with the option to fund additional hours if required. Additional hours were funded by one school.

A Service Level Agreement was provided for schools to read and sign and consent forms were completed by parents/guardians of any pupils to be seen or discussed prior to the visit.

In consultation with the therapist, schools selected pupils to be seen by the therapist or discussed. This included:

- Pupils with a history of speech, language and communication needs (SLCN) known to the NHS speech and language therapy (SLT) service.
- Pupils with SLCN who did not meet the criteria for the NHS SLT service.
- Pupils for whom teachers had raised concern regarding their SLCN.
- Reception class groups for general speech and language screening



Pupils were frequently seen alongside the TAs who worked generally within the class or who were responsible for individual or group intervention. This allowed for face to face discussion with the TA, after meeting the child. In other cases, the therapist was able to provide feedback to the classteacher or SENCO after meeting the pupils.

Visits varied in nature depending on the needs of the schools but included:

- Advising on current NHS SLT therapy plans - explaining information; offering alternative activities/strategies and discussing simplifications to targets.
- Advising on resources and activities.
- Information on suitable strategies for class or specific intervention.
- Information on strategies and ideas to share with parents/guardians.
- Providing ideas for group interventions.
- Screening pupils and providing advice on their SLCN (levels and abilities) along with recommendations for support where appropriate.
- Recommendations for referral to other professionals or to the NHS SLT service.

Beach Clean

The event took place on September 14th at West Beach, West Bay as part of the Great British Beach Clean organized by the Marine Conservation Society and our results will contribute to a national survey. The eco children from Broadwindsor, Salway Ash and Thorner's school worked together to clean the beach and this gave the children a great chance to share ideas with their peers.

The beach clean was a really positive event and the children worked with care, purpose and enthusiasm to clean the 100 metre survey site using equipment on loan from the Dorset Waste Partnership. Whilst on first sight, the beach looked clear of rubbish, over two hours the children collected 508 items of litter in total, which weighed nearly 4 kgs. Most of the litter was fragments of plastic items which had accumulated in the tide line. The children found a whole range of recognisable objects including, toothbrushes, Christmas decorations, lego, golf tees and shoes. They found a total of 51 cigarette ends and a lot of fishing line and netting. All of us were surprised by the range and number of the litter items found and together we now plan to write to the Dorset Waste Partnership to campaign for more recycling bins in the West Bay area. Hopefully the beach clean can become an annual event and the children will have the chance to monitor litter levels on our local coast for years to come.

Finance Officers' meetings - sharing best practice and information about school services, finance protocols and budgetary matters.
