**GET READY**



$$\begin{array}{lll} 1) & 6 \times 1 = & 6 \times 2 = & 6 \times 3 = \\ & 6 \times 10 = & 6 \times 20 = & 6 \times 30 = \end{array}$$

$$\begin{array}{l} 2) \quad 60 - 12 = \\ \quad 150 - 10 = \end{array}$$

3) Double these numbers

6                      12                      24

4) Halve these numbers

28                      280

$$\begin{array}{lll} 1) & 6 \times 1 = 6 & 6 \times 2 = 12 & 6 \times 3 = 18 \\ & 6 \times 10 = 60 & 6 \times 20 = 120 & 6 \times 30 = 180 \end{array}$$

$$\begin{array}{l} 2) \quad 60 - 12 = 48 \\ \quad 150 - 10 = 140 \end{array}$$

3) Double these numbers

$$6 \quad 12 \quad 12 \quad 24 \quad 24 \quad 48$$

4) Halve these numbers

$$28 \quad 14 \quad 280 \quad 140$$

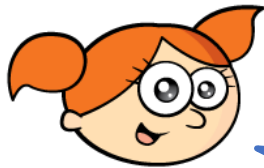

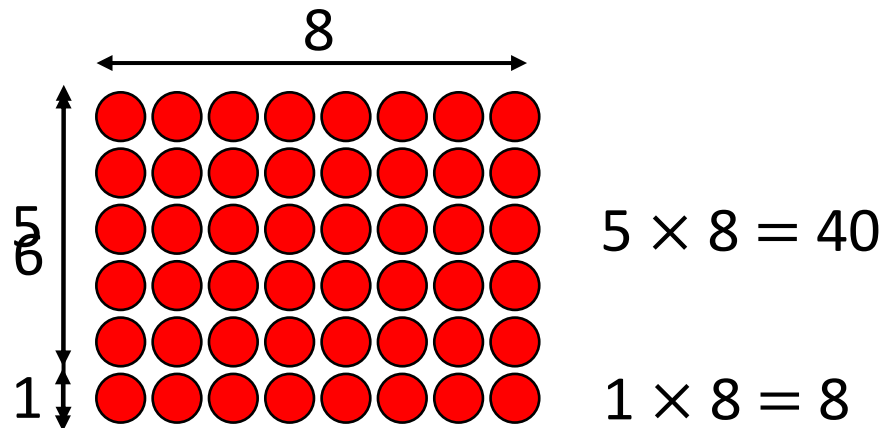

$$6 \times 8 = \boxed{48}$$

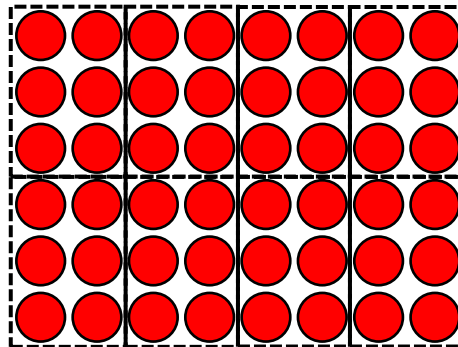
What methods could you use to calculate  $6 \times 8$  if you did not know the answer?

