WHAT'S GOING ON IN SCHOOL ANYWAY?



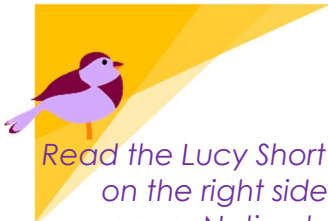

Vouchers for Free School Meals

Those eVouchers can be used in most of the big supermarkets – you have to choose which supermarket you would like, so hopefully you will be able to choose your favourite. The vouchers are for £15 per week, per child.

Please make sure that parents check their text and e-mail messages to get your eVouchers. There is also information on what they need to do on your school website and facebook, too.

If you use the money to help your parents cook a delicious meal, why not snap a photo, and ask a parent to post it to your school's facebook page! Your teacher would LOVE to see you trying a new skill!
