<p>Grazeley Parochial Primary School uses the PSP to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Increase children's physical literacy through the introduction of a wide number of skills from EYFS through to year 6. • Encourage participation, competitive and team building experiences through the provision of an increased number of sports competition opportunities e.g. inter-school competition, local sports festivals and league matches across an increasing number of sports. • Provide a wide variety of after school sports opportunities to support greater participation and interest in sport beyond school, including a 'Change for life Zumba' to encourage wider fun participation. • Utilise specialist coaches to mentor teaching staff, for CPD and to support both individual skills and team successes in competition. • Equality - Fund transport costs where necessary to encourage and give <u>all</u> children the opportunity to participate in inter-school competitions if they wish to do so. • To update and improve equipment in line with the needs of the school and preparation for inter-school competition opportunities.

CPD training for all staff- Orienteering	0.6 % £120.00	Teachers feel confident in setting up and running a wider number of orienteering and other outdoor adventure opportunities. Children have a greater awareness of their environment. Orienteering continues to support their maths and geographical map reading skills from as early an age as KS1.
Whole School Circus skills workshop	2% £360	Children gained valuable experiences experimenting with a wider range of activities and new skills to improve coordination and dexterity. Children were able to push themselves beyond their normal safe boundaries, whilst competing against themselves in terms of goal setting.
PE resources for: Schools Games Day, EYFC KS1 & 2 PE resources. Hall matting.	25% £4,411.80	Replacement of much needed gym matting has enabled gymnastic, dance and indoor athletics activities to be carried out safely. Easy light weight mats enable the children to set these up, learning the skills of responsibility whilst cutting back on set up times. Children benefit from a longer active lesson. Additional PE equipment ensures all children have the equipment they require to make the most of their PE lessons. Investment in specialist EYFS resources ensures that very young children receive the necessary skills to encourage early core strength, ABC skills and fine motor skills. Investment on Schools Games (Sports) Day equipment has supported this important day in terms of resources and ensuring that the day can run smoothly.
Teaching resources	4.5% 779.00	Teachers are now able to utilise a wide variety of resources to support their physical education termly plans. These resources further help to ensure that the correct skills are taught at the appropriate levels and that skills are progressive through the year groups. Children receive better quality lessons. Staff skills knowledge has been widened. This has enabled teachers to approach their planning with more confidence and recent lesson observations have proved to be very positive.

Specialist sports coaching/mentoring	5.6% £968.06	Children's experiences have been extended by receiving mentorship and encouragement from Reading football coaches and consequently children have remained enthusiastic and participated in after school clubs tournaments, and local school league matches..
Breakfast club activities	7% £1,212.01	Increasing uptake of breakfast clubs has enabled more children to be active in the playground before school begins. This benefits the children on social, emotional and physical levels.
Sports Club subsidy incentive per child to encourage activity beyond school : Street dance Yr 3-6 Football Change for life Zumba Club (all ages) Netball TOTAL SPORTS SUBSIDIES	3.2% £556.00	Good take up of after school sports club participation. Children's awareness and interest in competitive sport and physical fitness is more apparent. An increasing number of children continue to take up extracurricular sports beyond school within local clubs. Children are now reaping the benefits of this specialist coaching after school, in terms of developing self-awareness, competition tactics, skills and good sportsmanship. Children have participated successfully in a number of inter-school competitions and tournaments including football, netball, gymnastics and team indoor athletics.
Lunch time sports provision on the MUGA	16.4% £2,831.04	This has enabled children to remain active and participate in sport during the lunchtimes. Children receive a quality play time which is organised, mentored and very active whilst learning additional skills.
Sports safe maintenance & 50% payment towards sports field costs: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Sports field rental Maintenance Line marking 	12.9% £2,222.27	Essential grounds and equipment maintenance ensures continuity of safe sports activities. Rental of the extra land provides a quality space for sporting activities throughout the day to include: breakfast club, lessons, lunch times and after school clubs.
Transport of children to interschool games events.	0.5% £100	Supporting equity- allowing all children to attend events if they wish to participate. Children benefit from competition experiences and participation.
Morning sensory circuit sessions	7.1% £1,234.44	SEND children receive a variety of sporting activities designed to support concentration in the classroom in addition to supporting an active lifestyle Monday-Friday. This benefits them socially, mentally and physically.
New Long term investment- KS1 PE Equipment storage	12.6% £2,172.83	Introduction of a new Key Stage 1 store enables easy access to relevant equipment. Children benefit from a longer active lesson due to shorter set up times. Equipment is stored correctly increasing the longevity of the equipment.
PLG – Osmington Bay Additional support staff	1.7% £305.70	Supporting Equity- Additional staff support enabled <u>all</u> UKS2 children to participate in outdoor adventure, problem solving and orienteering skills on their residential trip. Trip encourages greater independence and supports confidence in terms of trying new skills.
Swimming Report:	94.5 % of Grazeley year 6 children can swim 25 metres or more excluding two children who did not attend swimming lessons due to cultural reasons.
