Admission Policy

Organisation

Children are placed in classes according to their age (Reception to Year 6.) The Pastoral care of pupils is met by individual class teachers and the Headteacher and the Pastoral Care Manager.

Class teachers, the Inclusion Manager and Headteacher meet the special needs of children jointly. The Support Service and other outside agencies assist us.

All articles of clothing should **be clearly marked with the child's name**. The school is not responsible for loss or damage to personal items.

Hair

The school does not permit children to have haircuts that could serve as a distraction to other children. Please support us by following school policy when taking your child for a haircut.

Children must not have hairstyles which are extreme. Lines or patterns shaved into the hair and dyed hair are not permitted. All long hair must be tied back.

Any hair accessories should be plain and either blue, grey or white, please note hair bows should be small in size and appropriate for school wear.

Shaved patterns or lines in eye brows are not allowed.

Jewellery

For health and safety reasons jewellery such as bracelets, rings, necklaces and chains must not be worn. Small, plain stud earrings may currently be worn at parents' risk – diamond, hoop or drop-type earrings are not allowed. Wrist watches (not Apple Watches) may be worn but removed for P.E, dance and games, again at parents' risk.

Nails

Nail varnish must not be worn in school. False nails are not allowed. School has nail varnish remover and may ask a child to take nail varnish off in school.

Other

Fake tattoos and transfers are not permitted.

Sports Kit

Correct P.E. and games kit must be worn at the right times.

- ✓ Red T-shirt with school logo and blue shorts.
- ✓ School tracksuit in cold weather
- ✓ Trainers.

All pupils are expected to join in P.E., games and swimming lessons. Parents are asked to send a letter to the class teacher if the child is to be excused on medical grounds.

The School Day

School commences each day at **8.55 a.m.** Children should not come to school before 8.45 a.m. at the earliest, unless they are involved in an official and supervised activity.

Medicines

If pupils need to use an inhaler, parents are asked to label the inhaler and give it to Mrs. J. Walsh, who will give you a consent form to sign.

Under Health & Safety Regulations, staff may on occasion be responsible for the administration of medicine. If a child needs medication in school time, parents must come to school to discuss and sign a medical plan. All medicine must be prescribed by a GP, otherwise medication cannot be given.

School Discipline

Further appointments, if necessary, may be made with Mrs Evans (Deputy Headteacher) or Mrs. Sime (Headteacher).

The Senior Leadership team will be on the yard at the start of each day, don't hesitate to ask for a quick chat.

As we are a Catholic School we aim to treat others in a Christ-like manner and impart values of forgiveness, self-respect and fairness.

In exceptional circumstances it may be necessary to exclude a pupil from the school for a period of time as explained in the positive discipline policy and following local authority guidelines.

Creative Arts Curriculum

Mrs O'Hanlon coordinates our Creative Arts Curriculum. We celebrate our children's talents in Music, Dance, Art and Drama. Collaborations with The Liverpool Playhouse and Everyman Theatre enrich our curriculum further.

It must be remembered that children progress at different rates. We aim to motivate and encourage children to achieve their personal best and we do this by a system which allows pupils to advance at their own speed to the different stages and levels of the National Curriculum.

Assessment

The primary purpose of assessment in St. Matthew's Primary School is to ensure that all children make progress and reach their potential.

St. Matthew's Primary School will make good use of formative and summative assessment approaches and ensure the correct balance between these approaches.

Formative Assessment is not just assessment that involves only marking and feeding back judgements. It is bound into the next steps, looks forward as well as back, and is closely allied to forward planning.

Assessment in St. Matthew's Primary School will:

- Enable individual pupils to make progress in their learning.
- Relate to shared learning objectives, demonstrated through outcomes
- Be underpinned by confidence that every child can improve.
- Help all pupils to demonstrate what they know, understand and are able to do independently, appropriate to their age.
- Involve success criteria that is shared and, that work is assessed against the success criteria.
- Include reliable judgements about how learners are performing against expectations
- Involve both teachers and pupils in reviewing and reflecting upon assessment information
- Provide feedback which leads to pupils recognising the 'next steps' in their learning and how to work towards achieving these.

- Enable teachers to plan more effectively, by using assessment outcome, to develop next steps.
- Provide us with information to evaluate our work and amend planning at whole school, class and individual pupil levels.
- Enable parents to understand and be involved in their child's progress.
- Ensure that our practices in this area are fully inclusive.

Reception- EYFS Profile

In Reception each child is moderated against 17 areas of learning. These learning goals show the level of the child's development against age related expectations.

Year 1- Phonics

In Year 1 children will complete a phonics screening check. This checks the child's phonics knowledge and helps teachers confirm whether the child has made expected progress.

