

Woodthorpe Primary Pupil Premium September 2017

Background

Pupil Premium funding is allocated to schools to support children who are disadvantaged through economic circumstances with a view to closing any educational performance gaps that might arise through that disadvantage.

During this period, Pupil Premium funding was allocated to any child in the school that had been entitled to Free School Meals* at any time during the previous six years, not just those pupils currently in receipt of Free School Meals.

The key measure used by OFSTED and Central Government to measure a school's success in allocation of Pupil Premium funding is improvements in academic results for both the group of pupils for whom the funding is received and the whole school community.

In addition, Woodthorpe J.I. School considers the use of this funding to provide and support access to social and extra-curricular activities for children e.g. clubs, residential visits, if finances allow.

A premium is also in place for children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces.

In order to provide maximum support, it is important to ensure that every pupil that is eligible for Free School Meals is appropriately registered, some families do not provide the necessary information required to ensure this and are missing out on opportunities that would benefit themselves and their children. Allocation

From 1st April 2016 – 31st March 2017, Woodthorpe School received £65,260 (A)

From 1st April 2017 – 31st March 2018, Woodthorpe School received £59,980 (B)

From 1st April 2018 – 31st March 2019, estimated as £59,980 (C)

Schools have been asked to report by academic year as this is more meaningful for parents. Whilst the grant allocation is made on the basis of financial years, schools both plan teaching and other support and conduct assessments over the academic year.

Academic year 2016/17

Spending

The school received a grant of £63,060 for Pupil Premium, PP, in the academic year 2016 - 2017 (7/12ths (A) (£38,068) and 5/12th (B) (£24,992). This money was used in a number of different ways to support the learning of the students concerned:

Impact of Pupil Premium

EYFS

50% of PP children (2/4 children) reached a good level of development which is below that of non PP children in our school and the national percentage for all children.

Of the four PP children: two did not reach all the Early Learning Goals ELG; two exceeded all the goals. Two PP children made expected or better progress across the ELG and two made rapid or above rapid progress across the ELG.

Key Stage 1 (Figures in brackets are the percentage of the whole class achieving the level)

End of Key Stage 1 teacher assessment for the 2016-17 Year 2 cohort (5 children each = 17%): 80% (88%) PP children achieved at least the expected standard in reading, 80% (68%) in writing and 80% (84%) in mathematics. The biggest gap between PP and non PP is in writing.

Key Stage 2 (Figures in brackets are the percentage of the whole class achieving the level)

At the end of Key Stage 2 2016-17 Year 6 cohort (8 children each = 12.5%):

- 4/8 - 50% (57%) PP children achieved the expected standard in reading, writing and mathematics combined. This is just below the national figure for all children;
- 0% pp (27.3%) achieved the higher standard in reading, writing and mathematics combined;
- 25%pp (59%) achieved the expected standard in the reading test and 38% pp (32%) achieved the high standard;
- Writing teacher assessment: 62.5% pp (59%) expected standard; 0% pp (20%) high standard;

- Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling GPS test: 87.5% pp (83%); 37.5% pp (41%) high standard;
- Maths test: 25% pp (50%) expected standard; 25%pp (27%) high standard.
- Progress from KS1 to KS2 in reading writing and maths is below that of non-pupil premium pupils from similar starting points.

Year 1 phonics test: 83.3% of PP children achieved the required score in the phonics test. 71% of the non PP children achieved the required score. (Each PP child = 17%).

Progress of PP children, Years 1-6, was slightly below that of non PP children in writing, slightly above in reading and maths (see table).

Academic year 2017/18

Spending

The school received a grant of £65,260 Pupil Premium in the academic year 2017- 2018 (7/12ths (B) £38,068 and 5/12ths (C) estimated as £27,192 tbc. N.B. Only known funding rate and FSM pupils required to be reported.
