# Emotional language

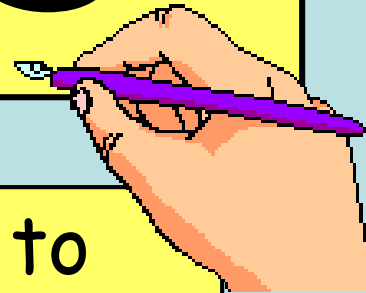


Persuade the reader with emotional language. For example:

Everyone will laugh at me...

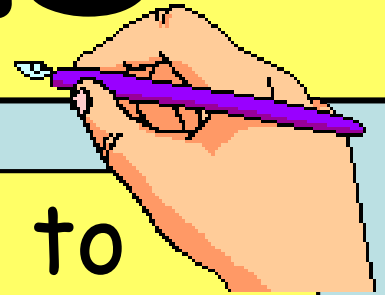
# Conditional sentences

If I can stay up tonight I will clean my room....

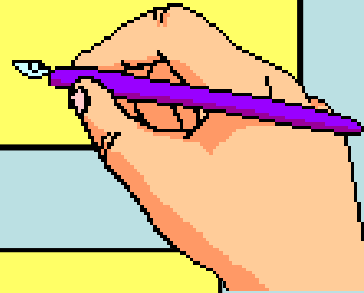
# Rhetorical questions

How much longer will you treat me like a child when I am in year 6?

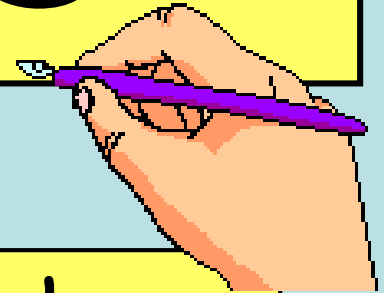
# Use good reasons

I can join in chats tomorrow and won't be stood on my own....

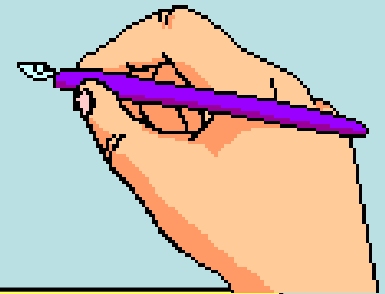
# Explain your arguments