Year 2 & Year 6

In these year groups, the school is required to follow the guidance outlined by the Standards and Testing Agency (STA) through the assessment and reporting arrangements.

In May of Year 2 and Year 6 children will take national curriculum tests, SAT's. Children are tested in maths and English (reading and spelling, punctuation and grammar).

The tests will provide information about how your child is progressing, compared to children of the same age nationally.

Summative Assessment

Summative assessment takes place three times a year, once per term. This will involve both teacher assessment and standardised testing. Children will be assessed on their mathematics, reading, writing and spelling understanding. These assessments will be used to evaluate the curriculum and identify next steps.

Reporting outcomes to parents and outside agencies

Parents will receive termly reports on their child's progress through parent meetings and end of year report. The school will report the outcomes in each year group in five broad groups:

Working below the expectations – those children not working at age related expectations

Working towards expectations – those children beginning to work within age related expectations but not yet secure

Working at expectations – those children working securely at age related expectations

Working above expectations – those children showing a greater depth of understanding of age related expectations

Working significantly above expectations – those children who have progressed further and are working beyond age related expectations.

It should be noted that as the school has moved to an **age appropriate curriculum** it is anticipated that large shifts of children will take place over time rather than in year.

Religious Education

We have placed Religious Education at the heart of the curriculum, and we are developing a thematic approach which fully embraces the National Curriculum.

We aim to help pupils to recognise and appreciate the religious and spiritual dimensions of life appropriate to their age and maturity. The Religious Education offered in our school is delivered through “Come and See” – the programme approved by the Archdiocese. This programme helps us to allow and encourage opportunities for searching and questioning in an open manner. It helps us to encourage children to deepen their faith and to respect others in their personal quest for meaning.

In short, we seek to promote a deeper knowledge, appreciation and understanding of the Catholic faith. At the same time our programme relates to and respects other faith traditions and the ways in which they express significance of human life.

Throughout the school year, children from the school are invited to attend the 10:00 a.m. Sunday mass in the parish church.

Sex Education

We see our educative task as supporting parents or guardians in their responsibility of seeking the fullest possible development of the young people entrusted to us. Sex education is taught within a moral framework and through our integrated programme entitled “Journey in Love.”

Additional Educational Needs

Our Inclusion Manager, Mrs S. Rawnsley, will work closely with the Head Teacher, class teachers and parents regarding children who may have additional needs.

Every effort is made to provide work at appropriate levels for such children. In some cases children will require specific interventions and programmes of work.

Some children may require support from outside agencies.

Parents will be kept fully informed and will be part of decision making processes.

School Council

We believe it is important that our pupils have a “voice” concerning the school life. In order to listen to “the voice” our school council is annually elected by the pupils themselves.

Equality

Our school positively pursues anti-racist, anti-sexist policies throughout the curriculum, pastoral programme and organisational structure of the school. We do not accept any form of racist or sexist behaviour and look for the co-operation of parents in our efforts to create relationships that encourage respect for others.

The school uses the programme ‘No Outsiders in our School’. This teaches children to show respect and have an understanding of all relationships including same sex. This includes an awareness of anti-discrimination of transgender.

Parents are always welcome to arrange a visit to school to discuss their children's progress.

A written report is given to parents at the end of the summer term concerning their child's achievements through the year.

Parents are also formally invited to school to discuss their children's progress.

During the Autumn and Spring terms, teachers and parents share a termly report which records: attendance, punctuality, attitude and effort, attainment and progress towards end of year targets.

Safeguarding and Child Protection

Safeguarding and child protection are of the upmost importance at St. Matthews. We work with a Safeguarding team who meet weekly to ensure all children are safe from harm. (See Safeguarding leaflet)

All visitors to school must sign in at reception where Miss Johnston or Mrs Hall will administer a visitor's badge.

The badge must be returned when visitors sign out, as they are leaving the building. All visitors are asked to read our 'Code of Conduct' document.

Charging Policy

We may ask for voluntary contributions to pay for some activities. However there is no obligation to contribute and no child would ever be excluded from an activity because parents are unable or unwilling to contribute.

Unfortunately, it would not be possible to maintain a full programme of activities if there were insufficient funds. We thank the parents for their support in this area.

Complaints Procedure

If any parents are dissatisfied with any aspect of the school they may refer the issue to the Headteacher. A complaint, which cannot be resolved by the Headteacher, may then be referred to the Governing Body.

Parental Involvement

At St. Matthew's we believe that Teaching and Learning are more effective when parents are involved in the life of the school.

As a staff we have agreed to fully welcome parents into school and to work together to take this process further.

This has led to a greater awareness amongst the parents of the work of the school and a deeper involvement on a daily basis.
