A.	Oral language skills in Foundation Stage upon entry are lower for pupils eligible for Pupil Premium than for other pupils. This slows reading and writing progress in subsequent years.
B.	A number of pupils eligible for Pupil Premium support have emotional, social or special educational needs which can impact upon their learning and the progress that they make in class.
C.	Lack of resilience, self-confidence and co-operation when approaching work, which is affecting children's academic progress.

Improve oral language skills for pupils eligible for Pupil Premium in the Foundation Stage and then throughout the school.	<p>All children to make rapid progress by the end of the year towards achieving the Early Learning Goal for speaking, listening and understanding narrowing the gap from their on entry attainment. Staff have a greater awareness of strategies to develop pupil's communication skills and use questioning and resources effectively to address gaps in learning and engage children to articulate learning. Both Early Years teachers and the school SENCO have completed the ELKLAN course at level 3 to enable more targeted interventions to be put in place to support these children in both Early Years and subsequently in the school.</p> <p>All school staff have had INSET regarding identifying language needs and appropriate interventions to support language development throughout the school. The school has undertaken a review of Oracy through the Oracy project with new initiatives to promote Oracy in place.</p>
