Pupil Premium Grant Report

December 2020

The Pupil Premium is a source of funding made available to schools by the Government. This is targeted funding to be used to provide opportunities for disadvantaged pupils.

The national trend is that pupils who are eligible for free school meals have lower achievement than those who are not eligible. The Pupil Premium grant is to be used to help narrow this gap.

At Kea School, we believe that all pupils should be supported to achieve their potential. We are committed to using the resources made available to us to help achieve the best outcomes for all learners.

Curriculum focus of PPG spending 2020/21

- ❖ Ensuring Key Stage 1 pupils make at least expected progress in reading through weekly booster lessons with support staff
- ❖ Raising attainment in maths to ensure all pupils make at least expected progress
- ❖ Raising attainment in literacy to ensure all pupils make at least expected progress
- ❖ Provision of one to one and small group tuition in upper Key Stage 2 to ensure that majority of pupils reach expected levels in maths and English.
- ❖ Social and emotional skills support (including Thrive) for children who experience difficulties in these areas to enable them to access learning effectively
- ❖ Resources for Trauma Informed Schools/TIS Room
- ❖ Financial support towards swimming for pupils in Y3 and 4
- ❖ Access to residential visits for all, regardless of financial circumstances to ensure that all pupils make the most of educational opportunities on offer
- ❖ Access to wider opportunities (e.g. music lessons)
- ❖ Breakfast provided for children on occasions when they arrive at school hungry

Impact of PPG 2019/20

- ❖ Due to COVID-19, lockdown, school closure (Mar-May) and partial school closure (Jun/July) assessments were not carried out during the summer 2020. This means that it was not possible to measure the full impact of the PP grant this year.
- ❖ Informal teacher assessments were carried out for all Y6 pupils who returned to school in the partial reopening in June. Of this group, children in receipt of PPG funding (4 pupil) 75% achieved expected standards in reading, writing and maths. 50% of them achieved greater depth in reading and 25% achieved greater depth in writing and maths.
- ❖ The average progress in Y6 of these pupils was greater than expected progress in reading, writing and maths (7 pts, 7.5 pts, 7 pts respectively [av 6 pts])
- ❖ Pupils in Y2 – 5 did not return to school in the summer so no assessments were carried out.
- ❖ All pupils in receipt of PPG funding in Y4, 5 and 6 who wanted to attend had been planning to attend the summer term residential visits for their classes. However, unfortunately due to lock-down and school closure, these visits could not go ahead.