Double 24 is 48

$$2 \times 3$$



$$3 \times 8 = 24$$

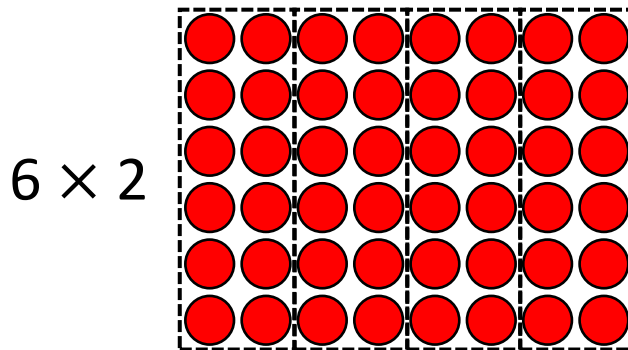
$$3 \times 8 = 24$$

$$24 \times 2 = 48$$

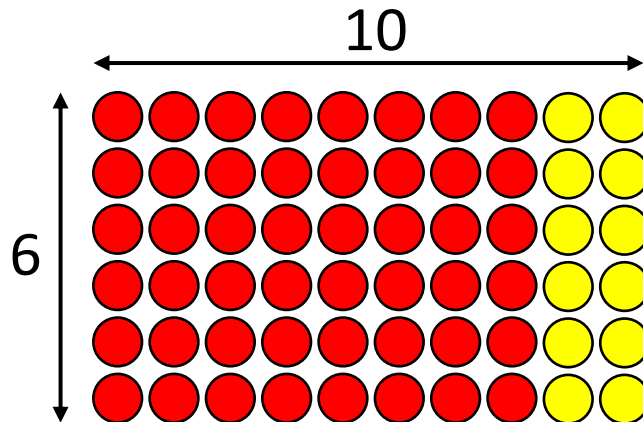

$$6 \times 10 = 60$$

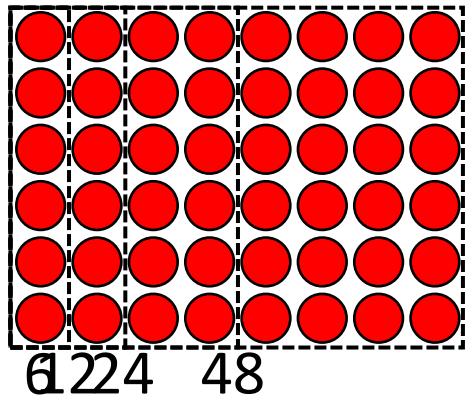
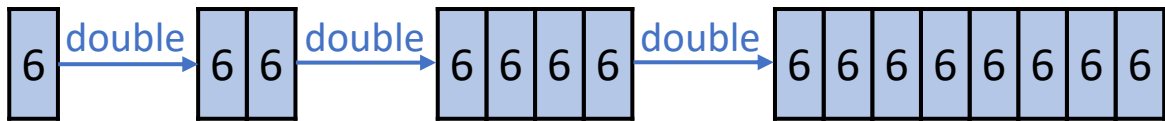

