

**Bow Community Primary School
PE and Sports Premium Funding Review 2019/2020**

Priority/Target: To utilize the PE funding effectively in order to improve the quality, provision and sustainability of PE at Bow CP School	
Focus/Target	Review
<p>1) To improve the quality and consistency of provision of PE, and help improve staff confidence in their delivery, to improve levels and standards in PE</p>	<p>Crediton Learning Community Sports Partnership</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • We have once more used the sport premium money to buy into the Crediton Learning Community Sports Partnership 2019/20 and are working alongside sport staff at QE School in order to maintain the focus of the PE curriculum for our pupils. • The CLC ran a gymnastics festival at QE School for our Year 3 and 4 pupils in Jan 2020 - 39 pupils attended. Bow teaching staff (GS) and support staff (JW, KL & SM) accompanied the children, further developing their knowledge of the PE curriculum to use with the pupils back at school. • Our Year 1 and 2 pupils are attending a multi-skills event, which will be delivered by QE's sport ambassadors (Year 9 pupils) - 27 pupils in total will be attending. Bow teaching staff (DB) and support staff (SS, KT) will accompany the children and further develop their knowledge and get teaching ideas to use back at school. • Other events are planned throughout the year into the summer term. All teachers attending will be able to use this as CPD. <p>Primary Sports & Education</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A sports coach has continued to work alongside staff to help deliver high quality curriculum-time PE sessions, in order to enhance the quality of sports provision for all pupils. This is funded from a different source. • For each unit of work, the coaches produce lesson overviews which are emailed to GS to ensure there is progression across the school. These lessons are linked to the National Curriculum objectives for PE. • Each half term, the sports coach assesses the children's ability in the PE unit that has been delivered in order to support staff in targeting those children who are performing below age-related expectations or those who are "less active". These assessments are shared with the class teacher and the information can be used to inform the child's parents via their school reports • Our coach attends regular CPD training <p>School Swimming</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Bow is very lucky to have its own pool onsite, supported by a dedicated committee and volunteers. This means that all of our children have ample opportunity to swim at school during their time here. • As at summer 2019, all children within Key Stage 2 had developed water confidence and were able to enter the water and display at least one swimming stroke. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ 100% of our Year 6 children were able to swim at least 100m ✓ 100% of our Year 6 pupils were able to use a range of strokes effectively ✓ 100% of pupils were able to perform safe self-rescue in our swimming pool

	<p>Next steps</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ School to continue to liaise with 'Primary Sports and Education' to ensure that each PE unit is well planned, linked to the NC objectives and where possible, linked to our topics (i.e. dance) ➤ GS has emailed Linda Steer from Mid-Devon Leisure to enquire about upcoming swimming courses: with ever-changing staff, there is always a need to up-skill teachers, especially with swimming. Mr Bashford and Mrs Williamson (new teachers) will require training this year - funded by sport premium money ➤ To resurface our Multi-use games area ("Caged Area") to allow pupils to play a range of sports safely in curriculum time and out of school hours - funded by sport premium money ➤ Appoint a Sports Co-ordinator to replace GS in this role, as she now carries other responsibilities
<p>2) To offer a variety of sports to the pupils during curriculum time: offering "non-traditional" sports to appeal to those less active.</p>	<p>Primary Sports & Education</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • GS has worked with our coach, Lee Evans, to plan a curriculum for the whole school that is progressive and covers all areas stated in the National Curriculum. • The sports on offer during curriculum time are: football, tag rugby, basketball, netball, benchball, gymnastics, dance, indoor games (handball and dodgeball), rounders, cricket, athletics and swimming. <p>Crediton Learning Community Sports Partnership</p> <p><i>Our pupils from Year 1 through to Year 6 will have the opportunity to try a wide range of different sports through our CLC sports partnership who run a number of events in curriculum time throughout the year:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Otters (year 1 and 2) attended a multi-skills day at QE in Feb 19 • In May 2019, Hares class (year 3 and 4) attended an orienteering event at QE School • In June 2019, Stags class (year 5 and 6) attended an athletics day at QE School. • In January 2020, our year 3 and year 4 pupils (39 pupils) attended a gymnastic festival led by QE's sport ambassadors (Year 9 pupils) • In January 2020, a range of pupils from the year 5 and 6 pupils admirably represented the school in the annual swimming gala at Lords Meadow, Crediton. • We partially funded a circus skills day Jan 20 for Stags class year 5 and 6) to appeal to those "less active" pupils. The activities developed key skills such as co-ordination and balance. • In February 2020, our year 1 and year 2 pupils (27 pupils) will attend a multi-skills festival led by QE's sport ambassadors. • In April or May 2020, our Year 3 and 4 pupils will attend an orienteering day at QE Barnfield Campus. <p>Outdoor Adventure Day</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hares class (Year 3 and 4) will be attending an outdoor adventure day in the summer term to experience a range of sports such as climbing, and water-based sports - this will be partially funded by sports premium money.

