Learning and Curriculum	
Literacy	<p>Drama. Explore Shakespeare using Marcia Williams' Mr William Shakespeare's Macbeth. Investigate different ways of writing dialogue including playscript layout and the use of informal language. Using Macbeth as a stimulus for journalistic reporting (newspapers).</p> <p>Narrative. Unpick the story of Friend or Foe. Identify features of the style of historical fiction. Use flashbacks. Comprehension. James Bond script and story-telling. Use of a range of grammatical devices for dramatic effect. E.g. embedded clauses, short sentence for impact.</p> <p>Argument and Debate. Identify features of argument texts and discuss differences between facts and opinions. Learn how to present opinions as if they were facts. Study formal and informal speech. Research for and hold a class debate. Write and edit their own argument text.</p> <p>Biographies Investigate life stories of famous people (Nelson Mandela, Usain Bolt). Develop questioning skills to research and write a biography of a family member. Write autobiographical passages.</p> <p>SATS revision and practice- Comprehensions, Spelling Punctuation and Grammar</p>
History	<p>Godalming. The topic will involve looking at and using maps to identify physical features over time and changes to land use; changes over time in housing and life style and for generating ideas about improving Godalming. We will be looking at local and national events and assessing their impact on Godalming. The children will also be asked to look forward and predict what the Godalming of the future might be like.</p>
RE	<p>The Christian belief that Jesus is the Son of God and investigate the statements Jesus used about himself. Investigate why Jesus used these ideas to express who he was, and to reflect on what they mean for Christians.</p> <p>Recognise the different ways in which Christians have made an impact to society and identify certain individuals and organisations that have been involved in this process Adam, Eve, Christmas & Easter - what are the connections?</p>
Art & DT	<p>Art Picasso. Investigating and creating collages in his style.</p> <p>DT Cooking create a hot meal using healthy ingredients.</p>
Music	<p>Exploring and appraising jazz music and looking at music from notable composers such as Burt Bacharach. We will explore the musical features of jazz such as rhythm, pitch harmony and pitch.</p> <p>Additionally we will engage numerous musical skills (rhythm, pulse, pitch) when learning A New Year's Carol by Benjamin Britten</p>
PE	<p><u>Invasion games and skills</u> – football; <u>Striking and fielding skills</u> – cricket; <u>Gymnastics</u> – body tension; <u>Dance</u> – Street dance</p>
Numeracy	<p>Place value and negative numbers; mental addition and subtraction; order of operations; decimal place value, adding and subtracting decimals; co-ordinates, statistics and measure; mental calculation strategies (x and ÷); written calculation strategies (x and ÷); fractions, percentages and statistics; algebra; multiplication and division of fractions; area, perimeter and volume; shape, ratio and percentage.</p>
ICT	<p>Develop skills in using XL to solve data problems and record data</p> <p>Develop analysis and presentation skills using a range of programs.</p> <p>Internet research and navigation round the internet. Using technology in design.</p>
Science	<p>Animals including humans. The human circulatory system.</p> <p>Living things and their habitats</p>
Geography	<p>Godalming. The topic will involve looking at and using maps to identify physical features; land use; changes over time and for generating ideas about improving Godalming. How natural and human influences have shaped our locality.</p>
