

## PUPIL PREMIUM REPORT 2015-2016

### Overview of how Ely St John's uses the Pupil Premium Money

The Pupil Premium is additional funding allocated to schools. **It is determined by the number of pupils who have ever been eligible for Free School Meals; those children who are looked after (ESLAC) and those pupils from families in the Armed Forces.** From September 2014, all 4-7 year olds have been eligible for a free school meal, but the school still receives Pupil Premium Funding for those pupils whose family receives certain benefits.

**The funding is used to support pupils in ways above and beyond the universal model of a class with a classroom teacher. It may be used to provide interventions to aid progress for children at any level of ability, to impact further on their progress. Of course, not all children in the interventions we provide will be those in receipt of pupil premium funding but it enables us to meet the needs of many of our children more successfully.**

**In 2015-2016 we had around 11% of children eligible for pupil premium funding.**

The funding received for 2015/16 was as follows

£1,320 per pupil eligible for Free School meals

£300 per pupil from a forces family

£1,900 for any Looked After Child

**We believe that where possible children should access First Quality Teaching from qualified teachers as well as high quality interventions from trained Teaching Assistants. Our expenditure for 2015/16 reflects this commitment.**

### How effective has the expenditure been? How has it impacted on the progress of those EFSM pupils by the time they reach Year 6?

Key Stage Two assessment information for previous years shows good progress for disadvantaged pupils: in 2015, 100% of pupil premium pupils made at least expected progress over the Key Stage, resulting in the narrowing of the attainment gap for these pupils in Reading, Writing and Maths for both Level 4 and Level 5. This year, in-school assessment information for Years 1-6 shows attainment gaps narrowing or closing in a growing number of areas: the gap in Reading and Writing has been narrowed or closed in the majority of year groups; this is true for half of the year groups in Maths. The percentage of pupil premium pupils achieving the expected standard in Year 6 2016 is lower than for non-pupil premium pupils; the average progress made over Key Stage Two is also lower for pupil premium pupils. Raising the attainment of disadvantaged pupils has been, and remains, a key priority for the School. School tracking of each individual disadvantaged pupil details the support they have received each academic year, and the impact this has had for the pupil. This breakdown demonstrates the effectiveness of support in many areas, including both academic and personal wellbeing improvements.

<p><b>Total amount allocated ESJ for the current academic year.</b></p>	<p><i>2015-2016 we received £64,619, though planned on the basis of £59,420.</i></p> <p><b>2016-2017 we expect to receive £44,426 for September to March. Funding for April to August 2016 is as yet unknown. We will continue to use the money to staff <i>first quality teaching</i> and effective intervention; and <i>enrichment</i>, through financial support for activity clubs, trips, residentials and music tuition.</b></p>