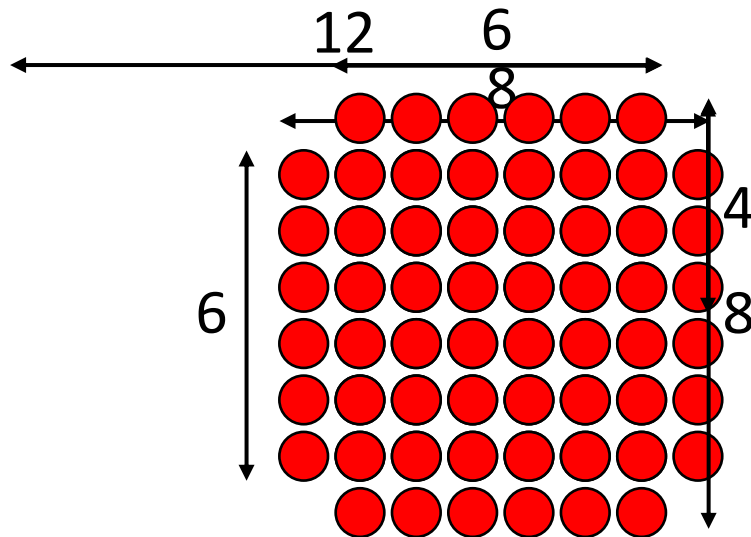

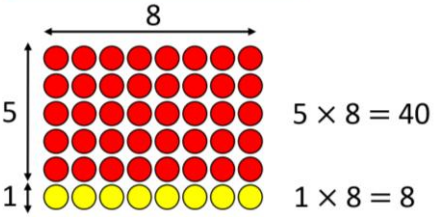

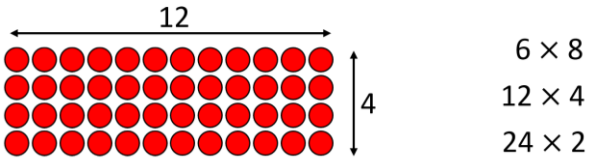

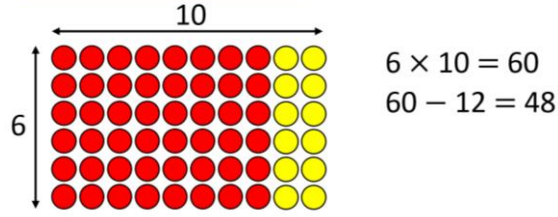

I did  $6 \times 10$  then subtracted 12



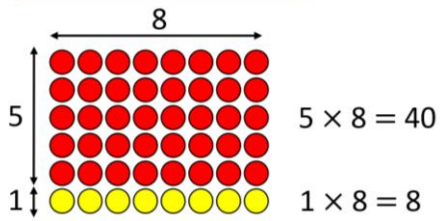
$$5 \times 28 = \boxed{140}$$

I partitioned 6 into 5 and 1



$$5 \times 20 = 100$$

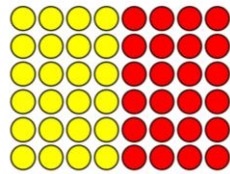
$$5 \times 8 = 40$$

$$100 + 40 = 140$$

$$5 \times 28 = 140$$



$$6 \times 8 = 6 \times 2 \times 4$$



$$6 \times 2 \times 4$$

$$12 \times 4 = 48$$

$$6 \times 2 \times 4$$

$$24 \times 2$$

$$5 \times 2 \times 14$$

$$10 \times 14 = 140$$

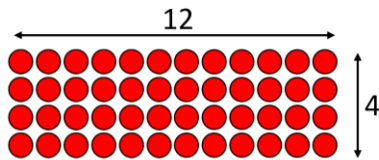
$$5 \times 7 \times 4$$

$$20 \times 7 = 140$$

$$5 \times 28 = \boxed{140}$$

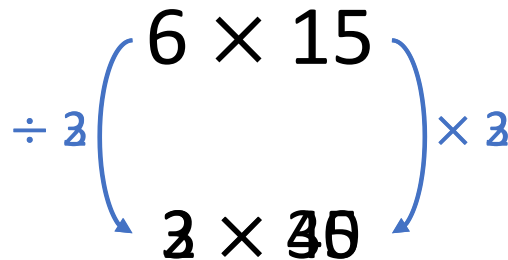


If you double one factor and halve one factor the product stays the same



$$\begin{aligned} 6 \times 8 \\ 12 \times 4 \\ 24 \times 2 \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} 5 \times 28 \\ 10 \times 14 \end{aligned}$$



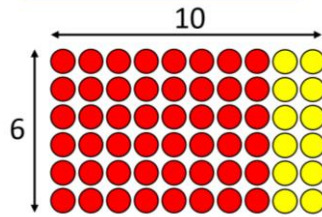
Have a think



$$5 \times 28 = \boxed{140}$$



I did  $6 \times 10$  then  
subtracted 12



$$6 \times 10 = 60$$

$$60 - 12 = 48$$

$$5 \times 30 = 150$$

$$5 \times 2 = 10$$

$$150 - 10 = 140$$



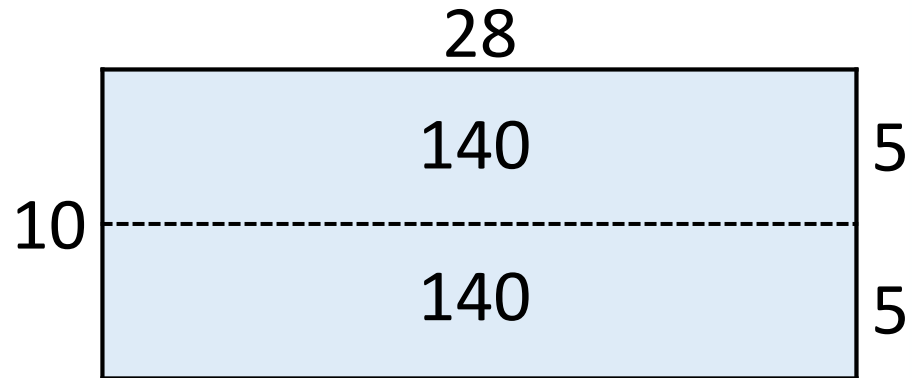
$$5 \times 28 = 140$$



I also know that to multiply by 5 you could multiply by 10 first and then half

$$28 \times 10 = 280$$

$$280 \div 2 = 140$$
