Dearest Pangolins,

I hope you had a good start to your first week of home learning with me last week. I'm aware the maths has been a little tricky since lockdown for some of you. If you're finding it hard, have a look at what Years 3 or 4 are doing in the White Rose scheme. It is sometimes hard to complete work without teacher support and it is okay to try something easier. The most important thing is that you are doing some maths. Many of you will be getting lots and lots of extra help next year (because of missing so much of this year) so don't worry about closing any gaps. But it is still important that you keep using the mathematical part of your brain in the meantime, though!

Similarly, if you find the Year 5 work too easy, have a look at the White Rose sheets Year 6 are being set. Some of you often complete challenges set at this level and achieve well with complete independence in class on a regular basis.

It is almost lunchtime on Friday as I'm writing this and I'm yet to receive any of this week's home learning to look at. If you are finding the home learning programme too overwhelming, try and complete just a little maths and English each week and send any photos of work completed. It is especially important for me to see the writing task as there are answer sheets for the maths and reading tasks (but it would be great to know how you're getting on with these as well). I promise to only publish work on the website if I have your permission, so please don't hold back!

I hope you are well and staying safe. Please remember that the school has a food bank for those in need. It is important that nobody in our school community is going hungry, especially at this difficult time.

English	Maths	Topic	Motivation
<p>This week's learning will be based on the theme of refugees. Last week was National Refugee Week so it is a great time to reflect on the difficulties and hardships this group of people face.</p> <p>When you're approaching this week's tasks, think about the experiences of Ahmet in 'The Boy at the Back of the Class' (the last book we read together).</p> <p>Start your learning by looking at the saved Refugee PPT. There is an excellent animated video clip to watch on the 4<sup>th</sup> slide.</p> <p>Once you have watched this and read through the other slides, have a go at one of the 6 saved reading comprehensions about refugees. If you scroll through either the 'easier' or the 'harder' of the reading comprehension pdfs that are attached to the class webpage, you will see there are 3 to choose from in each document (getting harder as you go down). You only need to choose one to do. There are answer sheets provided so you can mark the work yourselves to see how you've done!</p> <p>The writing task focusses on brackets this week. You are going to create an information booklet for refugees about our wonderful school and surrounding area.</p> <p>To begin with, jot down ideas on the 'Writing Planner'. If you want, change some of the subheadings or add your own. If I were doing this task, I'd create a section called 'What Can You Do On The Seafront?' I'd then write about a range of things I know.</p>	<p><a href="http://www.whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/year-5/">www.whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/year-5/</a></p> <p>This week's learning is all about decimals.</p> <p>The first lesson focusses on subtracting decimals with the same amount of decimal places. When you attempt the word problems, read through each one at least twice and show any working out.</p> <p>The second lesson focusses on subtracting decimals with a different number of decimal places. As long as you line up your decimal points, you'll do brilliantly. Use the same skills you learnt when completing the adding decimals lesson last week.</p> <p>The third lesson is all about multiplying by 10, 100 and 1,000. Watch the video to revise how the digits slide to the left across the place value columns when you multiply any number by these amounts. Think back to our lesson in the hall!</p> <p>The final lesson is all about dividing by 10, 100 and 1,000. You follow the same principles as lesson three, but the digits slide towards the right as the numbers get smaller in value.</p> <p>Don't forget to use the answer sheets. Sometimes if you get a question wrong, if you can see the correct answer, you can work out where your error was allowing you to be successful in later calculations.</p>	<p><b>PSHE</b></p> <p>Create a <b>THANK YOU</b> poster (don't put your name on it though) and the best ones will be shared online.</p> <p>Last month, we put a Facebook request on a Hove community page for donations of groceries, children's books and children's clothes. This was to support families in our school that we know are struggling at the moment. We received a HUGE amount of donations. See how much we got in the photos below this grid!</p> <p>We've just started running another local appeal on the same Facebook page. We've already received lots of bags of shopping and have been promised many more over the next few days! Next week, I will write a post thanking people for their donations and I'd like to include some of your posters. Please photograph any completed ones and send them to me.</p> <p>Remember that you are thanking people for their <b>KINDNESS</b> and <b>GENEROSITY</b> in helping some of our families who have been going <b>hungry</b> or have been <b>very short of money</b> at this difficult time. The people you are thanking are <b>THE PORTLAND ROAD COMMUNITY (in HOVE)</b>.</p>	<p><b>Dance</b></p> <p>Click on the link below to visit Oti's Boogie Beebies. <p>For example, I might write:</p> <p><i>Along the seafront, you can find the greatest pier in the country. Brighton Pier (which is near The Old Steine) is free to visit. It contains many side stalls (such as The Dolphin Derby) and a range of rides (including The Dodgems and The Turbocoaster) but you have to pay to go on these. It is worth going just for the views of the city and the sea, though. There are plenty of benches and deckchairs for everyone to sit on. It is the perfect spot to eat a packed lunch as there are public toilets (just before the indoor amusement arcade).</i></p> <p><i>My favourite thing to do on the seafront, though, is to simply sit on the beach. You can choose to sit in the busy part (between the two piers) or in a quieter part (towards Hove or towards Kemp Town). The beach is pebbly (so bring something soft to sit on) and enjoy staring at the sparkling sea.</i></p> <p>I hope you can see how I've used brackets. Brackets are used in pairs around a group of words to keep them separate from the rest of the sentence. The words marked off by brackets introduce an extra idea into the sentence.
