



Bow Community Primary School PE and Sports Premium Funding Review 2017/2018

Priority/Target: To utilize the PE funding effectively in order to improve the quality, provision and sustainability of PE at Bow CP School	
Focus/Target	Review
<p>1) To improve the quality and consistency of provision of PE, and help improve staff confidence in their delivery, to improve levels and standards in PE</p>	<p>➤ <u>To continue to extend the skills of existing teachers, including sports coaches</u></p> <p>Crediton Learning Community Sports Partnership</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • We have bought into the Crediton Learning Community Sports Partnership 2017/18 and are working alongside sport staff at QE School in order to increase the focus of the PE curriculum for our pupils. • QE has held a gymnastics event for the Year 3 and Year 4 pupils and a multi-skills event for the Year 1 and Year 2 pupils. Bow teaching staff (GS & EO) and support staff (CQ, AW & SM) accompanied the children and were able to further their knowledge of the PE curriculum and gain ideas to use with the pupils back at school. • Further events planned for the summer term for other year groups. <p>Young Leader Training (as part of the CLC Sports Partnership)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • As part of the CLC Sports Partnership, Ross Gillon (QE PE Teacher) delivered young leader training (Sept 17) to 20 of our Y5/6 pupils and two support staff members (MBr & MW) • One of our MTAs (MW) was then able to lead activities on the playground during the lunch hour. <p>Primary Sports & Education</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A sports coach has worked alongside staff to help deliver high quality curriculum-time PE sessions, in order to enhance the quality of sports provision for <u>all</u> pupils. <i>This is funded from a different source.</i> • For each unit of work, the coaches produce lesson overviews which are emailed to GS to ensure there is progression across the school. These lessons are linked to the National Curriculum objectives for PE. • Each half term, the sports coach assesses the children's ability in the PE unit that has been delivered in order to support staff in targeting those children who are performing below age-related expectations or those who are "less active". These assessments are shared with the class teacher and the information can be used to inform the child's parents via their school reports • Our coach attends regular CPD training <p>CPD</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Two teachers (JJ & EO) attended the 'STA School Teachers Foundation Swimming Certificate' CPD course at Lord's Meadow Leisure centre (Jun 17) to enable them to teach swimming effectively and safely. <p>Next steps</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ With ever-changing staff, there is always a need to up-skill teachers, especially with swimming. GS to email Linda Steer at Lord's meadow Leisure Centre to find out about swimming courses -courses will enable teachers to teach swimming effectively

UPDATE (from Linda Steer): Course to possibly run in April 18 - Book ST and AW on course when confirmed.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ GS to continue to liaise with 'Primary Sports and Education' to ensure that each PE unit is well planned, linked to the NC objectives and where possible, linked to our topics (i.e. dance)
<p>2) To increase the variety of sports offered to the pupils during curriculum time: offering "non traditional" sports to appeal to those less active.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ <u>To ensure that we continue to provide as wide a range of sports as possible and extend our range when available</u> <p>Crediton Learning Community Sports Partnership</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Our pupils from Year 1 through to Year 6 will have the opportunity to try a wide range of different sports through our CLC sports partnership: • In October 17, Year 3 and Year 4 pupils took part in a gymnastics morning. • In November 17, Year 5 and Year 6 pupils participated in a tag rugby tournament. • In February 18, Year 1 and Year 2 attended a multi-skills event • In March 18, Year 3 and year 4 pupils will have the opportunity to attend an orienteering morning. • In June 18, Year 5 and Year 6 will take part in an athletics day. • Trained play leaders (supervised by an MTA) deliver a range of activities to their peers during the lunch hour. <p>Primary Sports & Education</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • GS has worked with the coaches to plan a curriculum for the whole school that is progressive and covers all areas stated in the National Curriculum. • The sports on offer during curriculum time are: hockey, netball, basketball, handball, dodgeball, football, tag rugby, gymnastics, dance, tennis, cricket, athletics and swimming. • Less active pupils in KS1 and KS2 have been identified, and the Sport Premium money is funding the running of two lunchtime clubs to target these pupils. <p>Residential</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Y3/4 to attend a biennial residential that is partly funded by the PE premium money. The pupils will have the opportunity to participate in water-based outdoor sports such as surfing, body boarding, kayaking, orienteering & archery at the 'Outdoor Adventure' Residential Activity Centre in Widemouth Bay, Cornwall. <p>Resources</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • New netball posts, netballs, rugby balls, football and tennis balls were purchased with PE premium money so that a wide range of sports can be delivered effectively and more pupils can be active at any one time. • New goal posts (funded by FoBS) have been purchased so that football can continue to thrive during play/lunch times <p>Athletics</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • GS has registered the school with English Schools Athletics Association (ESAA) - this will give pupils in KS2 (no programme available for KS1) the opportunity to work towards Bronze, Silver & Gold Awards across a range of athletic activities such as standing long jump, sprinting and throwing (cricket/rounders ball). Sport Premium money to purchase awards for pupils and give them an incentive in their PE lessons. <p>Next steps</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Survey currently underway to gather pupils' opinions on PE and provide us with tangible data about sport and activity. (KS2 pupils

