

Pupil Premium Strategy 2018-2019

The Pupil Premium is allocated to schools for:

- Children of statutory school age from low income families who are known to be eligible for free school meals (FSM)
- Children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months
- Children whose parents are currently in the armed forces

The level of pupil premium is £1,320 per pupil. The purpose of this statement is to effectively plan the way pupil premium money will be spent over the year and enable us to inform parents, carers and governors of the impact it has on outcomes for pupils.

School Context

Pupil Premium children 18% (out of 211 pupils), National Average 25%

Number of eligible pupils: 38

Pupil Premium Spend for 2018-19: £55, 572

Aims of Pupil Premium Spending for Woodthorpe J and I School:

- To provide additional support for pupils through small intervention groups with a qualified class teacher
- To support the implementation of English and Maths across the curriculum
- To subsidise educational visits including residential trips
- To support and promote pupils learning at home –specifically reading
- To offer CPD training for key teachers. Focussed on high-quality teaching in reading, writing and maths
- To provide out-of-hours clubs and give children additional learning opportunities such as music tuition
- To maximise the impact of teaching and learning assistants
- To develop effective communication and reporting systems and approaches- to ensure parents/carers are kept fully and regularly updated on their child's progress. Parental engagement is strengthened.

Barriers to future attainment

Some of the barriers faced by PP children are as follows:

- Participation in extra- curricular activities/events
- Opportunity to access learning from home
- Social and emotional difficulties due to complex family situations
- Attendance and punctuality difficulties
- EAL/SEND
- Individual learning needs

However, each child entitled to PP funding is different and unique in their circumstance and our provision and support must reflect this.

Our key objective in using this funding is to narrow the gap in attainment and achievement between those entitled to Pupil Premium and those who are not. We will ensure that:

- A high profile is given to Pupil Premium children
- All staff are accountable for the progress of Pupil Premium children
- High quality teaching for all
- Individual learning needs are met
- Staff are deployed effectively