	<p>Sandford Cricket Club</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> In the summer term, Sandford Cricket Club host a foreign player, usually from a cricket-playing nation such as South Africa/Pakistan. The player delivers 6 weeks of curriculum time coaching sessions to our year 5 and 6 pupils. This culminates in a cricket festival which is held at Sandford Cricket Club. <p>Athletics</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The school is registered with English Schools Athletics Association (ESAA) - this gives pupils in KS2 (no programme available for KS1) the opportunity to work towards Bronze, Silver & Gold Awards across a range of athletic activities such as standing long jump, sprinting and throwing (cricket/rounders ball). Sport Premium money is used to purchase awards for pupils and give them an incentive in their PE lessons. <p>Resources</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> New and replacement sports equipment (netballs, footballs, pumps, needles and cones) was purchased with sport premium money so that a wide range of sports can be delivered effectively and more pupils can be active at any one time. <p>Next steps</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ To use the sport premium money to purchase juggling balls/scarves, flower sticks and circus equipment to enable pupils to develop the circus skills learnt in their workshop. ➤ To use teacher assessment and the assessments provided by Primary Sports and Education to continue to identify pupils who are not meeting expected standards, and target them through an invite-only lunchtime club. Sport premium money utilised to fund a coach (Lee Evans) to deliver the club.
<p>3) Providing more opportunities for extracurricular sport and establish relationships with outside clubs</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Our sport premium money continues to allow us to partly fund two after school clubs throughout the year: one for KS1 pupils and the other for KS2. These clubs are delivered by our coach from 'Primary Sports and Education' and change termly and have included multi-skills, dodgeball, handball, gymnastics and dance. Due to our links with 'Primary Sports & Education', we now host half term holiday clubs on our premises and encourage as many children to attend as possible. Many of the participants come from the wider area, and use the facilities at Bow School We have a strong relationship with Copplestone Utd - we encourage pupils to join them at weekends for football training sessions by handing out leaflets to promote the club. During the summer term 2019, we ran a martial arts club with 4Life Martial arts We have a specialist dance teacher who comes in to deliver a dance after school club for Y1-6 pupils. <p>Next steps</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ To continue with the 'Crediton Learning Community Sports Partnership' package that will provide us with a range of sporting opportunities for our pupils and will provide training for new lunchtime play leaders - all delivered by qualified staff to develop key skills such as leadership, team work, independence and trust. ➤ To use 'Primary Sport and Education' to deliver a range of extra-curricular and lunchtime clubs

<p>4) Promoting competitive sport by entering inter-school competitions, tournaments and matches and organising intra-sport competitions.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Sports day to be held each summer so that ALL pupils, from Reception to Year 6, have the opportunity to take part in competitive races. The top three pupils in each race are celebrated and awarded with a gold, silver and bronze sticker respectively, and all pupils who take part, get a participation sticker - stickers purchased with Sport Premium money • In the Autumn term, pupils across KS2 played in house team football matches at lunchtimes. One house team was crowned winners. • In the Spring term 2020, pupils across KS2 will play in house team competitive netball matches at lunchtimes • In November 2019, our girls' football team (Year 5 & 6) played in a match against another local school. Other matches are planned. • In January 2020, a range of pupils from the year 5 and 6 pupils admirably represented the school in the annual swimming gala at Lords Meadow Leisure Centre, Crediton. <p>Future Crediton Learning Community competitive events:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In May 2020, year 5 and 6 pupils will have the opportunity to enter a High Five netball tournament • In June 2020, year 5 and 6 pupils will take part in an athletics day. • In June 2020, year 3 and 4 pupils will participate in a rounders and cricket tournament <p>Next Steps</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ To continue to run house team competitions at lunchtimes across a range of sports. ➤ To continue to enter a range of competitive events with local schools, hosted in different locations, including at Bow and centrally at QE. ➤ To use the sports premium money to purchase Bow CP School branded PE t-shirts so pupils can feel pride when representing the school or attending sporting events
<p>Next Steps</p>	<p>In summary:</p> <p>The sports premium money for 2020/21 will be directed towards:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Buying into a further year (if available) of the 'Crediton Learning Community Sports Partnership' package to provide the pupils with a range of sporting opportunities, both competitive and non-competitive. ➤ To resurface our Multi-use games area ("Caged Area") to allow pupils to play a range of sports safely in curriculum time and out of school hours. ➤ To use the sports premium money to purchase Bow CP School branded PE t-shirts so pupils can feel pride when representing the school or attending sporting events. ➤ Purchasing a range of new equipment for non-traditional sports (circus skills: juggling etc) to engage those less active pupils. ➤ Extending the skills of existing teachers and up-skilling new members of staff, (especially with swimming) ➤ Continuing to target pupils not meeting "expected" and provide them with extra sports sessions to increase their activity levels. ➤ Provide training for Year 5 pupils to become playground leaders in organising and delivering structured sporting activities for their peers and KS1 pupils at lunchtimes. ➤ Book FREE mental health workshops provided through Primary Sports and Education. This could potentially lead to buying into a package to support children's mental and physical health.
