Objectives of PSP spending

Grazeley Parochial Primary School uses the PSP to:

- Increase children's competitive experiences and physical literacy through a wide number of inter-school competitions, league matches and intra-school sports festivals; focussing on wider participation levels.
- Support a wide variety of after school sports opportunities to encourage participation and interest in sport beyond school.
- With less than 2% of children walking or cycling to Grazeley Primary School each day, the school continues to support and widen children's physical activity opportunities throughout the school day time, to include a lunch time "Get Active" club for all children.
- Support the provision of specialist sensory circuits and active breakfasts clubs.
- Fund organised sports activities during lunch times and the training of sports leaders, to help create and maintain an active school.
- Utilise funding to support less active children enabling them to participate in competition opportunities.
- Equity - Fund transport costs as necessary to encourage and give all children the opportunity to participate in inter-school competitions if they wish to do so.
- Continue to fund Sports related CPD sessions and utilise specialist coaches as teaching mentors, to support longer term staff development; especially cricket and rugby.

Lunch time organised sports provision	£7817.18 (45%)	With less than 2% of children walking or cycling to school, these physical activity opportunities during the lunch time are crucial to support children's health and activity levels. These activities have enabled children to remain active and participate in sport every day. Children receive quality play times which are organised, mentored and very active. Children benefit both mentally and socially, as well as physically. Consequently, it generally supports better concentration levels in the classroom.
Sensory circuit sessions and equipment.	£1,038.18 (5.6%)	There is an increasing demand for our morning activities for children with SEND. These daily sessions provide an opportunity for children to take part in a variety of physical activities designed to build core stability and gross motor skills, whilst supporting their concentration in the classroom.
PE equipment resources:	£1,966.89 (11.3%)	Additional PE equipment ensures all children have the equipment they require to make the most of their PE lessons. Investment in specialist EYFS resources ensures that very young children receive the necessary skills to encourage early core strength and ABC skills, whilst developing their gross motor skills.
Specialist sports coaching, mentoring and CPD sessions to include: football, cricket, netball and rugby mentorship. This included an intra-school rugby festival and the subsidy of a taster rugby club.	£2,876.64 (16.5%)	Children's experiences have been extended by receiving mentorship and encouragement from specialist coaches. Children have been able to participate in both intra and inter-school festivals and competition.

Transport of children to Inter-school events	£264.00 (1.5%)	By providing transport, the school helps to support equity, allowing all children to attend events if they wish to participate. Children benefit from competition experiences, camaraderie and participation.
Affiliation Fee - Wokingham School Football Association	£25.00 (0.1%)	Affiliation enabled children to participate successfully in football festival opportunities across the Wokingham Schools.
Breakfast club activities	£1,142.22 (6.6%)	Increasing uptake of breakfast clubs has enabled more children to be active in the playground before school begins. This benefits the children on social, emotional and physical levels.
Sports safe maintenance of indoor and outdoor equipment, maintenance and preparation of the sports grounds including the MUGA and sports field.	£2,199.89 (13%)	Essential grounds and equipment maintenance ensures continuity of safe sports activities. Rental of the extra land provides a quality space for sporting activities throughout the day to include: breakfast club, lessons, lunch time sports activities and after school clubs. This benefits the children in terms of supporting a more active lifestyle.
Extra Staff costs to support Wokingham Games competition events	£80.00 (0.4%)	Some of the Wokingham School Games competitions, such as the indoor athletics event, are important events in terms of allowing much larger participation levels and for all abilities. This requires larger staff levels to accompany the children. All children benefit from these events socially, physically and mentally.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Maintain a focus on wide competition participation across all years and abilities- particularly specific groups of children (e.g. target groups such as SEND, BAME and PP) • To continue to develop and support lunchtime sports activities to support all children, but particularly less active children • Continue to support CPD through rugby mentorship by widening the provision to include KS1 and EYFS, using Didi rugby. • To support long term development of the teaching of PE and sport at Grazeley, through wider mentorship opportunities. • Support a wide variety of after school sports opportunities through the subsidy of new clubs to encourage participation and interest in sport beyond school. • Forge links with wider secondary schools, to support pupil transitions into secondary education in terms of sport. • Continue to develop a programme of intra-school festivals alongside annual sports day (School Games Day) to support wider competition opportunities for all children.
