



## Salisbury Primary School Primary PE and Sports Premium 2018-2019

### Background

At Salisbury Primary School, we are strongly committed to PE and recognise the contribution of PE to the health and wellbeing of the children. We believe that an innovative, varied PE curriculum coupled with a wide variety of extra-curricular activities has a positive effect on the concentration, attitude and academic achievement of our pupils. The children at Salisbury take part in a wide range of activities both in and out of school. We take part in regular borough wide competitions, galas and local events.

Schools must spend the Primary Sports and PE Premium funding on making **additional and sustainable** improvements to their PE and sport provision. These improvements are for the benefit of all pupils. The overarching aim is to encourage the development of healthy, active lifestyles. Schools receive their PE and Sports Premium funding based on the number of children in years 1-6 as recorded at the January census.

At Salisbury Primary, this funding enables us to continue and extend our provision through employing additional sports coaches, entering into more competitive sports competitions, providing swimming lessons for three year groups, promoting healthy life-style choices through increasing pupils' cycling skills and confidence, increasing the range of sports pupils have access to, as well as training our staff to deliver high quality PE and Games sessions.

This statement outlines how we have invested our funding and intend to analyse the impact of the expenditure.

At our school we are committed to ensuring our children understand the importance of being active, having a healthy lifestyle and enjoying sports and games activities.

### In 2018/19 we will invest this money in:

- Maintaining a specialist PE Teacher & Leader (Caitlin Gout) with the aim of reviewing and developing a new PE curriculum and assessment system. Miss Gout will support the continuing professional development for our teaching staff by giving them the opportunity to work alongside her to develop their skills and subject knowledge.
- Working with Bikeability to give Year 5 pupils the opportunity to take cycling proficiency lessons. We maintain a set of bicycles to ensure that all our pupils are able to take part.
- Pooling the additional funding with our partner schools through the Schools Sport Co-ordinator (SSCo) Programme to further develop our curriculum enable interschool competition and share resources.
- Organising, leading and participating in sporting events competitions with other schools, with a view to increasing the participation from our least confident and least active children.
- Providing pupils with opportunities to take part in a wider variety of sports and outdoor activities including niche sports such as fencing, archery and ballet, which would not usually form part of a primary curriculum, inspiring interest and aptitude in a range of disciplines.
- Subsidising the cost of sports residential trips for disadvantaged children.
- To increase our swimming lesson offer in KS2 (Years 3 and 5), including catch up lessons for Year 6
- To develop and improve lunchtime provision by create leadership opportunities for pupils and improving the planning and resourcing of the playground.
- Apply for Gold Schools Games Award
- Apply for Healthy Schools Award