	<p>have answered the questionnaire on 'Survey Monkey', KS1 are answering in paper). GS to collate survey results by Easter 18. Further survey to be carried out in July 18: comparisons can then be drawn.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ During the Summer term 2018, current play leaders to train up a new batch of leaders (under the supervision of MW) to run lunchtime clubs ❖ Continue to identify "less active" pupils and target them through an invite only lunchtime club to try to increase their activity levels.
<p>3) Providing more opportunities for extracurricular sport and establish relationships with outside clubs</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ <u>To continue to build on links with other clubs and to try and introduce new sports or fitness elements</u> ➤ <u>To explore new clubs / taster sessions for school pupils to experience within our locality</u> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Our sport premium money continues to allow us to partly fund two after school clubs throughout the year: one for KS1 pupils and the other for KS2. These clubs are delivered by our coach from 'Primary Sports and Education' and change termly and have included multi-skills, dodgeball, handball, gymnastics and dance. • We funded four Karate taster sessions in Nov/Dec 17 for 30 pupils from Reception to Year 6 - these were run by 4Life Martial Arts. We then encouraged pupils to join a local 4life Martial Arts Club in order to continue with this activity. • Due to our links with 'Primary Sports & Education', we now host half term holiday clubs on our premises and encourage as many children to attend as possible. • We have a strong relationship with Coppleshill Utd - we encourage pupils to join them at weekends for football training sessions by handing out leaflets to promote the club. Their training sessions are often held on our school pitches. • Some of our sport premium money, together with a community grant from Tesco's in Crediton and funds raised from the PTA (FoBS) is funding the building of a 'sports pavillion' on the school grounds, which will enable: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ all pupils to have a gathering place that is undercover whilst listening to PE instructions ○ visiting schools with a place to gather and store their belongings equipment ○ sports participants to have a muster point for half time refreshments ○ other visiting organisations that use the school premises for sports, a place to gather ○ spectators to stand and watch events during inclement weather ○ pupils at school shade / shelter during school lunch and breaktimes <p>Next steps</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ To continue with the 'Crediton Learning Community Sports Partnership' package that will provide us with a range of sporting opportunities for our pupils and will provide training for new lunchtime play leaders - all delivered by qualified staff to develop key skills such as leadership, team work, independence and trust. ❖ To use 'Primary Sport and Education' to deliver a range of extra-curricular and lunchtime clubs ❖ To use data from the PE survey to provide further opportunities for pupils to sample a range of sports. ❖ Completion of the sports pavilion over the Easter period 2018.
<p>4) Promoting competitive sport by</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ <u>To continue to enter inter school competitive sports tournaments</u> • Sports day to be held each summer so that ALL pupils, from Reception to Year 6, have the opportunity to take part in

<p>entering inter-school competitions, tournaments and matches.</p>	<p>competitive races.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • KS2 pupils have many opportunities to represent the school across a variety of different sports each year: • Summer 2017 - Year 5 and Year 6 pupils competed in a tag rugby tournament at Cheriton Fitzpaine School • Summer 2017 - Year 5 and Year 6 pupils competed in a cricket tournament at Sandford Cricket Club. • Oct 17 - Year 5 and Year 6 pupils competed in the Area Primary School's swimming gala: we had many top three finishes and won the whole event!! • Stags class took three teams to a tag rugby tournament in November and won the plate competition! • In April 18, we will host a Year 5 and 6 football tournament to include Sandford and Yeoford Primary Schools. • In June 18, Year 5 and 6 will have the opportunity to win medals at an athletic competition at QE School and will also compete in the annual Sandford Cricket Festival. <p>Next steps</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ To develop and purchase an athletic award in school such as the UK Aviva Athletic Awards for Schools that can be utilised in school during the summer term ❖ To enter a range of competitive events with local schools, hosted in different locations, including at Bow and centrally at QE.
<p>March 2018 onwards</p>	<p>In summary:</p> <p>The sports premium money for 2018/19 will be directed towards:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Buying into a second year (if available) of the 'Crediton Learning Community Sports Partnership' package to provide the pupils with a range of sporting opportunities, both competitive and non-competitive. ❖ Extending the skills of existing teachers and up-skilling new members of staff, (especially with swimming) ❖ Ensuring high quality PE sessions are being delivered through progressive planning and termly monitoring ❖ Continue to target "less active" pupils and provide them with extra sports sessions to increase their activity levels. ❖ Training other KS2 pupils to become playground leaders in order to continue the good work of the current play leaders in organising and delivering structured sporting activities for their peers and KS1 pupils at lunchtimes. ❖ Finish off the Sports Pavilion which will make it secure outside school hours
